According to the U.S. Fire Administration, the cause of about 5,700 grill fires on residential properties each year is malfunctioning gas grills.

"Grilling is a timeless warm weather activity many enjoy and look forward to," said Scott DeNoon, senior farm product and underwriting manager for Virginia Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Co. "However, an open flame and the use of gas can create numerous dangers for both the user and their property. That's why it's important to ensure you're using your grill properly and are following safe practices.'

To help homeowners and renters avoid sparking grill-related fires, the Insurance Information Institute recommends they thoroughly inspect their grills before each use.

These inspections should include a check of grill hoses to ensure there are no cracks, holes or

brittleness, and that there are no gas leaks. Leaks can be checked by using a soap and water solution that will bubble at points where gas could escape.

Additionally, grills should be cleared of any debris or food buildup that may have accumulated from previous uses. Grills also should be covered once sufficiently cooled to help protect parts from weather, environmental debris and insects.

Barbecues should be operated on level surfaces, at least 10 feet away from structures and landscaping such as trees and shrubs. Vinyl siding and wooden decks are especially vulnerable to catching fire, so use extreme caution when grilling in their general vicinity.

Never move a barbecue once it's lit, and be sure to grill in a well-ventilated area to avoid carbon monoxide exposure.

When grilling with charcoal, use only starter fluids designed for grills. Limit the amount of fluid to avoid flash fires, and never use gasoline to start a grill.

Grill users should protect themselves by wearing a heavy apron and oven mitts that reach over their forearms. Never grill near others, and keep children and pets away from the grilling area.

Lastly, keep a fire extinguisher, hose or bucket of water nearby. And, should a fire occur that cannot be controlled by a fire extinguisher, call 911 and treat any injuries immediately with a first aid kit.

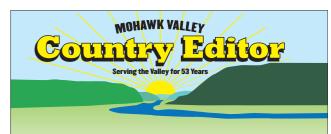
All cats, dogs and ferrets three months or older must be vaccinated even if they stay indoors. Every dog and cat need two rabies vaccinations one year apart, then one every three years. Ferrets must be vaccinated every year. Bring the pet's rabies vaccination history to receive a three-year certificate. Dogs should be on a leash. Cats and ferrets should be in a carrier or pillowcase. No vet exams will be given. A \$5 donation per pet is suggested to defray costs.

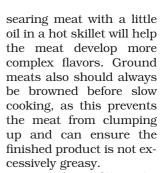


Slow cooking is a popular way to prepare hearty meals. Slowly cooked stews can make for the perfect meal on chilly days. In addition to helping craft meals that stick to your ribs, slow cookers fill a home with enticing aromas all day long, and that can make everyone hungrier and more eager to try the finished product by dinnertime.

Slow cooking aromas wafting through the air heighten anticipation, and cooks can exceed expectations by employing a few strategies to increase flavor.

• Let fat do the flavoring: Fatty cuts of meat fare best in slow cookers, as the excess fat ensures the meat won't dry out. The thought of flavoring with fat may not appeal to everyone, and those who prefer lean cuts will likely have to shorten the cooking time and add more liquid than the recipe calls for to ensure the meat doesn't dry out before it makes it to the dinner table.

• Brown the meat: Slow cooking experts tout the importance of browning meat prior to placing it in the slow cooker. According to AllRecipes.com,



• Avoid overfilling the cooker: Foods cook differently when the cooker is too full. In such instances, the dish may end up tasting more like steamed food than simmered food. That's especially so when too much liquid has been placed in the cooker. In such instances, steam hits the lid of the cooker and creates condensation. which then drips back into the pot. That can make everything inside more soggy and less tender. The owner's manual of the slow cooker may recommend how much to fill it, but it's generally best to fill the cooker somewhere between halfway and twothirds of its capacity.

• Cut ingredients evenly: Uniformity of flavor is a goal when slow cooking, as slow cooked meals tend to be served when hosting a crowd and cooks will want everyone's meal to boast the same amount of flavor. One way to ensure that is to make sure ingredients are cut evenly. Evenly cut carrots and potatoes will finish cooking at the same time, ensuring everyone's meal will benefit from the same flavor profile.

