Most of the time these eye drops are all that is needed, however, in some severe cases they may provide only temporary relief or none at all. If you find yourself at that point, it's time to seek an exam from an eve doctor as further treatment may be required.



Assemblyman Tague announces bill to bring whole milk back to schools

SHARON SPRINGS, NY - For over a decade, schools across the nation have not been able to serve 2% and whole milk in their cafeterias due to a federal mandate. This law was imposed due to the belief that less fat in milk would help to curb childhood obesity; however, new studies suggest the opposite. A 2017 study on full fat milk consumption showed that those who drank whole milk were less likely to be obese. This study pointed to the same findings as a 2013 study of almost 2,000 Swedish men that showed a low consumption of dairy fat was associated with a higher risk of obesity while a high consumption of milk fat was associated with lower rates of obesity.

Since the implementation of the federal law banning 2% and whole milk in public schools, milk consumption has decreased and milk waste has increased.

On May 2 at Ridgedale Farms, New York Assemblyman Chris Tague announced a bill to bring 2% and whole milk produced in New York State back into schools. This announcement was met with enthusiasm from farmers and educators alike. Speakers in support of the bill included NYS Senator George Borrello, Anita Murphy (Capital Region

BOCES district superintendent), Ray Dykeman (Dykeman and Sons Farm), Todd Heyn (manager and training specialist at the County Farm Bureau) and Tonya Van Slyke (Northeast Dairy Producers Association executive director). Also in support of the bill is 97milk. com, founded in 2019, which aims to educate consumers on the true facts of milk by community involvement. Nelson

Troutman, a dairy farmer from Lebanon County, came up with the idea to paint promotional messages about milk on bale boards in his fields. Follow this, a grassroots community made up of 25 dairy farmers and agribusiness professionals came together to create 97milk. com to share real milk facts.

"We should give children the choice," said Borrello about what milk is offered





in schools. He also spoke of the importance of whole milk for both the school-children getting proper nutrition and for the farmers across the Empire State having a stable outlet for their products. "We want to support farmers because they feed us." stated Borrello.

Nutritionist Toni Amidore pointed out that whole milk contains nutrients vital for children to grow and thrive, noting, "Three of the most under-consumed nutrients are found in whole milk" (those being calcium, vitamin D and potassium). Amidore also pointed out that the fat in milk is good and part of an overall healthy diet.

Ray Dykeman of Dykeman and Sons Farm said, "Milk is nature's perfect beverage." He noted that vitamins and nutrients found naturally in milk are beyond compare to many other drinks offered in schools. Dykeman also brought to light the importance of agriculture and especially milk production in New York.

Pennsylvania has just passed similar legislation that will bring whole and 2% milk back into the public education system. Tague ended the conference urging people to contact their local representative in support of this bill and to "put whole milk back in our schools."







Health equity in marginalized communities was the focus of a special book club event on April 25 at Herkimer College. Students, faculty and staff participated in a round-table discussion on the book "What the Eyes Don't See – A Story of Crisis, Resistance and Hope in an American City" by Mona Hanna-Attisha. The event, held in person and available virtually, was a celebration of National Library Week, observed April 3 - 9, and School Library Month.

Hanna-Attisha is a pediatrician, professor and public health advocate whose research exposed the Flint, MI, water crisis. Her book is a chronicle of the crisis, which began unfolding in the socio-economically challenged city in 2014.

"This was an event that brought together staff, students and faculty for an informal, educational and inspirational talk on health equity," Herkimer College's Associate Professor of Biology Jennifer Herzog explained. sponsored by the Herkimer County College Foundation, the Herkimer College Library and the Herkimer College Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee.



Are Irresponsible Owners the Bane of Dog Parks?

Dear Paw's Corner: When I first adopted my Collie mix "Sara," I went to the dog park near my apartment every morning. I thought it would be a great place for a year-old puppy to socialize with other dogs and humans. A year later, I no longer take her to the dog park if there are any other dogs there which means taking pre-dawn walks or bypassing the park entirely.

