Herkimer BOCES Visual Communications students take sixth place in national competition

Three Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Visual Communications Media Arts seniors recently finished in sixth place in the nation for a SkillsU-SA promotional bulletin board competition.

Students Tracy Palmieri of Central Valley Central School District; Delaney Kerr of Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District; and Savannah Dennis of Herkimer Central School District created their bulletin board as a class project under the advisement of Herkimer BOCES Visual Communications Media Arts instructor Melinda Maycock.

They presented their project in April at the SkillsUSA York State Leadership

and Skills Conference in Syracuse and won first place. This allowed them to compete in the Skills USA national-level competition, which took place in Atlanta June 20 - 25.

At the national competition, the students then advanced another stage to the national finals before claiming their sixth place finish.

MHLC conducts their conservation work in Albany, Schenectady and Montgomery counties. This presentation will provide a brief overview of MHLC and introduce the audience to their latest partnership with the Nature Conservancy to address wildlife crossings in this region. Participants will learn about the importance of the Catskills to Adirondack Conservation Corridor and how

the conservancy is working on the ground to ensure wildlife connectivity in a disconnected world.

MHLC has been conserving and stewarding the lands and waters of the Mohawk and Hudson river valleys for the benefit of people and the environment since 1992.

Herkimer County collaborative launches community development plan

A local government-nonprofit collaborative has announced the completion of a Herkimer County-wide community development plan that will address the county's longstanding challenges and future growth opportunities. Under the plan, a nonprofit called Herkimer County Community Development Partnership will be created to formalize collaborative efforts needed to address economic challenges while connecting and encouraging innovation in thriving but disconnected points of growth county-wide.

"This plan continues the cooperation we've seen across local governments and builds on recent economic development successes, and it also addresses head-on the challenges we face across the county as we work together to make a great place to live and work even better," said Jim Bono, Herkimer County Legislature chair. "With this plan as a blueprint, we can tackle challenges

and celebrate accomplishments in a coordinated way – attracting public and private investment that cuts across local government lines and addresses common needs across the county."

A county-wide steering committee of local government, business and higher education leaders, chaired by Little Falls Mayor Mark Blask, worked with consultant Fairweather Consulting of New Paltz as it engaged with a broad range of constituents. Using a variety of in-person and virtual events, tactics and tools, the process probed the county's strengths, weaknesses and residents' vision for the future, which they described as six themes:

- Vital Villages & Main Streets
- Healthy, Affordable & Livable Communities
- Thriving Economy & Economic Opportunity
- Authentic & Sustainable Places
- Diverse Recreation, Cultural & Social Activities
- Engaged, Informed & Inclusive Culture

To work toward that vision, the plan recommends a focus on government, business and nonprofit collaboration and connectivity, economic and agribusiness development and tourism, supporting and complementing long-term development across the county.

"We all know that our entire county is rich in tourism assets and offers a lot to our heritage businesses as well as outside companies seeking to relocate here," Blask said. "This plan gives us a framework for sustained collaboration across municipal boundaries and will strengthen our identity as a tourism destination and as a place that's open for business."


Herkimer County will hire a community coordinator to advance cross-governmental collaboration as a first step toward creation of the recommended community development partnership. A website that launched as part of the planning process, itshappening-inherkimer.org, will also be utilized as the strategy moves forward. With individual municipal efforts needed to support the overall plan, the Village of Herkimer has announced that it will engage a consultant to create a 10-year village-specific vision that complements the county-wide collaboration.

"We are thrilled that this partnership is moving forward to build





a better future for all of Herkimer County," said Alicia Fernandez Dicks, president/CEO of the Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties, which helped coalesce and fund the process. "This kind of collaboration on a county-wide basis should serve as a model for others, an example of how local governments, business, nonprofits – all sectors – can work together for the greater good."





Did you know?

Drivers who aren't fond of taking their vehicles in for routine oil changes may want to consider electric vehicles the next time they're in the market for a new car or truck. According to Kia, electric vehicles (EVs) do not require oil. Oil is necessary to lubricate the various moving parts in combustion engines. While synthetic oil and other advancements have increased the recommended oil change intervals from the once-standard 3,000-mile recommendation, manufacturers still advise drivers to get oil changes around every 5,000 miles or every six months, whichever comes first. No such maintenance is required with EVs because they consume batteries while running on electric motors.

EV drivers will have to monitor certain fluids, though. Coolant is necessary to prevent batteries from overheating, and that can be periodically checked at drivers' discretion and during routine maintenance performed at an auto body shop. Drivers also can monitor and refill windshield washer fluid as necessary. Brake fluid in EV cars also needs to be replaced periodically, and Kia notes that its EVs need fresh brake fluid after running about 25,000 miles.

Tips to create a clean campsite

Camping is catching on. Long beloved by outdoor enthusiasts, camping is growing in popularity among relative novices as well.

According to the 2018 North American Camping Report, an annual independent study supported by Kampgrounds of America, more than six million new North American households have adopted the camping lifestyle since 2014. In addition, the number of campers who camp three or more times each year increased by 64% in that period, highlighting the growing popularity of this awe-inspiring recreational activity.

Veteran campers recognize the importance of creating and leaving a clean campsite behind once their camping trips conclude, but novices may not know just how to accomplish that goal. Maintaining a clean campsite during and after your trip benefits future campers and the park itself, reducing pollution that can adversely affect the local ecosystem, including wildlife. The following tips can help campers ensure their campsite is clean while camping and still clean when they leave to go home.

