The 4th celebrated at Fort Klock



The weather was perfect as hundreds of people enjoyed celebrating Independence Day at Fort Klock. The Declaration of Independence was read by the Chairman of the Board, Bob Metzger, cannons were fired and a musket salute was done

after the raising of the American flag. Strawberry shortcake was the special of the day, along with ice cream donated by Stewart's Shops and many other homemade goodies. Tours of the Fort were conducted by Tyler Sprague and Les Stewart

throughout the day.

One very special moment was the dedication of the plaque honoring Willis 'Skip' Barshied.


In 1953 Skip was just 23 years old when he and a group of 11 other young men who enjoyed old rifles

formed the Tryon County Muzzle Loaders. Looking for a firing range, they learned about Fort Klock, which at the time was vacant and run down. Through an agreement with the owner the group was able to secure a long-term lease and began restoring the Fort. In 1964 Fort Klock Historic Preservation was chartered by the NYS Board of Regents and became a non-profit educational institution.

For over 65 years Skip was a steadfast supporter of Fort Klock and spent many hours working to help make the site what it is today.

Today's Tip: Master Strokes

"Escape Clause"

Long shots from fairy bunkers are tough for most players. Since the ball is lying tight in the sand, there's no cushion, and this leaves little room for error. If you're a weekend warrior who doesn't generate high clubhead speed, it's tough to get the ball up in the air from these lies, risking you not clearing the lip. When sizing up a fairway bunker shot, make sure you take a club with enough loft. Unless your lie is extremely good, select no longer than a 5 iron as your "escape clause," even if that means you can't get the ball all the way to the green. The shorter clubshaft and loft of the 5 iron will give you a better chance to swing in balance and get the ball well up and out, with at least a fighting chance to save par.


Senior Tip - Putt "Young"

We find that a majority of older golfers are

resigned to putting less efficiently than they did in years past. Most think it's a physical problem due to aging. It's more likely to be a psychological problem. Older golfers have a history of many missed putts and the memories of these misses over the years can build up "putting tension." But as a youngster, you didn't agonize as you stood over the ball. You read the putt, trusted your stroke and putted quickly and confidently. Why don't you get back to the youngster in you? Don't dwell on the negative possibilities. Establish a brief, consistent and confident routine, and allow only positive images about the putt at hand. You're going to surprise yourself!


tunes. The event and parking are free, refreshments are available for purchase.

Not Just for Kids Storytelling series returns for 30th year

The Friends of Schoharie Crossing State Historic Site in Fort Hunter are excited to announce that the 30th Annual Not Just for Kids Storytelling series will take place at the Erie Canal historic site this year. Award winning storytellers from the region will perform tales to intrigue, legends to compel and stories that illustrate how we are all connected as human beings. The series is open to the public and is meant for all ages. It runs on Sunday evenings at 6 p.m. from July 31 - Aug. 28 outside the Schoharie Crossing Visitor Center, 129 Schoharie St.

Eileen Mack and Claire Nolan will begin the series on July 31 with a set of stories they call "Blessings of Trees & Earth: Stories Honoring the Natural World." These talented and accomplished tellers are from the Capital Region with years of experience engaging audiences of all ages.

On Aug. 7, Lale Davidson will perform "Folktales and Family Tales: Quaking Bogs, Fairy Queens and Mystery on the High Plains." Davidson comes from a strong line of storytellers, from Kentucky cousins telling family tales around the kitchen table to her mother conjuring Greek gods on camping trips across Europe. corpses through quaking bogs with true family tales of mysterious lights on the high plains in South America, taken from her magical realist novel, "Blue Woman Burning." She'll also tell stories from her collection "Strange Appetites," published by Red Penguin Books.

On Aug. 14, the multi-talented Tim Van Egmond will dazzle the audience with "The Eye of the Beholder," a program of tales about epiphanies of beauty and insight. Have you ever had an experience in which something suddenly raised your awareness and appreciation and it's as if curtains were pulled away or you were seeing with new eyes? Including folktales and a personal tale, these stories have shifts in perspective like this – openings for the mind and the heart that lead to new understanding.

Turtle Clan member of the Onondaga Nation Perry Ground has been telling stories for more than 25 years as a way of educating people about the culture, beliefs and history of the Haudenosaunee (sometimes known as Iroquois) Confederacy. Ground will be at Schoharie Crossing on Aug. 21 with "Stories from the People of the Longhouse." This presentation is filled with traditional Haudenosaunee legends that have been told for hundreds of years. These stories teach about the beliefs, customs and history of the Haudenosaunee people.