Slow cooking is simple, but veteran slow cookers know that a few simple tricks can make meals that much more flavorful.

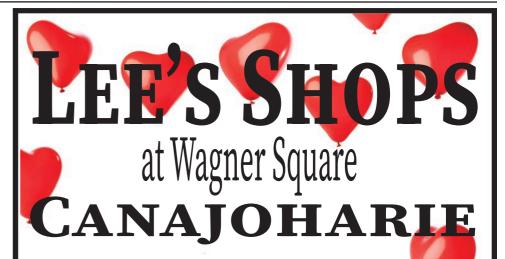

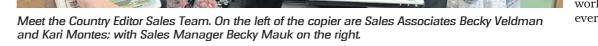

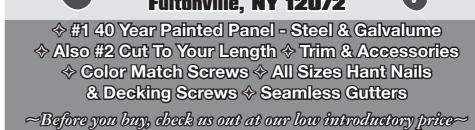

their families right where they are right now. And for that, we are incredibly grateful, so thank you very much."

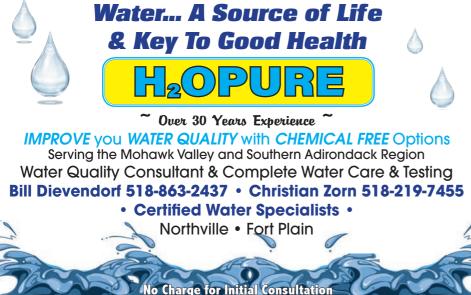

Bulger spoke to Annual Meeting attendees after receiving the award and said Matthews was essential to the partnership and the creation of the Academics Re-imagined Connecting Healing, Education and Supports program (ARCHES).

"If it wasn't for Roberta's vision for something like this we wouldn't be touching as many lives as we are now with the ARCHES program here at Herkimer BOCES," Bulger said.

wood, Herkimer BOCES Board of Education members and Herkimer BOCES component school district superintendents and board members.

"At the end of the day, it's about the kids and the families, and if we can give them a chance to be successful in school, that's going to have transformational effects for generations," Bulger said. "So our hats are off to you as the board and all of your component districts for believing in this collaboration that is now six years old, and that's crazy to say. So thank you for believing in us, and most importantly believing in the kids that make ARCHES and these services possible."

The Partnership

Students in the region who need the most help with intense emotional and behavioral management are now getting it. An assortment of additional student supports are now integrated into various Herkimer BOCES programs.

ICAN, formerly known as Kids Oneida, has expanded its school-based division, increased its ability to directly assist the Herkimer County community and established a building in Herkimer.

All of this and more has come from the partnership formed several years ago between Herkimer BOCES and ICAN and is why ICAN won the 2022 Community Partnership Award.

"From the perspective of the BOCES with the population we serve, I think it's pretty easy to reach the conclusion that the standard of living in Herkimer County is better because of ICAN's role." Herkimer BOCES Pathways Academy Principal Patrick Corrigan said. "It's very easy to see how they impact the community, and living in Herkimer County would be different, negatively, if we didn't have ICAN in the community. They are really looking out for people their needs.'

families to grow both academically and socially

"They've been a consistent, supportive partner," Matthews said. "They are always willing to work with us. We call them several times a week and describe a need, and they're on it. It's just a wonderful resource for our BOCES. And we use it."

ICAN operates 21 programs across six counties and works with more than 2,000 families every day, Bulger said.

"We like to say that we're an innovative home and community-based provider of intensive family services, and those services that we provide range all the way prenatally through end of life,' Bulger said. "Everything that we do as an agency is geared toward keeping families together, so we want to provide the right services at the right time to ensure that children can stay in their community, their home and their school. We'll always go above and beyond to make sure we can meet that vision."

The Need Was There

The first cooperation among ICAN and schools in the Herkimer BOCES region started when some schools were having difficulty finding teacher aides. ICAN staff stepped in and conducted teacher aide work at schools, Bulger said.