I quickly learned that while many dog owners are responsible people who train and socialize their dogs, others don't train them at all, or train them inadequately. On Sara's first day, a huge dog ran up, snarling and barking at both of us. The dog's owner just sat on a bench, waving and yelling, "He's friendly," while Sara cowered behind my legs. A few days later, that same dog got in a vicious fight with two other

Because we continued to have nega-

tive experiences with other dogs - and their owners, making it impossible to train and socialize Sara, I've stopped going there. I don't think dog parks are a great idea anymore, even though I live in an urban area and green spaces are important for dogs. What's your take? - Hannah J. in Boston

Dear Hannah: I'm really sorry that happened to Sara and you, and you're doing the right thing by taking her at uncrowded times. Overcrowded parks, resource-guarding and aggressively playful dogs can make it a negative experience.

Dog parks are a community resource, and it's important for dog owners to work together to make the park work. Find out if there's a volunteer committee for your particular park. If not, and you want to keep using the dog park, consider forming a group to address behavior and other issues.



Herkimer County Historical Society hosting the Erie Canal Odyssey




A multi-image panel of watercraft using the Erie Canal at Little Falls . All photos by Frank Forte

I have found six glass reusable bottles that can be run through the dishwasher, and I store them in the refrigerator in a cardboard six-pack holder. I still want the convenience of grabbing a bottle of water from the fridge, but I feel better knowing that I'm not contributing to a plastic problem." JoAnn
- Using ice-cold sour cream instead of ice-cold water in your pie crust recipe will give you a flakier crust.
- "If you love to burn candles as much as I do, consider storing them in the refrigerator for a day or so before burning them. I swear, it makes them burn evenly. Someone told me this once, and I tried it and have been doing it ever since. No more crooked candles." J.L. in Tennessee
- When traveling for more than a few days, stick your plants into the bathtub with a little bit of water.

- 2 large (10 to 12 ounces each) onions, thinly sliced
- 1 clove garlic, crushed with press
- 8 ounces cremini mushrooms, thinly sliced
- 4 ounces shiitake mushrooms, stems discarded, thinly sliced

- 3 pounds green beans, trimmed
- 1. Heat covered 7- to 8-quart saucepot of water to boiling on high.
- 2. Meanwhile, in 12-inch skillet, heat oil on medium-high. Add thyme and onions; cook 10 to 12 minutes

or until browned and very tender, stirring occasionally. Stir in garlic and cook 1 minute. Add mushrooms and cook 5 minutes or until tender, stirring occasionally. Stir in 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper. Remove and discard thyme.



To Your Good Health

Cause of Chronic Cough
Has Doctors Stumped
Dear Dr. Roach: I
picked up a cough while
traveling in Europe more

than two years ago. No other symptoms have ever presented. Since that time, I have received every test imaginable, including spirometry, multiple

breathing tests, CT scans, X-rays and most recently a bronchoscopy. Nothing was discovered through any of these tests. Other than the cough, I am very healthy. The cough is driving me crazy, however. I have been prescribed every type of medication, and nothing helps. My doctors are at a standstill and have nothing further to offer. I don't know where to go from here, but I know I can't live my life with this cough. I avoid a lot of personal interaction because it is so disruptive to constantly be coughing. I would greatly appreciate your help with this, and any advice regarding what steps need to be taken next. - P.M.

Answer: Chronic cough (lasting more than several months) is most frequently a result of acid reflux, asthma or postnasal drip, although there are many more causes, including infection, which would be a concern given that you have a clear idea of when it started.

Despite an extensive evaluation for cough, it is not that uncommon that people are left with no explanation but with a persistent cough. There are other, less-common treatments at this point, some of which your doctors might not have tried.

The first is the medication gabapentin (Neurontin). This is used for a condition called laryngeal neuropathy, and I have had a few spectacular cases where the cough disappears entirely. People have written saying that their doctor prescribed the medication for them after reading it in the column and they also had relief, even after decades of persistent coughing, so I think this condition may be more common than I have ever thought.