Concluding the series will be the Storycrafters on Aug.

28. Barry Marshall and Jeri Burns, Ph.D., have been working together as the Storycrafters since 1991 and have been the recipients of the National Storytelling Network's Circle of Excellence Award. They believe in the time-tested wisdom of traditional stories and share that wisdom with today's audiences. They strive to honor world cultures by telling the old stories in respectful ways, often integrating the musical instruments, songs or dances indigenous to that region. Then, of course, look out for their original modern renditions of the oldest stories – some of their most requested material.

This free series is rain or shine. Bring a lawn chair or blanket to enjoy the outdoor performances. If raining, performances will take place inside the Enders House adjacent to the Visitor Center. Donations are always greatly appreciated and gladly accepted.

The grounds for the site are open all year from sunrise to sunset. Visitor Center hours are Wednesday - Saturday, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. and Sunday 1 - 4 p.m. Group reservations are available for off hours.







Poland Central School District outdoor track and field athletes set a new standard of excellence for the program this school year.

Under the coaching of brothers John and Joel Allen, both varsity teams won the Center State Conference Division 4 league championship, the girls won the Section 3 championship, several students won individual league and sectional championships, multiple school records were broken, six students advanced to the state qualifier meet and ninth grader Maddison Haver finished fifth at the state championships for the 100-meter dash. The school also launched boys and girls modified teams this school year.

On top of all that, the boys' league championship and the girls' sectional championship came down to one race making the experience even more unforgettable.

This was the first time the Poland boys varsity track team won the league championship. It was the third time the girls team won both the league and sectional championships marking three championship seasons out of the last five years - despite not having the opportunity to compete in 2020 due to COVID-19 and having a small team in 2021.

Haver's trip to the state championship is the third time a Poland athlete has reached the state championship - another student participated twice for high jump. Haver's fifth place finish at the state championship is the best finishing position a Poland athlete has had in the history of the track program.

The Final Race

The boys varsity track team never won a league title before scoring 155 points and winning the Center State Conference Division 4 league championship meet on May 17 this year. It was a big jump from their previous league meet point totals of 36 in 2018, 52 in 2019 and 19 in 2021. There

was no league meet in 2020.

That history made this year's competitive league meet even more exciting for the boys on the team - especially when it came down to the final race: a 4x400-meter relay race ran by Gage Smith, Aaron Pope, Zach Gee and Forest Martin. Poland entered the race ahead by a few points.

Poland from 12 - 'If It Can Get

More Exciting'
The girls varsity track team won the league and sectional championship this year for the third time out of the last four possible years. The pandemic cancellation's effects lasted into 2021, when Poland only had nine girls on the team and still finished second to Remsen in the league champion-

ship.
This year, Poland returned to the success of 2018 and 2019 by winning both the league and section again –

but this time it was in more dramatic fashion.

Poland closely trailed Oriskany on May 27 heading into the final event of the Section 3 championship meet: an 800-meter race that was the last leg of the pentathlon. Poland freshman Zyanna Irving-Summers was in first place heading into the race, but the pressure was on fresh-Kendra Houghtaling, man who was in fourth and had the opportunity to move up in the scoring with a good time because an Oriskany student was just ahead of her in third

Houghtaling, who had never participated in the pentathlon before that day, was encouraged by her teammates to put her all into the 800-meter, the coaches said.

Irving-Summers won the pentathlon overall, and Houghtaling finished third, gaining enough points from her time in the 800-meter to pass the Oriskany student. Houghtaling came through with her best race when it mattered most, the coaches said.

On to the State Championships

After six Poland students advanced to the state qualifi-

er, Poland freshman Maddison Haver advanced to the Division 2 state championships. She competed in the state semi-finals on June 10 and advanced to the state finals on June 11, finishing in fifth place.

Haver had the 13th fastest time going into the state championship and exceeded her ranking by finishing fifth. Just making it to the state championship meet is a huge accomplishment on its own and Haver has the potential to get back there again, Joel Allen said.

For John Allen, who has been coaching the track program for about 10 years including the years that Poland had to use West Canada Valley's track or run in the school hallways until a track was built as part of Capital Project 2020, seeing Haver receive a fifth-place medal on the state championship podium was a big moment.



and perfected over many years. Those skills can ensure projects are completed quickly and correctly. Labor may seem costly, but such costs may ultimately prove to be a bargain compared to the cost of fixing DIY mistakes. Projects that are minor in scope and don't require the use of potentially costly specialty tools may be better suited for weekend warriors than more complicated renovations.

