
National Railway Historical Society meeting April 8



Easter egg hunts and other eggceptional traditions

Easter is celebrated in various ways. Traditional religious commemorations include Saturday evening Easter vigils and Sunday morning Resurrection masses. Parents may spend Easter weekend putting the finishing touches on Easter Bunny baskets, and many families favor a combination of traditions.

Since religious as well as secular imagery and traditions have melded to form the Easter most individuals



recognize today, a mix of customs may be part of your Easter festivities. Among them will be colored eggs, egg hunts and possibly even egg rolls. Just how was the Easter egg tradition hatched?

Pre-Christian societies

Before Christianity was as widespread as it is in modern times, many societies associated eggs with spring and new life. Many birds and animals lay eggs early in spring, and these eggs tend to hatch upon the arrival of the warm weather, budding flowers and buzzing insects.

Ancient Persians are believed to have painted eggs for Nowrooz, their new year celebration that would fall on the spring equinox each year.

Eggs also have been part of Passover celebrations. A hard-boiled egg dipped in salt water is served at a Passover seder, symbolizing both new life away from oppression and the Passover sacrifice at the Temple in Jerusalem, according to Chabad.org.

Lent, Christianity and eggs

In medieval times, eating eggs was forbidden during Lent, when both dairy and meat were avoided. To reduce waste, eggs laid during Lent were boiled or preserved in some way. The fast ended on Easter Sunday, and eggs became, once again, important and nutritious staples — especially for poor families that couldn't af-

ford much meat. Eggs also were given to the church by medieval English villagers and also to the lords of the manor. Royals eventually got in on the act, and decorated eggs were distributed to the household in a tradition that was one of the earliest to include eggs.

Egg hunts and more

Some historians suggest that egg hunts can be traced back to German Protestant reformer Martin Luther, who organized egg hunts for his congregation. The men would hide the eggs for the women and children to find. This symbolized the story of Christ's resurrection, when the tomb was discovered by women. The eggs also represented Jesus' new life and his emergence from the tomb.

Egg hunts are not the only egg-related games that were hatched for Easter celebrations. According to the website Learn Religions, some European children go from house to house begging for Easter eggs, like children may ask for treats on Halloween. The custom is called "pace-egging," a term derived from the old word for Easter, "Pasch." Egg rolls also are symbolic of rolling away the stone from Christ's tomb. Various countries have their own rules on egg rolls. In Germany, for example, children roll their eggs down a track made from sticks.

Easter eggs are an integral symbol of the holiday that hold both secular and religious meaning.

How seniors can approach exercise

Brisk walking is one example of moderate aerobic exercise. Seniors who want to sweat a little more when exercising

can replace moderate aerobic exercise with one hour and 15 minutes of vigorous exercise, such as jogging, each week.

Is strength training safe for seniors?

The CDC advises seniors to incorporate muscle-strengthening activities into their weekly fitness routines twice per week. Lifting weights, working with resistance bands, heavy gardening, and even some forms of yoga qualify as muscle-strengthening activities. Exercises that use your body weight for resistance, such as sit-ups and push-ups, also can help build strength. Always speak with a physician before beginning a muscle-strengthening exercise regimen and, if possible, work with a personal trainer, especially if you're a novice.

When to stop a workout

It's imperative that seniors recognize when to stop working out. Exercising more than is recommended by your doctor can increase the risk of illness or injury. In addition, stop exercising if any of the following symptoms appear:

- Dizziness or shortness of breath
- Chest pain or pressure
- Swollen joints
- Nausea
- \bullet Tightness in muscles or joints
- Pain anywhere in the body
- Throbbing or burning sensations

Exercise can help seniors stay healthy and feel more energetic throughout the day. Before beginning a new regimen, seniors should discuss physical activity with their physicians.



Rabies vaccination clinic set for April 9

from 9 - 11 a.m. at the Palatine Town Barn, 817 Stone Arabia Rd., Fort Plain.

New York State public health law requires that all dogs, cats and domestic ferrets shall have initial vaccinations administered against rabies no later than four months of age and stay up to date with re-vaccinations. Re-vaccinations are required one year later and a booster shot every three years. It's important to have pets vaccinated in a timely manner in order for the pet to be considered protected against the virus.

Pet owners should bring proof of their pet's last rabies vaccination.

The rabies vaccine veterinarian administration fee is \$10 per vaccine.

To assure the safety of other pets and people, dogs must be leashed and cats and ferrets must be contained in a pet carrier or box when attending the rabies clinic.

Cuthbertson praised Poland science teachers and science fair organizers Jessica Meyer and Kevin Ford for operating the science fair, science Christopher teachers Weeden and Barry Smith for supporting the fair, the school community for helping with judging and donations and the students for the effort they put into their projects.

"This is a unique event here at Poland," he said.