· Give ample thought to what you pack. A clean campsite begins before you even leave for your trip. When packing, think of ways you can reduce litter by packing lighter. Avoid single-use plastic bottles in favor of reusable water bottles. Give considerable thought to how much your group will eat while camping,

resisting the temptation to bring extra food that may end up as litter or attract local wildlife to your campsite.

· Leave nothing behind. It may sound simple, but anything you bring with you on a camping trip must be taken out with you when you leave. Garbage, waste water and leftover food that may be on the brink of spoiling should not be left behind. Make note of garbage disposal areas near your campsite before your trip and discard any trash at such sites after leaving your campsite and before leaving the park.

• Don't expand your campsite. Parks and recreation personnel designate specific areas to camp, and campers should stick solely to these areas when setting up their campsites. Stretching these boundaries can compromise nearby vegetation, which local wildlife may rely on to eat.

· Learn local laws regarding refuse. Some campgrounds may allow campers to pour out dish water so long as biodegradable soap was used to wash dishes. But not all campgrounds allow such disposal. Upon choosing a campsite, contact the grounds and ask for a list of rules. Strictly adhere to these rules to avoid upsetting and potentially threatening the local ecosystem.

More and more people are recognizing how rewarding camping can be. Camping trips can be even more rewarding when campers take steps to protect their campsites and the local eco-

Healthy and fun rainy day activities for kids

There are numerous reasons for children to spend time outdoors. Soaking up sunlight and fresh air can do everything from reduce stress to improve cardiovascular health.

Set up a tent or make a lean-to from blankets and sheets. Use a fireplace or stove to roast marshmallows and make indoor s'mores.

 Make homemade playdough – Invite a few of the children's friends over and mix up a batch of homemade playdough. A handy recipe can be found at iheartnaptime.net/play-dough-recipe. Children can spend hours molding the playdough into imaginative creations.

Visit a museum - Communities across the country are home to various museums, some showcasing ancient artifacts and others touting novelties. For those concerned about indoor crowds, try visiting shortly after doors open or an hour or two before doors close. Foot traffic tends to be lower at these times.

 Host an outdoor movie viewing – Homeowners with covered awnings or outside porches can project a movie onto a screen and have movie-goers watch from their sheltered locations. Serve plenty of healthy snacks and a few sweet treats to munch on during the film.

• Play in the rain - Just because it's raining doesn't mean outdoor fun needs to be entirely curtailed. Children can gather in a garage with the door left open. Then they can take turns dashing out to stomp in puddles or dance in the rain showers. Just have plenty of towels on hand and choose a warm rainy day so kids won't catch a chill.

DMV warns New Yorkers of new phishing scam

The New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is warning consumers to beware of a new attempt to steal their personal information. The latest phishing scam involves sending people text messages falsely claiming the state is offering \$1,500 rebates as a result of high fuel prices.

If someone clicks on the link provided, they are brought to a webpage that is designed to look like the DMV website and they are asked to submit personal information.

This is the latest in a series of such text message phishing schemes that DMV has warned New Yorkers to avoid. Phishing texts are fraudulent messages designed to obtain data or sensitive personal information to be used to commit identity theft or trick the recipient into installing malicious software onto a computer or mobile device.

"We want New Yorkers to be aware that these scams are out there, and we urge them to be vigilant if they receive any text message or email that seems suspicious," said DMV Commissioner Mark J.F. Schroeder. "DMV will not send you text messages asking for your personal information. If you aren't sure if you received a phishing scam, you may contact us at dmv.sm.phishingattacks@dmv.ny.gov."

To help protect against phishing or smishing (SMS phishing) scams, the NYS Office of

Information Technology Services (ITS) recommends the following precautions:

- · Be cautious about all communications you receive, including those that purport to be from "trusted entities." Be careful when clicking any links contained within those messages. If in doubt, do not click.
- · Do not send your personal information via email. Legitimate businesses will not ask users to send sensitive personal information through email.
- Keep an eye out for telltale signs: poor spelling or grammar, the use of threats or the URL does not match that of the legitimate site.
- · Be wary of how much information you post online. The less information you post, the less data you make available to a cybercriminal for use in developing a potential attack or scam.

How to add shade to a deck or patio

Homeowners eagerly await the arrival of the warm weather so they can cast off the remnants of cabin fever and bask in the sunshine. However, as summer nears its dog days, the same sun homeowners once coveted can contribute to uncomfortable condi-

tions in outdoor entertaining spaces.
 Meteorologists at WHAS11 in Ke

Meteorologists at WHAS11 in Kentucky took to their neighborhoods in July 2020 to

test just how hot surfaces can get in the sun during peak daytime temperatures. Concrete sitting in the sun almost all day reached a temperature of 134.7° F, while the same concrete in the shade clocked in at just under 80°. When air temperatures are around 90°, unshaded concrete and asphalt can be 125° and 140°, respectively. While wood decking may not be as hot as asphalt and concrete, it still can get steamy underfoot.

Homeowners who want to be able to enjoy their outdoor spaces in an array of temperatures can think about investing in shade solutions. Sun-blocking ideas like awnings, shade trees and large umbrellas can help people enjoy their yards all day long.

• Canopy: A patio canopy is typically a freestanding unit that can be installed over a patio or a deck. Some people prefer to bolt it down so it will not be knocked over in windy conditions. The fabric on the

canopy can be removed during the offseason, helping to improve its longevity.