2. Do I have the time? Homeowners must determine how much time they have to complete a project before deciding to do it themselves. No one wants to spend months staring at an unfinished renovation project. Homeowners who are already pressed for time may not be able to complete projects in a timely fashion, which can make homes less comfortable and even less safe.

3. Can I pull this off? projects can instill

What to plant when privacy is a priority

A backyard oasis can feel like an even more welcoming retreat when the area is private. Homeowners and their families often find that a backvard is most relaxing when they cannot hear or see their neighbors and creating such an environment can be as simple as planting some privacy trees.

Fencing is an option when homeowners are looking to make their backyards more private. But HomeAdvisor reports that the average cost to install a privacy fence is just under \$3,000, and those costs can be considerably higher depending on where homeowners live and how big a fence they need. Privacy trees can be considerably less expensive, and homeowners can spread out those costs by planting over time, an option that's not possible when installing fencing.

When planting privacy trees. homeowners can consider these varieties that can do the job while also providing some aesthetic

• Emerald arborvitae: The Arbor Day Founda-

tion® notes that the emerald arborvitae is unique among arborvitaes because it maintains its green color even in the coldest months of the year. The emerald arborvitae can grow to between 10 and 15 feet tall and spread as wide as four feet at maturity. The tree features a pyramid shape and is considered slow-growing at less than 12 inches of growth per year. The ADF reports that full sun and partial shade are best for this

· Carolina cherry laurel: Carolina cherry laurels are popular choices for privacy seekers. The Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center notes the trees can grow very tall and boast a pyramidal shape. The Carolina cherry laurel require sun and thrive in moist, welldrained soils. Parents with young children should know that the leaves of this family of plant contain hydrocyan-

ic acid and should never be eaten.

• Boxwood: The ADF notes that boxwoods are renowned for their use in formal gardens. That can make them an ideal option for homeowners seeking a traditional garden aesthetic in their backyards. Boxwood trees can grow up to 20 feet tall, but they can vary greatly in height. Homeowners purchasing them as privacy trees should speak with their local gardening center to ensure they're getting boxwoods that will provide ample privacy. Though they still have aesthetic appeal, smaller boxwoods may only reach a foot tall. Boxwoods vary considerably in terms of their growth rate, so homeowners should inquire about this as well before purchasing and planting any

Privet: Privets are dense privacy hedges that grow very quickly, with the ADF reporting they can grow up to three feet per year. Privets may reach 12

feet in height and spread as wide as six feet at maturity. Privets tolerate shearing well, which can make them privacy options for ideal those looking for a formal appearance. Privets require full sun for uniform growth. Privets are considered invasive in many areas of North America, so homeowners should consult their local

garden center prior to plant-

The Family Counseling Center promotes new national 988 dialing code for suicide and crisis prevention

The Family Counseling Center of Fulton County in Gloversville, along with mental and behavioral health facilities across the country, are preparing for the launch of the 988 dialing code, a direct and easy access to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.

Similar to 911, 988 will connect callers to over 200 locally operated and funded crisis centers across the country. On July 16, the U.S. will transition to using the 988 dialing code, strengthening and expanding the current National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. Callers will be connected to compassionate, accessible care and support when experiencing any mental health related distress - whether that is thoughts of suicide, mental health or substance use crisis or any other kind of emotional distress. People can also dial 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support.

Across the country, mental health organizations, local police departments, emergency rooms and schools are seeing a dramatic increase in mental health crisis incidents. 988 is a first step toward strengthening and transforming crisis care in the county. 988 will serve as a universal entry point so that no matter where you live, you can reach a trained crisis counselor who can help.

The Kaiser Family Foundation recently released numbers regarding Mental Health Care Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs). The timeframe covered up until September 2021 and notes that over one-third of Americans live in areas lacking mental health professionals. Nationally, 6,398 mental health providers are needed to fill the gap with areas of highest need being rural or partially rural communities like Fulton County and others in the Capital District.

"We are excited to promote and support the rollout of the new national 988 dialing code," said Michael Countryman, executive director at the Family Counseling Center. "Our Crisis Unit works daily to support those in a moment of mental health crisis. The Crisis Unit is open Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Fridays 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and we have a 24-hour Crisis Hotline as well, but to be able to reach and support community members 24 hours a day, every day, including holidays and weekends through 988 is an amazing opportunity to meet the needs, provide the guidance and assist individuals in crisis."

Diary of 12-year-old Ukrainian refugee to be released

NEW YORK (AP) - The reflections of a 12-year-old refugee from the Russian invasion of Ukraine will be published this autumn. Yeva Skalietska's book is called "You Don't Know What War Is: The Diary of a Young Girl from Ukraine." Union Square & Co. will release her account Oct. 25.