The Iditarod, a 1,000-mile dogsled race from Anchorage to Nome, AK, started on March 5 this year, and the winner completed the race on March 15. Craig said she has taught about the Iditarod and held related activities with her class or students she works with each year. Older students will still talk to her about the race when they see her in the hallway, she said.

"It's something that kind of stays with them through

the years," she said.

In 2020, when schools closed to in-person learning due to COVID-19 and most professional and college sports were shut down, students enjoyed being able to track the Iditarod, which was already in progress and was still completed, Craig said.

This year, Craig expanded aspects of the Iditarod activities to the whole elementary school. Student readers in grades kindergarten to fifth grade could share overview reports on books they read using "I-Did-A-



SQSPCA partners with CNYVOC in reduce, reuse, recycle effort

It is common knowledge that profits from the New Leash on Life Thrift Shop are used to care for animals housed at the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSPCA). The store is one of the shelter's main sources of income.

What many may not realize is that Thrift Shop Manager Natalie Wrubleski is always looking for ways in which the store can assist other community organizations. Her latest partnership is with Utica's Clothes to Homes Program, which is run by the Utica Center for Development (UCD).

Clothes to Homes accepts all unwanted textile items, and nothing goes to waste. According to the UCD website, "All donations are separated and sorted through by our staff and volunteers. Useable items are distributed throughout our area to assist those in need." Unusable items are recycled.

"The New Leash on Life Thrift Shop depends entirely on donated merchandise for its inventory of clothing, housewares and other assorted items, and our community is very generous, for which we are extremely grateful," said SQSP-CA Executive Director Stacie Haynes.

"Sometimes we have a surplus of inventory, or we receive textiles that we can't re-sell, so this new relationship with Clothes to Homes is a win-win for both organizations," Haynes said.

"We particularly don't like to see things go to waste. Clothes to Homes recycles unusable textiles in addition to providing clothing to those in need in their community, and we applaud these efforts," added Wrubleski.

Proceeds from Clothes to Homes help build more affordable housing for area veterans through the Central New York Veterans Outreach Center (CNYVOC), a division of UCD.

UCD Housing Manager Scott Zoeckler and coworker Julio Rodriguez are excited to be making regular stops at the New Leash on Life Thrift Shop.

"Our textile collection has been active for about a year," said Zoeckler, who also oversees the Clothes to Homes program. "We quickly realized that people have an abundance of clothing to donate, and we found buyers in Canada for unusable clothes and textiles. Our staff sorts through donations – wearable items are provided to the community at no charge and the things we can't distribute are baled and sold to the recyclers."

Zoeckler said UCD is currently restoring the former YWCA on Cornelia Street in Utica, the second floor of which will become affordable housing for veterans based on HUD guidelines thanks in part to the Clothes to Homes program.

In addition to the SQSPCA thrift store, the Clothes to Homes truck also makes pickups in Cobleskill and Middleburgh and the CNYVOC collects textiles Monday - Friday from 8 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. at the Veteran's Center at 726 Washington St., Utica. CNYVOC serves veterans in eight counties and also has facilities in Delaware and Jefferson counties.

The SQSPCA's New Leash on Life Thrift Shop is open from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. Tuesday - Saturday; donations are accepted Tuesday, Friday and Saturday. The thrift store and shelter are located at 5082-5088 State Highway 28, Cooperstown.

Did you know?

Getting out and about is a vital component of many seniors' daily lives, but it's important that aging men and women recognize how much exercise is healthy for them. The Department of Health & Human Services notes that adults need a mix of physical activity to stay healthy. That mix should be a combination of moderate-intensity aerobic activities, which can include golfing, swimming and even gardening, and muscle strengthening activities like

weightlifting that make the muscles work harder than usual. The DHHS recommends adults combine 150 minutes of moderate-intensity aerobic activity per week with at least two days of muscle-strengthening activities. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that these guidelines are safe for individuals who are 65 and older, generally fit and have no limiting health conditions. Individuals who do not fit that criteria should consult with their physicians be-

fore beginning a new exercise regimen, as it's possible that they could be putting their health at considerable risk if they attempt to follow guidelines designed for people who are generally fit. It's also important that healthy seniors avoid overdoing it in regard to exercise. Though the DHHS suggestions are the minimum recommendations, going too far beyond those guidelines without first consulting a physician could increase seniors' risk for injury, illness or even death.

Roommate Stuck with Unwanted Kitten

Dear Paw's Corner: The local shelter in our college town does not allow college students to adopt pets. However, my roommate managed to get around the rule by using her boyfriend's address, and she brought a kitten into our dorm. I told her to take it back, as pets are not allowed in the dorm (except for service animals). She ignored me. Two weeks later, she dropped out of school and moved in with her boyfriend, leaving behind most of her stuff - and the kitten! If I tell our R.A. I could get in trouble. What can I do? I don't want anyone to know what college I'm at, so sign me - Beth in Boston

Dear Beth: Honesty is the best policy here, and the welfare of the kitten is at stake. Contact the shelter right away. Explain what happened with your roommate, that you're caring for the kitten as she's abandoned it, but that you aren't allowed to keep it.

