Keeping the Mohawk Valley Beautiful

At a joint news conference on April 4 with area elected officials, business leaders and community organizations, Keep Mohawk Valley Beautiful (KMVB) announced that it's launching the "21st Annual Clean & Green Initiative" on April 23.

KMVB is a standing committee of the Mohawk Valley Economic Development District Inc. (MVEDD), and a six-county NYS affiliate of the national Keep America Beautiful (KAB) program.

KAB works to create sustainable communities that are socially connected, environmentally healthy and economically sound and their annual clean-up effort is part the country's largest community improvement program. Each spring, KAB affiliates, like KMVB, engage more than four million volunteers in more than 20,000 communities nationwide.

This year, KMVB is asking individuals, businesses, organizations and community groups to register cleanup or beautification events – new or existing – in the Mohawk Valley region. The goal this year is to register 300 (or more) teams.

Family Counseling Center offers advice on how to speak to children about war in Ukraine

We are now one month into the Russian invasion of Ukraine and the news, images, and stories have been overwhelming - for adults and children. The Family Counseling Center of Fulton County recently spoke with a few members of their Behavioral Health Clinic to learn more about how to best help children process everything they are seeing on the news.

1. Acknowledge and Monitor

Children of all ages have access to images, news, and reports across a broad spectrum of platforms these days - some of which parents may not even be aware of. Parents should know the platforms their children are using and set parent controls or limits for use with their child if necessary.

Acknowledging how anxiety can present is important too. A child may have excessive questions about the events they see on television and on social media. Are they more irritable? Avoiding things they once enjoyed such as television or the computer because they do not want to be around the news? Have there been changes in your child's appetite or sleep?


"We have had so much happen to us over the last few years that it feels as if, at times, we can become desensitized to international crises," notes Michelle Clark, Interim Clinic Director. "The parent may not be feeling anxious and therefore may not even consider filtering their discussions without realizing that their child is anxious."

"Sitting down with your child and having a tough conversation about the war isn't easy, but it will help an anxious child know that they are safe and able to get out their worries and concerns," says Clark. Clark suggest acknowledging the danger people in Ukraine are facing and why, perhaps, they are fleeing the country while also concentrating on how your child is safe and protected at home. "Your child may be anxious because they want to help in some way. This is a great opportunity to find a creative and proactive option so that they feel as if they can contribute."

Clark adds, "It's important too to monitor our needs

as parents. Are we anxious as well? Do we have supports to prevent our anxiety from spilling over?"

Driving habits that could help the planet

Habits can be hard to kick. Many people need a unique catalyst in order to ditch habits they've long wanted to put in their rearview mirrors.

Increased awareness of climate change and its effects could be the catalyst many people need to make positive, planet-friendly changes to their daily routines.

Driving habits are one area where individuals can

alter their daily routines in ways that benefit the planet. These eco-friendly alterations can be instituted each day by individuals who want to do their part to combat climate change.

• Avoid aggressive driving. Aggressive driving is both a safety risk and a threat to the environment. According to the Oak Ridge National Laboratory, aggressive driving can lower gas mileage in light-duty vehicles by as much as 40 percent in stop-and-go traffic and by as much as 30 percent at highway speeds.

• Avoid idling. Many drivers have long relied on idling to warm up their vehicles on cold mornings. However, the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control notes that modern vehicles do not need warming up in temperatures above 0 degrees Fahrenheit. It's important that drivers recognize this, as idling wastes fuel and increases the amount of vehicle exhaust in the air. Vehicle exhaust increases air pollution and contains pollutants that have been linked to asthma, additional lung diseases and heart disease. A far more effective, and considerably less harmful, way to warm up a vehicle is to do so for 30 seconds and then drive slowly for the first few minutes.

- Purchase a fuel-efficient vehicle. Drivers looking for their next vehicle can prioritize fuel efficiency if they want their driving habits to have a smaller carbon footprint. The Department of Energy and the EPA provide information on fuel efficient vehicles, and that information can be accessed at Fueleconomy.gov. In addition, the EPA's Green Vehicle Guide notes that electric vehicles, plug-in hybrids, hydrogen fuel cell vehicles, and cleaner burning gasoline vehicles are among the more efficient and less polluting cars and trucks on the market.
- Make fewer trips. The Fremont Green Challenge reports that more than half of all driving trips in the United States are taken for social, recreational, shopping, or family/personal errands. By combining these trips, drivers can greatly reduce their driving miles. Fewer trips conserves fuel and can reduce air pollution.