A second has been a cough suppressant. I am very cautious about using opiate drugs, and it is certainly not appropriate for some people, but cautious use of tramadol in selected patients has been successful in reducing, but not eliminating, cough.

Just yesterday in the clinic, one of the residents I supervise had a patient with chronic cough who had dramatic improvement through the use of speech therapy. Looking it up today, I find trials showing significant improvement, if modest, with this approach, as well

as several ongoing trials. Given the potential side effects of gabapentin and tramadol, I think I will be making more referrals to my speech and language pathology colleagues, and suggest you speak with your doctors about some of these options.

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a postmenopausal woman with osteoporosis. My physician has just prescribed Calcitonin Salmon nasal spray. Is this treatment very effective rebuilding bone mass, and how long does a patient use the drug? Also, are there any serious dangers using this drug? - M.L.

Answer: Calcitonin. usually derived from salmon, is not typically used long term for osteoporosis. Other drugs, such as those in the alendronate (Fosamax) class, are more effective. The Food and Drug Administration advisory panel has recommended its use be limited to less than six months due to concerns about possible increased cancer risks. It also can cause allergic-type reactions, including swelling of the lips and tongue. I seldom see it prescribed anymore outside of short-term use for pain relief in vertebral fractures due to osteoporosis.

Things first-time gardeners need to know

Do you want to enjoy fresh, home-grown veggies this summer? Perhaps you'd like to adorn your home with fresh-cut flowers. Whatever the reason, this year you've decided to start a garden of your own. But before you grab a spade and head for the backyard, put pen to paper and make a plan.

Dream as big as you like, but for this year at least, plan small. Your first garden will be a learning experience. To ensure success, narrow your focus. Trying to do it all is a sure way to become overwhelmed.

Whether you choose to garden in a small plot, a raised bed or a few pots by the back door, gardening success isn't hard to achieve.

First and foremost, like the old saying goes,

it's all about location. Look around your yard at various times of day before you decide where to put your garden. The location needs to provide three things that are key to success: soil, light and water.

If you're gardening in containers or raised beds, you can purchase soil to meet your needs. If you're planning on a more traditional garden plot, choose a location with good soil. Ideally, you'll want soil that's loamy - a balance of clay, silt and sand that retains moisture but drains well and will provide nutrients for your garden.

If you're not sure about your soil, consider a soil test. If your soil is less than ideal (most are), it can be amended, for example, by the addition of compost. A soil test will tell you about your soil's pH and nutrients and make recommendations for amendments and fertilizer. More information on soil testing can be found at the University of Vermont (UVM) Agricultural and Environmental Testing Lab's website (https://pss.uvm.edu/ag_testing).

The location you select should provide full sun for at least six to eight hours a day since most vegetable plants and flowers require that to grow to their fullest potential. And you'll want a convenient source of water nearby. Toting water to the far side of the yard in the summer heat is a sure way to dampen your enthusiasm, resulting in skipped watering and unhappy plants.

Once you've selected

a location and know how much space you have available in your garden, get to know the plants you want to grow. Invest some time in a little research. That tiny tomato plant in its four-inch pot may grow two feet wide and six feet tall or sprawl out to cover several feet of your raised bed. Be sure to give your plants room to grow.


Introduce your plants to the outdoors gradually. "Hardening off" allows them to adjust to conditions in the garden, particularly the sun. Place your plants outside in a semi-shady spot, gradually moving them into direct sun over a week or two.

When planting, water them well. If a support, such as a trellis or tomato cage, will be needed, put it in place at the time of planting. Cover garden soil with mulch to help retain moisture and suppress weeds.

Keep an eye out for pests or signs the plant may be stressed. Be sure plants get adequate water, fertilize as recommended for your particular plant and remove weeds. Before you know it, you'll be enjoying the fruits of your garden.