- **Awning**: Awnings may be stationary or retractable. Many are installed directly onto a home and can cast shade on specific areas of outdoor entertaining spaces.
- Shade sail: Similar to an awning but a bit less structurally rigid, shade sails are large pieces of triangular fabric installed over areas of a patio, pool or landscape, according to the Family Handyman. Shade sails are light and airy and can be customized.
- **Trees**: A natural way to increase shade in a yard is to plant more shade trees. If sun glare is an issue all year long, and it's not just the heat of the sun that is troublesome, think about planting evergreen trees. Deciduous cousins will drop their leaves in fall and only be effective during the warm weather.
- Patio umbrellas: Many umbrellas start at around \$25. Umbrellas can be paired with patio tables, while stationary cantilever umbrellas sit out of the way on their own heavy-duty stands. A cantilever umbrella tends to provide more shade than patio table umbrellas.
- **Curtains**: Homeowners can block sunlight outdoors the way they do inside, offers MSN. Hang curtains from the sides of canopies or between posts on a deck to provide shade and cozy spaces.

Shade is in high demand when the sun is hot. Options abound for making outdoor areas more comfortable.

How to pick the right trees for your property

Trees benefit a landscape by serving both aesthetic and utilitarian functions. A home surrounded by healthy green trees can be a sight to behold, and those same trees can benefit surrounding plants and wildlife at the same time.

As appealing as trees are, not all trees and landscapes make for the perfect match. The Arbor Day Foundation notes the importance of planning when designing a landscape. Planning ensures the trees homeowners ultimately choose for their properties will grow well in the soil and moisture present in their yards.

Careful consideration of a handful of variables can help homeowners determine which trees will make the best fit for their properties.

- **Height**: Homeowners must consider the projected height of a tree before planting it. Avoid trees that will bump into anything when fully grown, as that can adversely affect surrounding greenery and pose a safety hazard. The ADF's tree sizing guide can be accessed at arborday.org/trees/rightTreeAndPlace/size.cfm and serves as an invaluable resource for homeowners who want to plant new trees around their properties.
 - Canopy spread: Trees grow

out as well as up, so it's important to consider their potential width at maturity as well. The ADF sizing guide can help homeowners get an idea of how wide a tree is likely to be at maturity. Trees that spread out quite a bit don't necessarily need to be avoided, but it's important that they're planted far enough apart so they don't adversely affect surrounding plants. In addition, wide trees that are planted too close together can make the landscape appear crowded, taking something away from its aesthetic appeal.

- **Growth rate**: Growth rate is an important variable because it can affect how quickly homeowners will see changes in their landscapes. Homeowners who want to plant for privacy can consider trees with quick growth rates or purchase more mature trees that are already near full growth. Those who are not in need of instant transformation can try trees with slower growth rates, which the ADF notes typically live longer than fast-growing species.
- Requirements: Different trees require different amounts of sun and moisture and different soil components to thrive. Homeowners can have their soil tested to

determine which trees will thrive in it. Local garden centers can be a great resource for homeowners who want insight as to which trees will thrive in their local climates.

Trees serve many functions on a property. Choosing the right trees for a landscape requires careful consideration of a host of variables.


Seven things to know before replacing windows

The decision to replace windows often comes down to aesthetics and necessity. Drafty windows can reduce energy efficiency in a home, requiring HVAC systems to work harder to keep interiors comfortable. The harder the HVAC must work, the more homeowners will pay in energy costs.

Old windows also may be points of entry for water and insects. Despite the importance of windows, Money Magazine advises that new windows make up only a fraction of the home's total exterior "envelope," resulting in only about 5% to 15% of total energy savings.

But there are still plenty of reasons to invest in new windows.

- 1. Vinyl or aluminum may be best. Lumber is farmed rather quickly today and solid wood products may not stand up to elements as well as wood used a half-century ago. To avoid rot, vinyl windows often are an affordable and durable choice. Homeowners also have the option of wood windows with aluminum cladding, which are long-lasting.
- 2. Moisture problems indicate windows need to be replaced. Condensation that shows up as fogging between double-pane windows or on the inside of windows indicates that the windows are starting to fail. If installing a vapor barrier in the basement or crawl space, ventilating properly when showering or cooking or using a dehumidifier indoors does not remedy the situation, it might be time to replace windows.
- 3. Windows add curb appeal. Beyond functionality, replacement windows immediately update the look of the home and can improve curb appeal since they are one of the most prominent features on the exterior of a home. Replacing windows can be a quick and affordable update.
- 4. Consider other energy-efficient upgrades. Sometimes older windows can be salvaged, especially if they are not damaged and only moderately drafty. Replacing panes, sash cords, weather stripping and even glazing may be less expensive than replacing a window. Plus, older homes with attractive windows complement one another. To keep energy bills down, think about adding insulation to the attic and basement - which is a good idea even if you aren't replacing windows.
- 5. The wrong windows can adversely affect home value. The National Association of Realtors says

Campers with limited mobility may be best suited for accessible campsites. The NPS urges campers to consider if everyone in the group will be able to make a long hike from the parking lot to the campsite. If not, choose a site that you can pull right up to or is just a short, easy walk from the parking lot.