Next, tell your R.A. what happened. Call your parents, too, so they're aware of the problem and will support you if there's an issue with the school.

Your roommate used either her name or her boyfriend's name and his address. The shelter will have this on file, so they can verify that you're not the one who's responsible for the kitten.

They'll give you instructions on how to bring the kitten back and surrender it to them. If there's a surrender fee, they should bill the boyfriend and your ex-roommate. Likewise, any penalties assessed by the college should fall on your ex-roommate.



Donna's Day: Creative Family Fun

Papier Mache Offers Goopy Hands-On Fun

Stir together a simple, goopy recipe, add some newspaper, and you're on the way to a fun activity the whole family will enjoy. When you make these papier mache pot covers to dress up small plants, you won't have to wait for days before you paint them, because the microwave speeds up the drying.

To make plant covers you'll need:

- Microwave-safe jars with lids removed, such as empty pasta sauce or canning jars with a 3-4-inch base.
 - Microwave-safe plastic food wrap
 - Newspaper
 - 1 cup all-purpose flour
 - 2 cups water
 - Large rubber band
 - · Acrylic or poster paints and brushes

Here's the fun:

- 1. For each cover, wrap plastic wrap around the base and outside of a jar. (The wrap makes it easier to remove the project when it is dry.)
 - 2. Cut newspaper into 12-inch-square sheets.
- 3. In a large mixing bowl, stir the flour and water together until smooth.

4. Now comes the mess that makes papier mache such a fun and tactile craft. Set one sheet in front of you. Spoon about 2 tablespoons of the mixture on the sheet and spread with your hands like you're finger painting. Use just enough to thinly cover the sheet.

It should not be soggy. Center a second sheet on top and spread more mixture. Repeat with a third sheet.

- 5. Set the jar upright in the center of the stack. With both hands, gather the wet paper stack evenly around the pot while your child places the rubber band around it, about 3 inches from the base of the jar. Add more mixture to the outside layer so that it is completely covered. Fan out edges.
- 6. An adult should place the jar upside-down in the microwave and heat on high for 1 1/2 minutes. Use a potholder to pat down any air bubbles that have formed. Microwave again for 1 1/2 minutes, watching to make sure that the paper does not begin to scorch. Pat down any bubbles. Continue in a couple of 30-second bursts until it is almost dry, keeping an eye on it at all times.
- 7. Cool. Remove the jar. When completely dry, remove the rubber band, then paint.
- 8. To use, set a draining tray and plant in the pot cover.

Note: Instead of the microwave method, let the flowerpot cover air-dry a day or two.



ot sure of Mother Nature's motive in delivering some spring snow during "March Madness," but I appreciate opening the door and getting a delectable whiff of onions simmering. It can only mean one thing - French onion soup is in my future.

I wondered why it's French. Google offered up, "Onion soups have been popular at least as far back as Roman times. Throughout history, they were seen as food for poor people, as onions were plentiful and easy to grow." Back in 18th century Paris, some bored soul injected beef broth, butter, wine, bread and cheese into a pot of onions and culinary history was made.

I feel bad for my wife because the soup making process is a teary-eyed juggernaut. It's her choice, however, handed down from generations, to use the more pungent red onion for taste and color. The first half buildup gives us all a good cry whether we need it or not. The good news is the versatile soup can be customized by any home chef depending on what's in the pantry and fridge and by personal preference.

Onions are good team players. Onion soups also have a lot of health benefits. As part of the Allium family, along with leeks, shallots, garlic and chives, onions have long been good sources of vitamins C and B6, iron, folate and potassium and are known to provide cold and flu relief with their anti-inflammatory properties. They're also high in the antioxidant quercetin, which accounts for the reputation onions have for disease prevention. Luckily, cooking the majestic onions in soup doesn't reduce their quercetin value as it simply transfers to the beautiful, flavorful broth.

The reason I like this soothing and delicious soup so well is that it supports a diverse local economy, and its frugality respects people on the land. The red onions, the butter, the beef stock, the herbs, the dry red wine, the crusty, hardy, rye bread with the

whitecap of melted Swiss cheese encompassed in the handmade ceramic crock all pay homage to farmers and craftspeople.

As the second half heats up, the hot crocks come out from under the broiler and one must navigate around the stick-to-your-spoon cheese and bread roof to gain access to the deep, rich broth. It's like a game within a game, albeit without the competition, as everyone is a winner who dunks their way into every victorious mouthful.

The only thing better than having your team win is slipping off to slumber and waking up to another game and another crock of French onion soup.

I 've been around sewing since I was a child. I come from working class and farm stock - being able to sew was a part of life for my grandmothers, great-aunts and beyond, as


it was for so many others of a bygone era.