"Everyone knows what the word 'war' means, but practically no one knows what this word really represents," Skalietska said in a statement. "I want the world to know what we have experienced."

Skalietska's book begins with her 12th birthday, shortly before the Russians attacked on Feb. 24. She had been living in Kharkiv with her grandmother when the bombing began. (Yeva's parents separated when she was a baby, and her grandmother has raised her).

"She describes the bombings they endured while sheltering underground, and their desperate journey to West Ukraine. She shares her confusion about why the Russians would attack them, since she speaks Russian and follows many of their customs," according to Union Square's announcement.

"After many endless train rides and a prolonged stay in an overcrowded refugee center in Hungary - because several countries in Europe refused them entry and her beloved grandmother eventually find refuge in Dublin, where she bravely begins to forge a new life, hoping she'll be able to return home one day," the publisher said.

Union Square will donate a portion of the proceeds to Ukraine refugee organizations.



Keeping wildlife away from your compost

Making your own compost is an eco-friendly and rewarding way to manage your food waste. But what can you do if your compost bin is being raided by wildlife?

Many animals are attracted to compost for different reasons. Rats find compost ideal as a source of food and a warm place to nest. Skunks like the grubs they find in it. Bears' acute sense of smell leads them from a mile away toward the foul odors that emanate from poorly maintained compost.

Taking precautions when building your compost bin and adopting good maintenance habits can prevent wildlife from finding your gardener's gold.

The first thing you can do is to choose an open flat area that allows for ample air circulation. Clear the area of clutter or debris to remove potential hiding places for critters.

Select a hard-sided compost bin with a lid. You may find reasonably priced backyard composting bins at your local solid waste management district.

A sheet of quarter-inch hardware cloth a few inches larger than the bottom opening of your compost bin will serve as a barrier against small rodents that tunnel from underground. Place this sheet on the cleared ground and position the bin on top ensuring that the metal cloth's edges extend beyond the outer edges of the bin.

The recipe for perfect compost requires the correct balance of carbon-rich brown materials, nitrogen-rich green materials, water and oxygen. These ingredients work together to produce healthy compost with a pleasant earthy smell that won't attract bears.

Brown materials include





dead leaves, dried grass clippings, wood chips, sawdust, brown paper bags and cardboard, straw, coffee filters, egg cartons and toilet paper rolls.

For appropriate green materials, consider green grass clippings, plant trimmings, fruit and vegetable scraps, biodegradable tea bags, herbivore manure, coffee grounds and rinsed and crushed eggshells.

Make sure that both brown and green ingredients are cut small to speed up decomposition. The smaller the pieces, the faster they will turn into





Do not add dog or cat waste, meat or fish (raw or cooked), dairy products, oil or unrinsed eggshells to your compost. These will generate foul odors and potentially dangerous bacteria.

Each time you add food scraps to your compost, cover it entirely with a layer of brown materials. This step is essential to prevent foul odors. In fact, if bears have been a problem in your area, the Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department recommends using "three times as many brown as green materials." Visit tinyurl. com/2p8ec5sy for other tips for keeping bears away from compost piles.

Your next step is to turn

your compost pile regularly as this will aerate the pile adding the air necessary to activate the oxygen-loving bacteria needed for decomposition. Do this every other week. Each time you turn your compost finish the task by adding a new layer of brown materials.

Your compost should be damp, not wet. A wet pile indicates that your compost does not receive enough airflow to properly decompose. Excess moisture often results in a smelly, slimy mess that attracts flies and unwanted fourlegged visitors. Turning your compost regularly and adding a good amount of brown materials can usually solve this problem.

4 corn on the cob (do not husk) Water


1/2 to 1 cup sugar (optional)





The basics of estate sales

Web-based estate auctions ask prospective buyers to create an account via their website, and potential participants may be asked to enter their credit card information prior to bidding. Users then submit bids and the auction will continue for a predetermined period of time. The responsibility of inspecting and picking up items typically rests with the buyers.

First come, first served is how many estate sales are conducted. In such instances, the first person to meet the seller's asking prices gets the item. Newspaper classified sections are great resources for people looking for local estate sales. Buyers who want high-quality items should try to arrive at the estate sale when it begins, if not earlier.

How long do estate sales last?

Many estate sales are conducted over a full weekend. Sales may begin on Saturday morning and then end on Sunday afternoon. Early birds might find the most high-quality items, but those simply looking for bargains may find great deals in the final hours of the estate sale when sellers are simply looking to unload items.