· Research the campsite and surrounding area. Know as much as possible about the campsite prior to embarking on your trip. Learn about everything from the local wildlife you may

• Develop on a final control of the c

Develop an emergency plan. The NPS urges campers to develop an emergency plan, noting that it's always wise to expect the unexpected when camping. Bring a first aid kit along when leaving the campsite to engage in activities like hiking or fishing. Go over safety pro-

tocols before going on a hike, including the need to stay together and remain on the trail at all times. More information about what to do should anyone be injured during your trip is available at nps.gov.

· Bring the right gear. The NPS notes that each camping trip will have its own equipment needs, which will be dictated by the setting, the time of year of the trip, the difficulty of the terrain and the duration of the trip. Navigational supplies, sun and insect protection, insulation (i.e., extra clothing and blankets), shelter, flashlights and headlamps, first aid kits, extra food and water, firestarters, repair kits and tools and a communication device like a smartphone or satellite phone are the essential necessities that should be brought along on all camping trips.

Five steps to find the right doctor

(Family Features) Whether you're rarely sick or have multiple conditions that require frequent visits to the doctor, having a trusted and skilled healthcare provider is an important step in protecting your health.

A healthcare provider helps you maintain good health by recommending preventive services like screenings and vaccines. They can treat many problems directly and refer you to a specialist for more help with specific issues, as necessary.

Any number of reasons can result in needing to find a new doctor, such as moving to a new community, changes to your insurance, your old doctor retiring or needing a specialist, for example.

Finding a healthcare provider requires research and careful consideration. These suggestions from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) can help you be more efficient and thorough as you look for a doctor who is right for you.

Ask for Recommendations

Talk to friends, family members, neighbors and coworkers about whether they have a provider they like. An endorsement from someone you know may give you greater confidence you will have a similar positive experience. If you're looking for a new provider because of a move or retirement, you can ask your current doctor for a recommendation. If you need to make a change with your primary care doctor but see specialists or other medical professionals you like and trust, you can also request referrals from them.

Check with Your Insurance Company

If you have health insurance, you may need to choose from a list of doctors in your plan's network. Some insurance plans may let you choose a doctor outside your network if you pay more of the cost.

To find a doctor who takes your insurance, call your insurance company and ask for a list of doctors near you who are in-network or use the insurance company's website to search for a doctor. It's also a good idea to call the doctor's office and ask for confirmation they take your plan. You should have your insurance, Medicare or Medicaid card handy in case the office needs your plan details.

Narrow Your Options

In addition to checking on insurance coverage, you can gather some information that helps narrow your options. Some of the providers you consider may not be viable options for simple reasons, like their practice isn't currently taking new patients or they don't have office hours matching your schedule. You can also consider questions such as hospital affiliations and

whether other providers can help if you need emergency care and your doctor isn't available.

Take a Deeper Look

Online research can tell you a great deal about potential doctors, from biographical information and credentials to ratings by former patients

When searching for a new provider, another important area to consider is financial relationships. One resource patients can consider is Open Payments, a national disclosure program within CMS that provides visibility into financial relationships between drug and medical device companies and physicians and teaching hospitals. The government requires pharmaceutical companies, device manufacturers and group purchasing organizations to report funds they give healthcare providers in the form of meals, entertainment, travel, gifts, consulting fees, research payments and more, promoting transparency and helping uncover potential conflicts of interest.

It's important to know most healthcare providers receive payments. Just because financial ties are reported does not mean anyone has done anything wrong. However, patients can use the information to talk with their provider about why they recommend certain medications or treatments, including asking about generic options, which are equally as effective as name brands but typically less expensive. It's also an opportunity to start a discussion with a provider about areas of professional interest and expertise based on research

or consulting

Listen to Your Gut

If you're undecided, request an introductory appointment with a provider you're considering. The way you feel when you interact with the doctor and staff can tell you a lot about whether the office is the right fit. Look for a clinic where you are treated with respect and the doctor, as well others on the medical team, listen to your opinions and concerns. You should feel comfortable asking questions, and the doctor needs to be able to explain things in ways you understand.

Preparing for a First Visit

An initial appointment with a new provider can be intimidating. You're meeting someone for the first time and likely have several topics to discuss. Help keep your nerves under control and get your questions answered with these steps:

- Introduce yourself. When you see the doctor and office staff, introduce yourself and let them know by what name you prefer to be called
- Ask how the office runs. Learn what days are busiest and what times are best to call. Ask what to do if there is an emergency or if you need a doctor when the office is closed.
- Share your medical history. Tell the doctor about any illnesses, operations, medical conditions and other doctors you see. You may want to ask the doctor to send you a copy of the medical history form before your visit so you can fill it out at home, where you have the time and information you need to complete it.
- Make a list and prioritize your concerns. If you have more than a few items to discuss, put them in order and ask about the most important ones first.
- Take information with you to the doctor. Some doctors suggest you put all your medications in a bag and bring them with you. Others recommend bringing a written list. You should also have your insurance cards, names and phone numbers of other doctors you see and your medical records if the doctor doesn't already have them.
- Consider bringing a family member or friend. Your companion can remind you what you planned to discuss with the doctor if you forget. They can also take notes for you and help you remember what the doctor said.



Is medical debt vanishing from credit reports?

Healthcare bills are about to become far less threatening to the financial well-being of millions of Americans.

The three major credit bureaus are erasing most medical debts from people's credit reports, and the Biden Administration is reducing or eliminating medical debt as a factor in government lending decisions.

Here's what you need to know about medical debt now.