ICAN officials and educators in the region also recognized that something new was needed to fill the void that had existed since the state closed day treatment facilities in New Hartford and Verona in 2009. These facilities were for

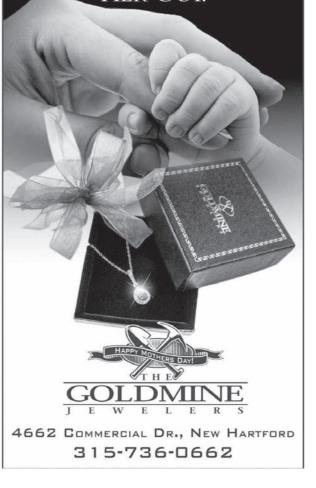

glucose control in people with diabetes, and it lowers the risk of cancer, improves bone health and can promote digestive regularity.

There are three types of spinach (savoy spinach, flat spinach and semi-savoy spinach), all of which can be eaten cooked or raw.

And it's fairly easy to grow - even over winter, said Tim McDermott, an educator with Ohio State University Extension. OSU Extension is the outreach arm of the Ohio State University College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences (CFAES).

"If you want to grow spinach over winter, you can plant it in

October by first preparing the soil, broadcasting the seed and lightly covering it with soil, and watering it," he said. "Then, cover the cold-hardy vegetable with season-extension row covers. Protected under the cover, the spinach will germinate in a week or two and slowly grow over winter. Harvest can start when temperatures go over 45°."

McDermott, who runs the Growing Franklin food production blog, recently posted a video that he and fellow OSU Extension educator Jenny Lobb produced on how to make spinach into a crunchy, healthy salad that both

local students with intense emotional and behavioral management needs. The facilities had provided mental health, psychiatric and therapy support all in one location and did as best as they could, Bulger said. But they weren't as therapeutic or nimble as they could have been and had a number of restraints and often placed students in seclusion, he said.

The program started in September 2016 at Herkimer BOCES with one class and two students. It has now grown to four classes and 24 students - with two classes at the Herkimer BOCES WEB

Complex and two at the Pathways Academy. ARCHES currently serves students in grades 4 - 11. A fifth class is expected to be added next school year.

Bulger reflected on ARCHES' growth. "The need was there - just desperately needed," Bulger said. "And for it to evolve into what it is right now and what Herkimer BOCES has taken it to is just even beyond what we had thought that it could have been. It's just amazing to see all the services and things that are pushed in - the social-emotional needs being met by BOCES, by the schools, to really meet the kids where they're at.

kids and adults can enjoy. The video demonstrates harvesting freshly grown spinach leaves and mixing them with fresh strawberries, crumbled goat cheese, slivered almonds, balsamic vinegar and olive oil to create a sweet, healthy, light, fresh salad.

"Spinach goes well with fresh strawberries," Lobb said. "Spinach is also very versatile. It can be added to your favorite pasta, soup or casserole, or sauteed in olive oil and seasonings. Spinach can also be added to a wrap, sandwich, or flatbread or cooked in an omelet or even added to a smoothie to give it added healthy benefits." There are risks, however, for those

who are taking blood thinners such as Coumadin, also known as warfarin. This is because foods that contain vitamin K, such as spinach, play a large role in blood clotting.

What to know before planting around your property

When planning a landscape, it's tempting to pick the most colorful, vibrant plants. An eye-popping property filled with yellows, purples, pinks, and other bold colors is sure to catch anyone's eye. However, the right plant for a property is not always the most colorful.

Gardening novices can easily be overwhelmed on a trip to their local garden center, where employees may ask a host of questions that have little to do with homeowners' preferences and everything to do with the growing conditions around their properties. Those questions may seem a little intense, but they're well-intentioned. Successful gardening is more about soil conditions and access to sunlight than it is about the plants themselves. An awe-inspiring hydrangea bush will only impress if it's planted in a location where it can thrive.

The Landscape, Nursery and Urban Forestry program at UMass Amherst Extension advises homeowners to learn about the following site conditions, and ultimately share that knowledge with local garden center representatives, before they pick and plant anything around their properties.

• Hardiness zone: The Plant Hardiness Zone Map from the USDA is designed to help gardeners determine which plants are most likely to thrive where they live. The map can be found at usda.gov.

• Light availability, intensity and duration, from full sun to deep shade: Prior to planting, homeown-

ers can document this information in a notebook or on their smartphones. Do so for a long enough period of time that you can get an accurate of idea of the conditions in which plants will have to grow, and then take that information with you to the garden center where you will buy your plants. Employees can then use this info to help you find the right fit given the light conditions.