A few simple tweaks to drivers' daily habits can benefit the planet in myriad ways.

2. Help kids list what they can control and what they can't

Stacey Kozak, a therapist at The Family Counseling Center's Behavioral Health Clinic suggests that parents help children create a list of what they can and cannot control as a way to cope with the anxiety. The exercise is as simple as taking a piece of paper and drawing two circles - one small and a larger one around it. In the larger circle, list the worries they have and cannot control; in the smaller circle list the worries they can control, always remembering to keep the lists age appropriate. "With smaller children you can use the comparison of - you cannot control the weather but you can control putting on the purple socks that make you feel happy," comments Kozak. Other examples include the idea that you may not be able to control the destruction of a family's home (images we see daily) but you can work to help collect items for refugees therefore experiencing a positive action of helping.

3. Create an inventory of coping skills that work best for your child

Coping skills are methods individuals develop in order to deal with stressful situations. Kozak recommends that coping skills should hold a child's interest, be developmentally appropriate, and also be transferrable therefore not attached to electronics. "You want to be able to implement coping skills in any kind of environment. Video games or a few moments on a tablet cannot be used at school, so low-tech options are best."

The inventory of coping skills you develop with your child should hold their interest and create an opportunity for them to ground their emotions and reconnect to the moment. Some examples include:

- Getting out in nature to take a walk or to play
- Spending time with a pet
- Taking deep breaths and concentrating on how it

feels to fill your lungs with air and then let it out

- Listen to music
- Sit in a quiet place and list things you see
- Journaling

Recognizing that this time is hard for everyone is an important first step. We have had three years of pandemic life and are now pivoting to a humanitarian crisis that is instantly reported on via social media platforms. Everyone, including our children, are all being exposed to graphic images that show the carnage of war. Taking the time to acknowledge our fear and confusion, talking to our children about their fears and worries are important first steps to helping them process this important moment in history.







said Wendy Richardson, 4-H program educator for CCE of Herkimer County. "I hope that they continue to care about what's going on around them."

The CCE 4-H Government Intern program takes place each spring and fall and is open each session to up to four

students per school district from any school in the Herkimer County region. The spring 2022 session wrapped up on March 29 with a luncheon at the Herkimer County Office Building and the simulated Herkimer County Legislature meeting in the legislative chambers.

Three of the students in the program were Poland Central School District seniors: Nathan Draper, Adam Nellis and Gabrielle Ross. The others were Mount Markham Central School District senior Kestrel Zimpel, Richfield Springs Central School District junior Emily Diotte and Central Valley Central School District senior Brianna Holtz, who attends the Herkimer-Ful-

ton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Valley Pathways in Technology Early College High School (VP-TECH).

The simulated meeting

During the simulated Herkimer County Legislature meeting, Draper served as the legislature chairman, Nellis acted as the vice-chairman and Ross, Zimpel, Diotte and Holtz took on the role of legislators.

All of the students participated in a presentation of their proposed plan to turn a local building into a childcare center. The students discussed funding, renovations, staffing, the timeline, community benefits and more. They then read the resolution and took a

simulated roll call vote to approve the plan.

Students then thanked Herkimer County legislators, their teachers, parents, chaperones and others. Herkimer County Administrator James Wallace and Herkimer County Legislator Peter Mano were in attendance for the meeting.

"You kids did a good job," Mano said, after the presentation, before he and Richardson presented students with certificates.

Mano said they didn't have a program like this when he was in school.

"I wish they did," he said. "I had to learn the hard way coming up. It's a good program."

Wallace told the students that in his more than 40 years with the

county government, they put on one of the best presentations he has seen from this program and had the best grasp of the issue he has seen.

"Great job," Wallace said.

The students

Near the end of the simulated meeting, Nellis said he had questioned whether he wanted to join the program but was glad he did.

"It proved to be extremely valuable and extremely informative," he said.

Nellis said visiting the Herkimer County Office Building during the day allowed students to see people during their workday.

