
Family Counseling Center staff compete for Pi Day prize

SQSPCA raises more than \$10,000 for assistance to Ukraine

The Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSPCA) has more than doubled its original goal after issuing a call for funds to provide relief to animals, their owners and animal shelters in war-torn Ukraine.

Following a weekend of horrific news, including a story about three volunteers shot and killed by Russian militants after delivering food to an animal shelter in Busha, Ukraine, the SQSPCA announced on March 7 it would collect money locally on behalf of the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW), including a \$2,500 dollar-for-dollar match to get things started.

"IFAW has boots on the ground, assisting Ukrainians from Poland," said SQSPCA Executive Director

Stacie Haynes. "We are pleased to be able to contribute \$11,081 toward these amazing, life-saving efforts."

Shannon Walajtys, IFAW's Director of Disaster Response and Risk Reduction, is one of the IFAW team members currently working overseas.

"Please accept our heartfelt thanks for your contribution to this effort. The fact that so many care gives us hope," Walajtys messaged from Poland. "Since the conflict began, IFAW has rushed emergency assistance to multiple partners in Ukraine and the surrounding countries working to help both animals and people.

"These shelters need our support now more than ever as, all too often, animals are the voiceless victims of conflict. My team and I have deployed to Poland and will continue to work with government authorities and local shelters to help provide much-needed relief," Walatjys wrote.

Founded in 1969, IFAW comes highly recommended by SQSPCA associate Dr. David Chico, a leading veterinarian in New York State who has volunteered with the organization.

"Folks in our region prove time and time again how very much they care about animals – in this case, in a war zone halfway across the world," praised Haynes. "Supporters understand the deep connection between helping animals and helping humans. People are risking their lives right now to ensure animals left in shelters are cared for and pets are transported with families to safety. We are so proud to have initiated this campaign and we will always be grateful to those who donated."

Rabies clinic set for April 7

Herkimer County Public Health will host a rabies clinic at the Ohio Community Rec. Center, 140 Nellis Rd., Town of Ohio, on April 7 from 5:30 - 7 p.m.

All cats, dogs and ferrets three months or older must be vaccinated even if they stay indoors. Every dog and cat needs two rabies vaccinations one year apart, then one every three years. Ferrets must be vaccinated every year.

Dogs should be on a leash. Cats and ferrets should be in a carrier or pillowcase. Bring the pet's rabies vaccination history to receive a three-year certificate. No vet exams will be given.

A \$5 donation per pet is suggested to defray costs.

The Authority opens its Household Hazardous Waste Facility for a 30th season

The Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority opened its Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Facility on April 1 for its 30th season. The Authority will be highlighting this milestone by launching a "30 Days of HHW" campaign on Facebook and Instagram.

If improperly disposed of, HHWs can pose threats to personal, public and environmental health. If hazardous wastes are disposed of in a regular garbage or recycling stream, they can harm sanitation workers and contaminate septic tanks, wastewater treatment systems and local water supplies. If left around the house, these hazardous materials can harm children and pets, even if the products are expired.

HHWs will be accepted at the Authority's Utica Eco-Drop location on Leland Avenue from April 1 - Sept. 30. The HHW Facility is open to all residents of Oneida and Herkimer counties Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m., and Saturdays 7 a.m. - 2 p.m. There is no charge to residents for the services at this facility, which integrates multiple hazardous waste disposal programs into one convenient location. Note that HHW is not accepted at the Rome EcoDrop.

Households are limited to dropping off 14 wet gallons and/or 20 dry pounds of household hazardous wastes per trip. Only liquid paint will be accepted; empty paint cans or cans with hardened paint are garbage items and should be placed in the garbage with their lids removed.

Businesses in Oneida and Herkimer counties may also qualify to use the HHW Facility. Businesses,

schools, farms and other organizations that are considered conditionally exempt may utilize the facility by appointment only. Businesses may be charged fees for disposal of certain wastes. To obtain approval to use the facility or to ask any questions, contact the Authority's Superintendent of Waste Collection, Justin Fitch, at justinf@ohswa.org or 315.733.1224 ext. 4302.

For more information on HHW disposal, call the Authority at 315.733.1224 or visit ohswa.org. The Authority also encourages residents and businesses to visit amirecyclable.com, which provides users with a tool to quickly search thousands of items for immediate recycling and disposal instructions.