• Exposure to wind and temperature extremes.

• Exposure to weather events, snow loads, erosion and flooding: Garden center employees can likely recommend plants based on traditional weather patterns in a given area.

• Soil type, drainage and compaction: Homeowners can take note of any areas of their property where water pools or the ground feels especially soggy after rainfall. Share this information with garden center employees prior to picking plants for such areas. If soil appears compacted, aeration prior to planting may be necessary.

• Competition from existing vegetation, keeping in mind the roots underground that you can't see.

• Above ground wires or obstructions: Trees will grow up, and the presence of power lines or other obstructions may threaten the trees or prove dangerous if trees eventually grow into or hang over power lines.

Knowledge of various conditions prior to planting can save homeowners the cost of replacing plants

To Your Good Health

There's No Magic Bullet to Put Belly Fat in Check

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a 70-year-old woman, mostly healthy (apart from well-controlled high blood pressure). Looking at me, people assume I am skinny, but I have a well-concealed HUGE belly along with my thin arms and legs. I look like an olive stuck with toothpicks. My diet is healthy for the most part: I eat snack foods, deep-fried fast foods or sweets only rarely. I have read about how to eliminate belly fat, but there is so much contradictory info, each claiming to be the best. What are truly effective ways to help eliminate belly fat? -M.H.s

Answer: First, I would want to be sure what you have really is belly fat. While there are men (and a few women) who have that body shape due to fat, I have seen far too many cases of liver disease (where the abdominal cavity is filled with fluid due to high pressure in the liver) and ovarian cancer (where the abdomen is filled with fluid due to tumor). I would want to be sure you had been evaluated for these (and other) concerns, especially if this is a change in your normal body shape.

If it is abdominal fat, there is no magic diet. What works for someone else (even your twin sister, if you had one) might not work for you. For this reason, one single type of diet does not fit all. It may take patience and trying several different options before finding what works for you.

General advice includes avoiding the foods you noted you eat sparingly. Eat lots of vegetables and whole grains with fiber; modest amounts of fruits; several servings of nuts and fish weekly; and no more than modest amounts of meats. Advice from an expert in weight management may be of great benefit.

Types of retirement accounts

The ability to retire with financial security is a goal for millions of people across the globe. Though people may stop working in retirement, many of their existing bills, and even some new ones, will still need to be paid. Retirement is



often imagined as a time of unbridled financial freedom, but that's only possible when individuals, including young professionals, prioritize planning for the day when they call it quits.

Retirement accounts and plans are a popular way to save for life after working. Individuals have various retirement plan options at their disposal, and each is unique in its own way.

Individual Retirement Account (IRA)

An IRA is a tax-advantaged way to save for retirement. Anyone with earned income can open an IRA. Money deposited into an IRA cannot be withdrawn prior to account holders reaching 59.5 years of age without incurring a steep tax penalty of 10%. There are limits to how much individuals can deposit into an IRA. The IRS notes that the deposit limit for all IRA accounts in 2021 was \$6,000 (\$7,000 for account holders age 50 and over). In addition, there are different types of IRAs, including traditional IRAs, Roth IRAs, Payroll Deduction IRAs and SIMPLE IRAs. Each has its rules regarding taxes, eligibility and withdrawals and individuals are urged to discuss which type of IRA is best for them with a financial professional.

401(k)

A 401(k) is another tax-advantaged retirement account typically offered through an employer, though self-employed individuals can enroll in a Solo 401(k) plan. When enrolled in a 401(k) plan, employees will have a portion of each paycheck direct deposited into a long-term investment account. Contributions to a 401(k) are made pre-tax, which saves account holders a considerable sum of money so long as they continue to make contributions. One significant advantage to 401(k) plans is that many employers will match contributions up to a certain percentage. For example, some may match up to 2%, so employees who contribute 2% or more will actually be depositing no less than 4% of their income each week into their 401(k) accounts. Perhaps most beneficial is that employer matches do not count toward the annual 401(k) contribution limits, which the IRS notes were \$19,500 in 2021.