"The program really gave a good view of how the government works and what it would be like if you worked for the county," he said.

Draper said he enjoyed the opportunity to learn from the county legislators.

"I think that meeting the legislators and getting their perspective and point of view about how government works was the best part of the program," he said.

Ross said she appreciated the chance to learn about the local government and about internship and job opportunities that could be available if students want to take their careers in that direction.

"I really liked that," she said.

Zimpel also found the program insightful.

"I thought it was very interesting learning about how the legislators in our community impact the taxes that we pay, and it was also interesting learning how the pandemic directly impacted our community," Zimpel said.

Diotte said she was thankful that an exception was made to allow her to participate in the program as a junior, and she liked finding out more about local government.

"This gave me the opportunity to learn about things that impact me that I wouldn't have other-

wise known impacted me," she said.

Holtz said she expects she will be able to apply aspects of what she learned during the program to both school government and academics.

"I think the most valuable part for me was I learned a lot about local government that I can bring back to my home school," she said.

The program

The CCE 4-H Government Intern program has been going in Herkimer County since the late 1990s and is one of only four such programs in the state still operating through 4-H, said Richardson, who has been with the program for 11 years.


It has been nice this spring to have a more normal program, Richardson said. When COVID-19 caused schools to close to in-person instruction in March 2020, the spring program had to end for that school year. Then for the next sessions, Richardson recorded video interviews to share with school social studies teachers in place of having the program. In fall 2021, the program resumed, but students were still wearing masks and had to deal with COVID-19 quarantines.


Students meet four times during the program, have a one-on-one interview with a county legislator, attend at least one Herkimer County Legislature meeting and are introduced to potential future internship and job opportunities, Richardson said.

At the end of April, students from the fall and spring will travel to Albany to visit with local state representatives and could be recognized on the floor if state legislators are in session, Richardson said.

Students were also recognized during the Herkimer County Legislature meeting they attended. Legislators were helpful and stopped and explained the process of their meeting to students, Richardson said.

"They've been great supporters," she said.



In honor of Earth Day, make sure you're disposing of medications properly

(BPT) - Did you know that in 2019 up to 200 pharmaceuticals were detected in the surface water, ground water and drinking water in the U.S., according to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development? While 61% of Americans are concerned about flushed painkillers polluting drinking water and public waterways, 1 out of 4 admit to flushing leftover prescriptions down the drain, and another 25% reported throwing unused medications in the trash, according

Dear Paw's Corner: I recently read an article about a predatory lender that is targeting people buying dogs at some pet stores. These loans have insane interest rates as high as 130% to 189%! Please warn your readers to avoid taking out high-interest loans to buy a new pet. So many pets are in shelters, waiting for their forever homes. Don't buy from a puppy mill! - Janie F., Sarasota. Dear Janie: Thank you for sounding the alarm! A recent CBS News report warned about a lending business called EasyPay Finance that charges huge interest rates. Find the article here: tinyurl. com/26b8mdcz/

Predatory loans and pet stores that source from puppy mills are a nasty storm of awfulness. Often, puppy mill dogs arrive at the store in poor condition, and new owners who've just paid thousands of dollars to buy a dog now have to shell out thousands more for medical care.

The message here is clear: Don't take out a high-interest loan to buy a pet. If you spend time researching the perfect dog for your family, then you should also spend time studying the financial aspects of dog ownership.

Do business with reputable breeders - you should be able to visit the breeder and see the conditions your prospective pet lives in, meet the puppies and their mother, and discuss their care. Good breeders care about their dogs' welfare. If you're going to pay thousands of dollars for a pet, choose this route.

Shelter pets are another option. If you aren't breed-specific but want a wonderful companion, contact the local shelter. Adoption fees are a few hundred dollars, but that is significantly less than what puppy mills are charging. And you'll get a healthy dog that's ready for a new family. It's a win-win.