One in Five U.S. Households Has Medical Debt

Roughly one in five U.S. households have medical debt, according to the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau. Some aren't insured, while others struggle to pay deductibles and other cost-sharing. Insurance billing is byzantine, to say the least, and it's easy to lose track of a bill while your insurer decides how much, or whether, to pay.

Many of these unpaid bills wind up on people's credit reports. The CFPB found medical debts on 43 million credit reports last year, and medical debts made up 58% of all bills in collections as of the second quarter of 2021. Collections can depress your credit scores, which can make it harder to get loans or require you to pay higher interest rates. Bad credit also can cause you to be turned away from jobs or apartments and require you to pay more for car and home insurance.

Newer versions of credit scoring formulas treat medical debt less harshly, since research shows health care bills aren't as reliable as a gauge of creditworthiness compared to other types of collections. But most lenders still use older credit scores that don't distinguish medical debt from other overdue bills.

Rather than wait for lenders to update to the latest credit scores – a process that could take years, if it ever happens – the CFPB announced

on March 1 that it would investigate whether medical debt should be included on credit reports at all.

Seventeen days later, three credit bureaus – Equifax, Experian and TransUnion – responded by promising to remove nearly 70% of medical debts from consumer credit reports within the next year.

Most Medical Debts Disappearing from Credit Reports

Starting July 1, all paid medical collections will be eliminated from people's credit files, and no unpaid bill will be reported until 12 months have passed – an increase from the current term of six months. By June 30, 2023, the three bureaus will also stop reporting unpaid medical debts under \$500.

Consumer advocates hailed the changes but noted that those with larger debts would still face credit damage. About 16 million people (6% of U.S. adults) owe more than \$1,000 in medical debt, and three million (1%) owe more than \$10,000, according to KFF, the nonprofit health research organization formerly known as the Kaiser Family Foundation.

Recent moves by the Biden Administration could help improve access to credit. On April 11, Vice President Kamala Harris announced additional reforms, including reducing or eliminating medical debt as a factor in government lending decisions. That should make many home and business loans easier to get. Also, Veterans Affairs, which has already erased \$1 billion in copayments owed by veterans, promised to streamline the process so more low-income vets can have their VA bills forgiven. The VA has also stopped reporting most veterans' medical debts to the credit bureaus.

What You Can Do to Deal with Medical Debt

Soon you won't have to worry about a minor medical bill tanking your credit scores. But cat-

astrophic medical bills could still upend your finances. Consider taking the following steps to reduce your vulnerability to medical debt:

- Stay covered, if you possibly can. Insured people enjoy more consumer protections, and better access to healthcare, than the uninsured. People who aren't covered by workplace insurance or government plans such as Medicare can find coverage through Affordable Care Act exchanges. Start your search at healthcare.gov. Most uninsured people qualify for subsidies to make premiums more affordable.
 - · Check all medical bills for errors. Billing er-

rors are common, so request itemized bills for hospital stays and complex procedures. Dispute any mistakes you find.

- Ask for help. Hospitals and other healthcare providers may have financial assistance programs that could reduce or eliminate your bills. (Nonprofit hospitals are required to have such programs but may not offer help unless you ask.)
- Avoid using credit cards if you can't pay in full. Credit cards tend to have high interest rates that make debt harder to pay. Many healthcare providers offer interest-free payment plans that allow you to pay off your bill over time.



Outdoor activities benefit kids

Modern amenities and indoor comforts have made life easier in many ways, but they've also helped to

fashion a generation of people who spend much of their time inside. A 2018 report from the international

to 22 hours inside every day. Children may get a little more time outdoors than adults, particularly if they participate in outdoor sports.

There are distinct advantages to engaging in more outdoor activities. Here's a look at some of them.

- Improved mood and reduced risk of depression: The YouGov report notes that around 15% of the world's population is affected by different levels of seasonal affective disorder, which is believed to be a direct result of lack of daylight. Symptoms go away when days are longer and individuals can enjoy more sunshine. Children who go outside and get ample exposure to sunlight may experience a more positive mood and renewed energy.
- · Lower risk of obesity: Dr. Kenneth Ginsburg from the American Academy of Pediatrics says outdoor play can help reduce obesity in today's youth. Children can enjoy self-directed

physical activity that also stimulates awareness one's surroundings.

- · Improved vitamin D levels: Vitamin D has been dubbed the "sunshine vitamin" because sunlight hitting the skin prompts the liver and kidneys to create vitamin D in the body. A deficiency in vitamin D can lead to depression and heart failure and may compromise the immune system. Children can improve current and future health by maintaining adequate vitamin D levels through healthy exposure to sunlight.
- · Lower stress levels: Students of all ages are faced with stressful situations that come at them from every angle. The arrival of the global pandemic has been an added stressor that continues to affect children and adults. According to research by the University of Essex, outdoor exercise offers mental health benefits that exceed those gleaned from indoor exercise. Spending

in a green space can result in improved mood and self-esteem. A 2017 study of Japanese students found those who spent time in the forest for two nights returned home with lower levels of cortisol, a hormone used as a marker of stress, than students who remained in the city. The practice of de-stressing outdoors is often referred to as "forest bathing" or "nature therapy."

· Better focus: A dose of nature may help children diagnosed with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder improve their concentration levels. A 2008 study from researchers at the University of Illinois found that children with ADHD demonstrated greater attention performance following a 20-minute walk in a park as compared to a residential neighborhood or downtown area.