Simplified Employee Pension (SEP) Plan

An SEP plan is typically established by a small business owner or self-employed individual. However, small business owners can set them up for their employees as well. Contributions to an SEP will reduce taxable income, and the money will grow tax-deferred. Individuals enrolled in an SEP will only pay taxes on the money upon withdrawal. One of the advantages to an SEP is it has significantly higher contribution limits, which the IRS notes were \$58,000 or 25% of the employee's compensation, whichever was lower, in 2021. However, SEPs are employer contribution only, so they rely a lot on employers' available cash.

No retirement accounts are the same. Individuals are urged to conduct their own research and choose the plan that best suits their needs.

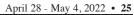

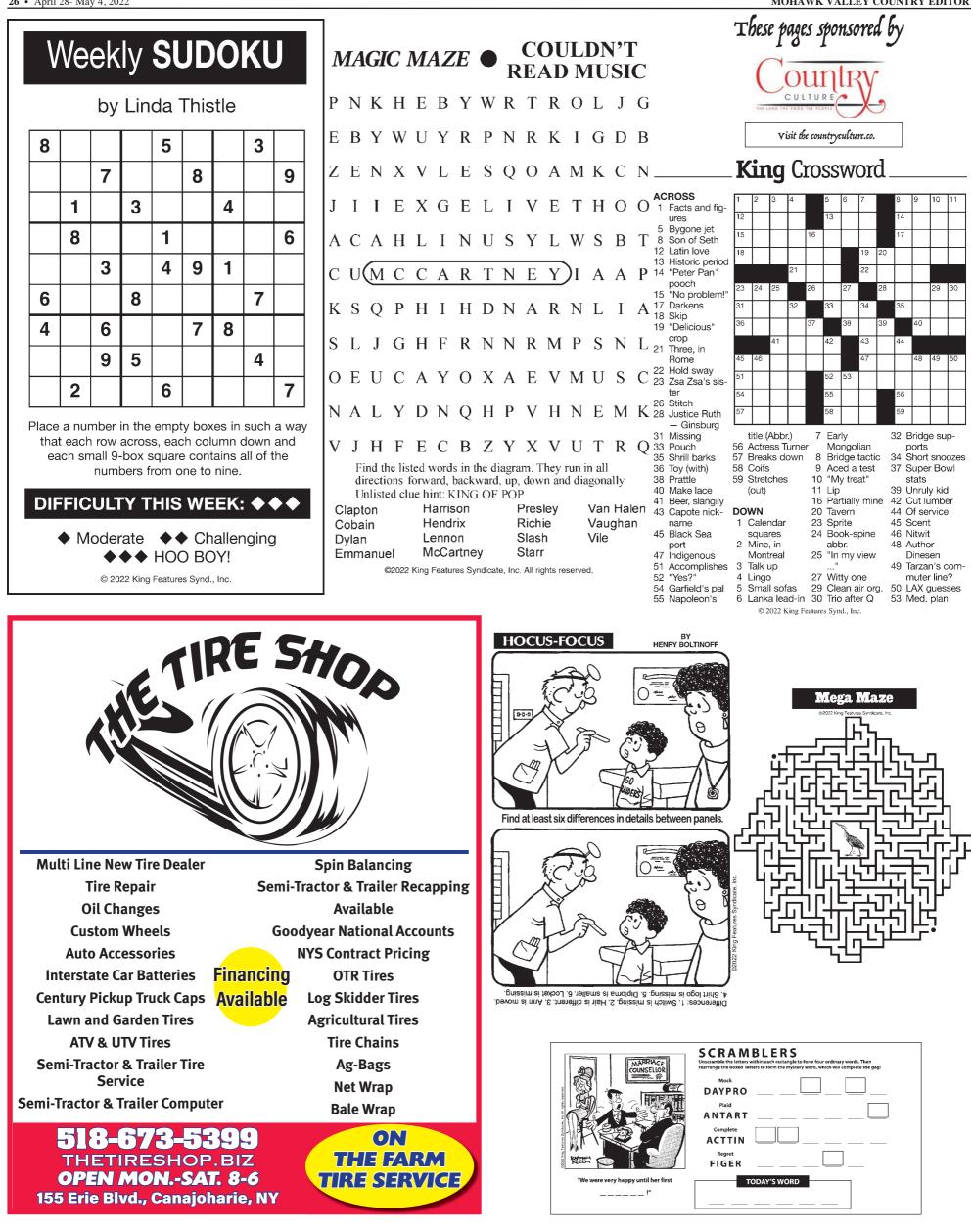

s April focuses on gardening with kids, it makes me think about the fun my sisters and I have with houseplants and perennials. I come from a long line of gardeners, some from necessity, some for the beauty and healing qualities of gardening.