People looking to furnish their homes can find great deals at estate sales.

Explaining easements, setbacks and CCRs

Property setbacks as well as easements and conditions, covenants and restrictions (CCRs) must be considered before renovating an existing home or building a new one. Setbacks are mandated buffers between surveyed property lines and permanent structures. Easements are legal designations that enable individuals or entities to use portions of a person's property for physical access or to build on it for one reason or another. Easements may be owned by utility companies for gas lines or government agencies when sidewalks are on a private property.

Additional examples of easements include greenbelt conservation easements, beach easements or view easements, according to the Spruce, a home and lifestyle resource. CCRs include rules established by many planned communities, subdivisions and planned unit developments. CCRs, easements and property setbacks can affect which type of renovations are allowed on particular plots and may affect the issuance of permits. It's essential to learn about property easements, CCRs and setbacks in advance and discuss them with contractors when drawing up preliminary plans. Your property deed

or plat map as well as the local building inspection offices can highlight any regulations that may be in effect on your property and if they may affect future projects.

Car owners hoping to do so can consider the following tips to ensure the process is safe and smooth.

· Fix any issues with the vehicle. The competition to attract buyers' attention will be steep. Private sellers will have to contend with the hesitation buyers naturally have about preowned vehicles as well as dealerships that specialize in used car sales. Dealerships typically offer preowned vehicle warranties that guarantee the life of certain components. To compete

against such offerings, private sellers must make every effort to fix issues with their vehicles prior to putting them up for sale. Mechanical issues must be addressed, but cosmetic issues like cracks in the windshield, dents or scratches on the vehicle exterior and even aging tires should be fixed/replaced as well.

• Prepare a maintenance portfolio. A portfolio of maintenance receipts can impress buvers and reassure them that the car has been well-maintained. Receipts for oil changes, annual tune-ups, repairs that were made and even receipts for new tires can be included in the portfolio.

· Screen prospective buyers. The automotive experts at Kelley Blue Book recommend that sellers insist on speaking with serious buyers over the phone prior to scheduling a test drive. Such conversations give sellers a chance to vet buyers about what they're looking for and whether or not they've arranged financing. KBB advises sellers to be wary of buyers who offer to purchase vehicles sight unseen.

· Contact your insurance provider. Prospective buyers will want to test drive the vehicle, so contact your insurance provider to confirm that your coverage extends to other drivers. Some companies may request that you get a copy of prospective buyers' drivers licenses. If such a request is made by your provider, mention that to buyers when speaking with them on the

· Meet at a public location. When scheduling a test drive, insist on meeting at a public location away from your home, such as a grocery store parking lot. The test drive can begin and end at this location. This measure is designed to keep sellers safe.

· Insist buyers make financial arrangements on their own. When a buyer agrees to purchase the vehicle, KBB recommends that sellers insist they make financial arrangements on their own. In addition, KBB suggests asking buyers to put down a deposit and get back in touch when they're ready to conclude the sale.

Private sellers can take various measures to ensure the process of selling their vehicles goes safely and smoothly.







Beginners guide to harvesting rainwater Adapted from an article by Susan Himes, Texas A&M AgriLife

ith higher temperatures and more frequent droughts occurring, rainwater harvesting is

something nearly everyone can do to make the most of the moisture they get.

Many homeowners erroneously think that if they live in an area with little rainfall, it's not worth trying to catch for use later. "Infrequent rainfall is exactly the reason to harvest rainwater," said Allison Watkins, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service horticulturist.

Rainwater harvesting is one way homeowners can invest in their landscape and continue to garden during drought while also protecting valuable water resources.

"Plants love rainwater and catching when it does come, to use later when it's hot and dry, will really help plants survive and thrive in a yard or garden," she said.

What You Need


A way to collect rain - a roof is ideal. A method to direct the water, such as a rain gutter and downspout.

Something to store the water in. The container can be a rain barrel, a food-grade barrel or even a large, clean trash can.

A way for water to reach the container a pipe, PVC tube or rain chain.

What You Don't Need


A gutter. Determine the lowest point of the roof or the valley where rain would naturally run off.

Heavy rain. Any amount of moisture that accumulates will work with gravity to help fill your container.

Fancy math skills. We'll do that for you: For every inch of rain that falls, around 0.62 gallons of water can be captured per square foot of roof. In other words, 1,000 square feet of roof can produce as much as 620 gallons of water for harvest with one inch of rain.

Keep in Mind

This water is "grey water," which is suitable for watering plants, washing your car or other places, but is not to be consumed by people or pets.