Getting outside and engaging in any activity has a variety of benefits for children and adults.

How to maintain a car that's rarely driven

Driving habits changed significantly in 2020. The outbreak of COVID-19 forced many professionals to work from home full-time. In addition, stay-at-home measures greatly limited how much people could or would travel in their free time. The result was a lot of cars spending a lot of time sitting idly in driveways.

Just because a car is not being driven very much does not mean its owner can forgo vehicle maintenance. Drivers can take these steps to ensure their vehicles stay in shape even as they're primarily staying in the driveway.

 Adhere to recommended maintenance schedules. Auto manufacturers typically recommend maintenance schedules based on the number of miles a car is driven or the length of time since its most recent maintenance appointment. "Whichever comes first" may be recommended for fluid changes and routine tuneups, and this rule of thumb should still be followed. Even if a car has barely hit the road in recent months, its fluids, such as oil, are still aging and still need to be replaced.

· Turn the car on every so often. Turning the car on, even if you only intend to let it sit idle in the driveway, keeps the vehicle components lubricated by allowing fluids to cycle their way through the engine. Turning the car on also ensures the battery stays fresh and doesn't die, a lesson many drivers have

learned the hard way during the COVID-19 outbreak.

· Disconnect the battery if necessary. Drivers who own two vehicles or families who have only been using the family car in recent months can disconnect the batteries from their unused vehicles to prevent corrosion. Corrosion decreases battery life and performance. If drivers notice a white, green or blue covering around the battery terminals, posts or cables, corrosion is likely the culprit and the battery will

need to be replaced.

 Take the car for a spin. Of course, driving a vehicle every so often is a great way to keep it running strong. Multi-car families that tend to use the same car to shop for groceries or pick up takeout orders can periodically use their other car to run such errands.

Edmunds compares the 2022 Audi A3 and 2022 Volvo S60

If you're in the market for a new midsize sedan like a Honda Accord and have the budget for a fully loaded top trim, then there's a good chance you can afford an entry-level luxury sedan. Luxury models typically offer more power, comfort, refinement and, of course, brand-name prestige. Two options to consider this year are the Audi A3 and Volvo S60.

Newly redesigned for the 2022 model year, the Audi A3 stands out by way of its enjoyable performance, comfortable ride and top-notch technology features. The current Volvo S60 has been around longer, but its distinctive design, standard driver aids and optional plug-in hybrid model have made it one of Edmunds' highly rated luxury sedans. Which one is the better buy? Edmunds' experts compared them to find out.

Value and Features

The 2022 Audi A3 has a starting price of \$35,895, including destination, making it one of the most affordable luxury sedans. But don't let the price tag fool you. The A3 looks and feels much like larger Audis, and it's in no way a cutrate model. It also packs impressive standard features such as heated front seats, a 10.1-inch touchscreen display and a panoramic sunroof. Notable optional features include several advanced driver aids, a digital instrument panel and a Bang & Olufsen audio system.

The 2022 Volvo S60's starting price is considerably higher at \$40,295, mostly because it's a slightly larger and more powerful sedan. It offers similar standard features and a full suite of advanced driver aids, something that's optional on the A3. The S60's optional features are also comparable.

Thanks to the A3's redesign, it provides some of Audi's latest tech including a modern-looking and easy-to-use touchscreen entertainment system. The S60 has a 9-inch center touchscreen, but in our experience, its user interface had a steep learning curve and wasn't as intuitive as the A3's. When it comes to advanced driver aids, such as adaptive cruise control, we've found that the Audi's aids operated more unobtrusively.

If you have the budget for it, you can upgrade to either the sportier Audi S3 or the Volvo S60 Recharge plug-in hybrid. Of the two, the S3 is less powerful and less efficient but it does have a lower starting price.

Winner: Audi A3

Engines and Fuel Economy

Luxury sedans should provide plenty of power, and with today's sky-high fuel prices, fuel efficiency is more important than ever. The A3's turbocharged 2.0-liter four-cylinder engine is both powerful and efficient. It produces 201 horsepower and 221 lb-ft of torque and gets up to an EPA-estimated 32 mpg in combined city/ highway driving. The A3 comes standard with front-wheel drive, and all-wheel drive, which can enhance traction in slippery or icy conditions,

The S60 also has a turbocharged 2.0-liter four-cylinder that's labeled B5. It makes 247 horsepower and 258 lb-ft, so it's a bit more powerful than the A3's base engine. However, its EPA-estimated 30 mpg combined makes it slightly less fuel-efficient. And that's with frontwheel drive. Go with all-wheel drive in the Volvo and you're looking at 28 mpg combined.

There are other options if you want more power. Audi offers the sport-tuned S3, which is similar to the A3 but has a 306-horsepower engine. Volvo, for its part, has the S60 Recharge. The Recharge has a plug-in hybrid powertrain that creates a whopping 455 horsepower. Even better, it can also travel about 40 miles on all-electric power from a fully charged battery and then get an estimated 31 mpg combined when operating as a regular hybrid. Winner: Volvo S60

Driving and Comfort

Audi and Volvo cite very similar acceleration for the base engines with front-wheel drive, which is around 6.5 seconds. The optional engines also have similar acceleration; Audi cites a 4.5-second 0-60 mph sprint for the S3, and Volvo says the S60 Recharge can do it in 4.3 seconds.

Comfort is similar in both cars. They have smooth rides and supportive front seats that are great for daily commutes or long highway trips. The S60 is a slightly bigger car, however, and that pays dividends by way of its roomier back seat and trunk.