Drawing to be held for Herkimer BOCES Building Construction program's 42nd house

The Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Building Construction program has been building houses for local residents for more than 40 years, and the next house could be yours.

A lottery drawing will determine who will receive the house to be built by the program during the 2022-23 school year for completion by June 2023.

The selected homeowner pays the cost of materials and transportation of the house from Herkimer BOCES to its location. The labor is provided for free by high school juniors and seniors under the supervision of Building Construction instructor John Martin.

Building Construction students are currently working on the program's 41st house, which is already accounted for, and the lottery drawing will be for the 42nd house next school year.

If you're interested in receiving the house,

attend an informational meeting at 5 p.m. on April 5 in the Building Construction classroom at the Herkimer BOCES William E. Busacker Complex at 352 Gros Blvd. in Herkimer. Enter the classroom directly by going around to the back parking lot where you will see the current house the class is building.

At the meeting, information discussed will include procedures, house styles, the purchasing of materials, the construction date, criteria for applying, moving the house and other owners' responsibilities.

A lottery drawing will

be scheduled for a couple of weeks after the meeting to determine who is selected as the recipient of the house. If multiple people apply and attend the lottery, runners-up can be selected for subsequent years.

The house, which will be an about 1,500-square-foot, one-story ranch, could be delivered to many locations in and surrounding the Herkimer BOCES region. Previous houses have gone as far from Herkimer BOCES as the Thousand Islands, Lake

Smullen prioritizes support for people with differing abilities

"People with differing abilities matter, and those who support them deserve workplace protections," Smullen said. "New York should rightfully be known as the state that supports those with differing abilities. It's the job of the legislature to support this bipartisan resolution, K665, to reaffirm our support to our people."

Smullen represents the 118th Assembly District, which includes Hamilton and Fulton counties as well as parts of Herkimer, Oneida and St. Lawrence counties.

CFLR urges parents to get informed on youth opioid crisis

With the recent news story of seven West Point Academy cadets who overdosed on cocaine laced with fentanyl during spring break, the Center for Family Life and Recovery is urging parents to educate themselves and their children on the rising risks of opioid use, particularly drugs laced with fentanyl. As of March 9, in Oneida County alone there have been 49 non-fatal overdoses and six fatal overdoses.

"Overdoses are happening in

every community. People are dying, our youth and young adults are dying – this is a crisis," said Director of Prevention Services Jodi Klostreich at the Center for Family Life and Recovery. "With the rise in mental health issues among our youth, they are taking more risks with substances and alcohol. And now, fentanyl-laced drugs have become the next wave of the opioid crisis. CFLR wants every parent and community member to know the trends, and to

share with their children that drugs are not safe, and dealers don't care if there is loss of life... it's a business, and that is it." She also stated, "It's so easy to lace any substance or beverage and you won't know it, smell it, it won't even look different."

According to a U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) official, "Pills and other potent drugs on our streets are everywhere and no one is immune to accidentally overdosing if they use or abuse drugs. Heroin and

fentanyl should be a conversation with our youth. Fentanyl is 100 times more powerful than morphine. As little as one gram of fentanyl can kill 500 people. It doesn't take a lot to kill."

CFLR wants parents and community members to also be trained and educated on Naloxone (Narcan) and why it's so critical to have on hand. In an overdose situation, Narcan can possibly save someone's life.

CFLR offers free NARCAN education and training. If your

school, agency, college or any community members want to know more about CFLR's Prevention and Recovery Department's programs and services, call CFLR at 315.733.1709. Easter egg hunts and other eggceptional traditions

Easter is celebrated in various ways. Traditional religious commemorations include Saturday evening Easter vigils and Sunday morning Resurrection masses. Parents may spend Easter weekend putting the finishing touches on Easter Bunny baskets, and many families favor a combination of traditions.

Since religious as well as secular imagery and traditions have melded to form the Easter most individuals recognize today, a mix of customs may be part of your Easter festivities. Among them will be colored eggs, egg hunts and possibly even egg rolls. Just how was the Easter egg tradition hatched?

Pre-Christian societies

Before Christianity was as widespread as it is in modern times, many societies associated eggs with spring and new life. Many birds and animals lay eggs early in spring, and these eggs tend to hatch upon the arrival of the warm weather, budding flowers and buzzing insects.