My maternal grandmother was an avid gardener and had a split rail fence with beautiful dark pink climbing roses covering it. She also had a large rock garden on the side of her house as well as houseplants in her living room. Through the years she shared plants with cousins and siblings.

While not an outdoor gardener, my mother loved houseplants (as the second oldest of seven children she did a lot of weeding in the veggie garden and never wanted one of her own)

and had many that were quite interesting to me. One I just loved she called the Baby Dropper (a.k.a. Mother of Thousands), a succulent that reproduced by growing "babies" on the edges of their leaves. We had so many of these because who can throw out a living plant? She also had hoyas, peperomias and piggyback plants, which were also great reproducers, growing small plants in the middle of the leaf.

As I became more interested in houseplants, Mom and I would scour the stores to see what new plants they had. We would grow and propagate them to share with others. What a feeling it is to take a cutting and make a whole new plant!

time off, and we can listen to music or work a crossword puzzle or turn on the TV and watch the weather guy discuss millibars and troughs.

Soon enough, we'll have to be out there living for others: our bosses, our customers, our animals, our fields. But right now no one needs us except the dog, and she does well on kibbles and an ear rumple.

We can look out the window at the eastern glow and wonder what will happen in the hours until our world turns dark again. People will be born and people will die. People will win honors and people will go to jail. People will create things today that live past them and people will disappear forever. Some people will write about these things and other people will read about these things.

(Kalanchoe daigremontiana) and watching new sprouts appear. These can be planted and the whole process starts again. You may want to make sure you have an outlet for all these plants - it's kind of like zucchini in summer. You'll have neighbors locking their doors so you can't sneak them onto their windowsills. Spider plants (Chlorophytum comosum) also reproduce on their own, with plantlets coming off a long stem. Spider plants are very tolerant of inconsistent growing conditions which make them great plants for youngsters to grow.

If you find your child's interest has been sparked by propagating these plants, you may want to try rooting some cuttings. Some of the easier plants to root are German or Swedish ivy, Christmas or Thanksgiving cactus and Jade plants.

With the ivy, you can either put the cutting in water or directly into soil (direct stick). Choose a stem that has four to five leaves on it. Cut near the base of the plant, close to the node. Remove two to three bottom leaves from the cutting.

If you choose the water method, you'll want to change the water regularly so algae and bacteria don't grow. Once you see the roots appear, you can plant in a pot, being careful not to damage the roots when planting.

For the direct stick method, push the cutting into the soil so at least one or two nodes are covered. Keeping the water moist will keep the cutting from wilting. If it does wilt, you can mist it several times a day or place a clear plastic bag over the whole pot

And then the world will go dark on us again and we'll think about what happened in our tiny portion of this huge moving amalgam and hopefully we'll sleep easily tonight. Then, when we arise tomorrow and head for the coffee pot, we can

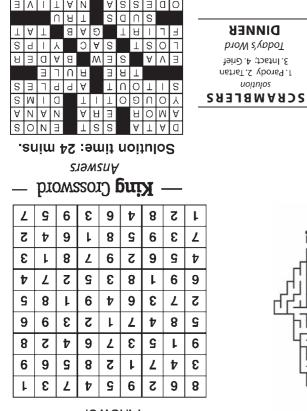

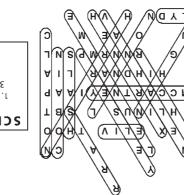

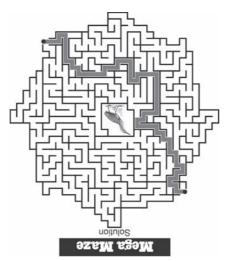