The A3 pulls back into contention in this category by being the better car for driving enjoyment. It feels small and nimble and can tackle a curvy road with ease. The bigger and heavier S60 is competent around turns but isn't as engaging or fun.

Winner: Tie

Edmunds Says:

The A3 just walks away with a narrow victory. It delivers everything an entry-level luxury sedan should and does so at an agreeable price. Volvo's \$60 isn't quite as well rounded, but it's still an excellent choice, particularly if you're interested in a plug-in hybrid.



Smullen to co-host public meeting to discuss new concealed-carry laws

Robert Assemblyman Smullen (R, C, I, SAM - Meco) is co-hosting a public meeting to vet the recently-passed restrictions on concealed-carry permits. The new restrictions passed during an Extraordinary Session of the Legislature, between June 30 and July 1, limit the areas in which concealed-carry permit holder can possess a firearm and require more extensive training to obtain a permit. Gov. Hochul called the Legislature back to session on

June 24 as a response to the Supreme Court ruling in New York State Rifle and Pistol Association v. Bruen.

Montgomery County Sheriff Jeffrey Smith and Fulton County Sheriff Richard Giardino will also speak about New York's recent decision, as well as the President of the Pine Tree Rifle Club, Paul Catucci. The event will take place on Monday, July 25, between 6:30 and 8 p.m. at the Pine Tree Rifle Club at 419 Johnson Ave. in Gloversville.

"This decision by the governor reaffirms what we have said for many years, that radical progressives in New York are moving dangerously far in restricting our constitutional rights and the ability of every citizen to defend themselves," Smullen said. "With soaring crime and, in particular, violent crime a serious concern, we need the ability to feel safe and secure in our homes, commuting to work and at public events. While Gov. Hochul is concerned the Supreme Court's decision to protect our Second Amendment right puts 'millions of New Yorkers' at risk, she should look no further than her own disastrous cashless bail laws which are wreaking havoc on countless innocent

Tips for home buyers during a seller's market

A combination of factors, including low interest rates and a pandemic-driven decision by many city dwellers to look for houses in the suburbs, has created a housing boom. That boom has created an undeniable seller's market in real estate.

Just what is a seller's market? The financial resource Investopedia defines it as a marketplace in which there are fewer goods for sale than there are interested buyers, giving sellers the ability to dictate prices. Since mid-2020, there has been an extremely low inventory of homes for sale but a very high interest among purchasing parties.

Data from the National Association of Realtors indicated that, by the end of February 2021, housing inventory fell to a record low of 1.02 million units. These factors have led to a surge in competition from buyers, including bidding wars on homes and all-cash offers to entice sellers. In December 2020, the median listing prices for single-family homes shot up 13.4% from the same time the previous year, according to Realtor.com, and it hasn't slowed down much since. Jeffrey Mezger, a 40-year veteran of the real estate industry and CEO of KB Home, said it's the best seller's housing market he's seen in his career.

So where does this leave buyers interested in relocating? Here are some tips:

• Consider areas with slower overall price growth. Experts say the southern and midwestern U.S. offer the best value for home shoppers because of their meager price growth. ClearCapital, which tracks housing values, says San Antonio, St. Louis and the Dallas/Fort Worth areas ex-

perienced the least price appreciation from 2019 into 2020.

- Get preapproval or have your funds ready. Speed is the way to go if a buyer is interested in a property and wants to make an offer. Real estate professionals say buyers should be "offer ready," which means having a mortgage preapproval letter or proof of funds for a down payment ready to go. Failure to have funds in check can slow down the process or compel sellers to reject an offer.
- Work with a real estate agent. These are complicated times and it pays for buyers to have a professional working in their corner. A real estate agent uses their knowledge to make a timely offer and negotiate on the buyer's behalf. They also will provide insight into specific neighborhoods, amenities and school districts.
- Eliminate certain contingencies from the equation. Contingencies are factors that must be met before a sale can go through, according to the relocation site Moving.com. A common contingency is the need to sell one's current home before closing on another. Asking for extended closing periods or certain home repairs are some additional contingencies that can make buyers less attractive to sellers.
- **Make it personal**. Buyers can offer a personalized note with the offer that may connect with the seller emotionally and set them apart from others who have made similar offers.

Buying in a seller's market can be challenging. But some strategies can set buyers apart from the pack.

The top distractions behind the wheel

Did you know that a vehicle driven at 55 miles per hour or faster can traverse the length of an entire football field in a matter of seconds?

Driving requires not only knowledge of the rules of the road and skill behind the wheel, but also concentration on the task at hand. Data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration indicate distracted driving has been a significant factor in fatal car crashes. NHTSA says as many as one in 10 deaths are now attributed to driver distraction.

Distractions can come in many forms but fall into one of three categories: manual, visual and cognitive. Any distraction has the potential for serious consequences, including deadly accidents. Here's a look at some of the common distractions and how to avoid them.

• Mobile phone use: Texting while driving is one of the most dangerous forms of distracted driving. Texting combines cognitive, manual and visual distractions. Turn off phones while behind the wheel to help reduce the temptation to grab the phone.

• **Daydreaming**: Being lost in one's thoughts can be a big distraction. Driving with something heavy on one's

mind can cause a person to lose track of the road. This may occur when experiencing intense emotions, particularly anger or stress. There's also a condition called "highway hypnosis" that causes drivers to "zone out" while driving. It often occurs while driving on open highways for extended periods of time. Taking breaks and pulling over if you notice your mind wandering can help.