Ancient Persians are believed to have painted eggs for Nowrooz, their new year celebration that would fall on the spring equinox each year.

Eggs also have been part of Passover celebrations. A hard-boiled egg dipped in salt water is served at a Passover seder, symbolizing both new life away from oppression and the Passover sacrifice at the Temple in Jerusalem, according to Chabad.org.

Lent, Christianity and eggs

In medieval times, eating eggs was forbidden during Lent, when both dairy and meat were avoided. To reduce waste, eggs laid during Lent were boiled or preserved in some way. The fast ended on Easter Sunday, and eggs became, once again, important and

nutritious staples — especially for poor families that couldn't afford much meat. Eggs also were given to the church by medieval English villagers and also to the lords of the manor. Royals eventually got in on the act, and decorated eggs were distributed to the household in a tradition that was one of the earliest to include eggs.

Egg hunts and more

Some historians suggest that egg hunts can be traced back to German Protestant reformer Martin Luther, who organized egg hunts for his congregation. The men would hide the eggs for the women and children to find. This symbolized the story of Christ's resurrection, when the tomb was discovered by women. The eggs also represented Jesus' new life and his emergence from the tomb.

Egg hunts are not the only egg-related games that were hatched for Easter celebrations. According to the website Learn Religions, some European children go from house to house begging for Easter eggs, like children may ask for treats on Halloween. The custom is called "pace-egging," a term derived from the old word for Easter, "Pasch." Egg rolls also are symbolic of rolling away the stone from Christ's tomb. Various countries have their own rules on egg rolls. In Germany, for example, children roll their eggs down a track made from sticks.

Easter eggs are an integral symbol of the holiday that hold both secular and religious meaning.



Yellow Lenses to Rescue for Macular **Degenerations**

Dear Dr. Roach: I have an elderly friend who's becoming blind from macular degeneration. After hearing of a particularly frustrating event she experienced due to vision loss, I remembered the great clarity that the yellow-lens (to reduce glare) glasses gave me, not just at night, but daytime also.

So, I sent her a pair to see if it would help, as a last-ditch effort. She called me crying, it had made such a difference! She has now had her prescription eyeglasses done with the yellow (blue-canceling?) lenses. Of course, we understand that this is just a temporary help, and won't prevent the blindness from taking its course, but it has given her much better vision for a time. - I.L.B.

Answer: Age-related macular degeneration is the leading cause of vision loss in industrialized countries. It is a

degeneration of the central part of the retina, called the macula, which is responsible for fine detail central vision. The underlying cause is not precisely known, and the course is progressive.

I was able to find a 2002 study that confirmed that yellow or orange lenses improved contrast sensitivity in people with early age-related macular degeneration, whereas red and gray lenses worsened it. Another study suggested that the perceived benefit (the subjective experience by the person) was enhanced, but that objective improvement in vision was not actually improved

In my opinion, perceived benefit is still worth a great deal, and since there is little effective treatment for the more common "dry" form of ARMD beyond vitamins and smoking cessation, I am publishing your letter in hopes that some people will get improvements in their vision, as your friend did, from this low-cost treatment with essentially no risk of side effects

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a healthy 73-year-old man who has always had a large prostate. Thirty years ago, my urologist described it more like the size of an orange rather than a walnut. Despite its size, it has never given me any problems - no UTIs, sudden urination, poor stream, waking me in the middle of the night, etc. Despite not having symptoms, about 10 years ago I was prescribed finasteride at a dose of 5 milligrams and Rapaflo to "try to keep it in check." In 2018 I had an ultrasound done of my prostate, and it was measured at 185 grams. It was measured again recently and is now 232 grams. My PSA is always in the 3.2-3.5 range.

At what point does a prostate get too large? Should I be concerned even without having any symptoms? To his credit, my urologist discussed my surgical options, along with the related side effects. I am reluctant to do anything if it's not necessary. - J.J.

Answer: The normal prostate gland is about 20 grams, and only 4% of men will develop a prostate over 100 grams. Yours is well past that, though far short of the world record of 2,410 grams.

It is striking that the size of the prostate does not well correlate with a man's symptoms. Since you have no symptoms and a low PSA level - especially considering the size, there is no indication to do anything surgically. The risk of surgical complications is higher in men with very enlarged prostate glands, so I would certainly be cautious about considering surgery.