- Invest in solar paneling for your home or business


- Support legislation that aims to safely integrate renewable energy sources like wind and solar





Now Here's A Tip

by JoAnn Derson

- A garden manicure is what my mother calls it: When working with plants and dirt, rake your nails across a bar of soap. The soap prevents dirt particles from lodging under nails, and the soap washes away easily when you are finished. Happy Gardening! JoAnn
- "If you have a spade with a long handle, you can transfer common measurements to the handle. Just lay a tape measure alongside the handle, and use a black marker to note common spacing, like feet and inches. Then, when you put in plants, you can check quickly whether they are spaced correctly. Very handy!" P.E. in Arkansas
- "Garden tool storage doesn't have to be hard. Fill a wide mouth bucket with clean sand. Add a half quart or motor oil and stir. Then use the sand to clean and store your garden tools like shovels, rakes or hoes. The

sand/oil mixture helps clean the metal surfaces, and the heaviness of the container lets you stick them in the sand without fear of everything falling down, like it would if you leaned them along a wall." - E. in North Carolina

- Here's a recipe for a quickie bird feeder or bath: Flip over a nice-size flower pot, and place the pot's tray on the top. Fill with seed or water. The birds will thank you maybe even by eating some nuisance bugs along with the seed.
- If the string on your trimmer is always breaking or jamming, try this old trick: Give the coiled string a spray with vegetable oil before you thread it. It lubricates the line, making it less likely to pull and less likely to break.


Historian to present **Clinton Liberal Institute** program on April 20

To Your Good Health

Her Lack of Perspiration Has

Reader in a Sweat

Dear Dr. Roach: I am an elderly woman who has never perspired and would like to know why. Heat makes me very sick. I love the outdoors, but can be out only a short while in the warmer weather. No one seems to have an answer for me. - P.M.

Answer: The name for the condition of no sweating at all is anhidrosis, and there are several causes. There are rare conditions people are born with. These are a possibility, since you have never perspired. However, nearly all of these rare diseases have other significant symptoms you don't mention.

Damage to sweat glands can be seen in autoimmune diseases and diseases that can destroy sweat glands. None of these is likely, as they too have additional symptoms you would have identified during your life. Likewise, you don't mention medications, which may have lack of sweating as a side effect.

I suspect you don't have a diagnosable disease but rather that you are on the far end of the normal range for sweating - this would be called hypohidrosis. Just as there are people who get drenched with sweat in mildly warm weather, there are some who sweat very little.

Since sweating is a major way of keeping cool, you are at higher risk for heat injury, including heatstroke. Avoiding hot weather, as it sounds like you've done, is wise. Sun protection e.g., wearing a wide-brimmed hat - is also wise, as is making sure you have enough fluids. Avoiding excess heat becomes even more important as you get older, since an older person has less ability to adapt to heat than a younger person.

Dear Dr. Roach: I have had excessive sweating for the past few years. I don't mean underarms; I mean head and face. In warmer weather, my hair

will be soaking wet in no time. My doctor thinks it's related to the anxiety syndrome I have had since I was a small child, and prescribed nortriptyline 10 mg once daily. When I looked it up, I thought it might be a little dangerous for me. I am 79 years old.

I am very healthy otherwise. I hope you can help. It's a horrible problem, and it ruins my summers. - J.H.

Answer: We use the Greek terminology to define this problem: primary focal hyperhidrosis, specifically craniofacial hyperhidrosis. "Primary" because it isn't associated with any other known problem; "focal" because it is in one area; "craniofacial" meaning "head and face"; and "hyperhidrosis" just means "too much sweat." The underlying cause is unknown, but your doctor might be right that anxiety is playing a role. However, it may run in families.

I disagree with nortriptyline in most people. Not only is it not a good treatment for anxiety, it may have excess sweating as a side effect, but the very low dose makes that unlikely. Doses for depression are often 300 mg.

The usual first treatment is topical antiperspirants to the affected areas. If over-the-counter treatments don't work, then prescription strength (20%) aluminum chloride hexahydrate can be tried, although it can be irritating to the skin of the face in some people. Other treatments include a different topical treatment called glycopyrrolate, botulinum toxin (Botox) injection and oral medications like oxybutynin. In people in their 70s and 80s I try not to use the oral agents.





of seeds (or two or three) to start indoors. With a few basic supplies, by the time the weather is suitable for planting outside, you'll have some home-grown additions ready for your garden.


The seed packet provides information on when to plant seeds for an early start on the gardening season. Usually it will suggest a number of weeks before the anticipated last