• Pets & children: Young children or unsecured pets can be very distracting in the car. As a child calls out, begins to cry or wants their needs met, drivers may turn to address those needs and take their eyes off the road. Pets that are moving around the vehicle also may distract a driver. All pets and children should be secure in the vehicle at all times.

• Adjusting the GPS: Recalibrating the GPS or entering an address while driving can be a distraction. It's best not to touch the GPS unless the car is in park and at a complete stop.

Eating & drinking:



Turn off phones while behind the wheel. Texting and talking causes many distractions.

Taking hands off the wheel to enjoy that drive-thru meal can be a mistake. Looking down at food and removing hands from the wheel reduces one's ability to steer and react immediately to sudden traffic hazards.

If drivers become knowledgeable of the significant hazards of distracted driving, they can make changes to

improve overall safety. Completing certain tasks before leaving home or while the vehicle is parked can reduce the need to multitask while driving.







Conserve fuel with vehicle maintenance and other tips

Motorists know that 2022 has been a record-breaking year for fuel prices. Data from AAA indicates gas prices jumped 55% between June 2021 and June 2022. All 50 states now have an average fuel price that exceeds \$4 per gallon, with many even surpassing the \$5 mark.

The pinch at the pump is being felt by commuters, casual drivers and weekend warriors alike. People across North America are taking whatever steps necessary to conserve fuel. One of the considerations they may have

overlooked is vehicle maintenance. Poor vehicle performance adversely affects fuel economy, so here's how to maintain a vehicle with an eye toward conserving fuel.

• Proper tire inflation – The

U.S. Department of Energy says each decrease in tire pressure by 1 PSI for four tires can decrease fuel economy by 0.2%. By keeping tires properly inflated, the average driver can improve gas mileage by as much as 3%. Drivers can consult their tire manufacturer's specifications for proper tire pressure.

• Use recommended motor oil – Engines require the right blend of products to work efficiently. The DOE says drivers can improve gas mileage by 1% to 2% simply by using the recommended grade of motor oil. In addition, look for motor oils that list "Energy Conserving" on the label.

• Change the air filter – According to Auto Zone, an engine's ability to produce power is directly related to its ability to draw air in. A clean air filter assists with that function, whereas a dirty filter will reduce engine power and fuel

efficiency.

• Get a tune-up – Additional mechanical issues may affect vehicle performance and lead to excessive fuel consumption. A mechanic can run diagnostics on the vehicle and make recommendations on things to repair or replace, such as spark plugs, ignition coils or faulty oxygen sensors.

• Treat fuel occasionally – Debris and moisture in the fuel tank can compromise combustion and impact performance. A fuel treatment product can clean out debris and dry up moisture to restore function and improve miles per gallon.

• Use the air conditioning sparingly – The air conditioning unit in a vehicle uses power directly from the motor of the car. This means the vehicle consumes extra gas to keep the AC unit running, thereby reducing fuel efficients

• Remove excess cargo – Clear the trunk or cargo area of extra items that can weigh down the vehicle, requiring more power to move it. Any heavy load will negatively affect mileage.

Keeping a vehicle in top form can improve fuel economy, which can be especially beneficial in a time marked by soaring fuel costs.





Packing a pint of pickled peppers

Pickles! If you're a word nerd like me, occasionally you find yourself over at the Online Etymology Dictionary, where you can you look up the origins of words. Since we're talking pickles today, I thought I'd share with you the history of "pickle":

"c. 1400, 'spiced sauce served with meat or fowl' (early 14c. as a surname), probably from Middle Dutch pekel 'pickle, brine,' or related words in Low German and East Frisian (Dutch pekel, East Frisian päkel, German pökel), which are of uncertain origin or original meaning. Klein suggests the name of a medieval Dutch fisherman who developed the process.

The meaning 'cucumber preserved in pickle' first recorded 1707, via use of the word for the salty liquid in which meat, etc. was preserved (c. 1500)."

That's the noun, of course; the verb "pickle" came into use in about the 1550s. Related is my new favorite thing to say, "piccalilli," from 1769, meaning

"pickle of chopped vegetables."

And that's where I'm ultimately headed. July is National Pickle Month, but there are so many more pieces of produce you can pickle besides cucumbers. At its essence, pickling is simply the process of preserving edible products in an acid solution, usually vinegar, or in salt solution (brine). Usually, pickles refer to vegetable products, but sometimes, fish, eggs or meat are also subjected to pickling. (With meats, the process is usually called "curing" instead.)

According to the Encyclopedia of Food and Health, most major vegetables can be preserved by pickling, either commercially or in households. Cucumbers, cabbage and green olives account for the largest volume of vegetables and fruits commercially pickled in Western countries. Capers, garlic, onions, carrots, cauliflower, beans and other vegetables are also pickled, albeit in lesser quantities. In Asian countries, fermented vegetables are very popular too, and


As your garden inches closer to harvest time, you may consider pickling as a way to preserve things you don't eat fresh. Good choice! It's very easy to do. A "quick pickle" involves just boiling water, vinegar, sugar, salt and spices before covering your produce with that liquid and waiting a few hours. Epicurious has a great quick pickle brine recipe to get you going here. As for the spices – that's up to you. There's a lot of ways to play

with your preserves!





