#### Summer's the time for camping and campfires

Summer is here and many people, even ones who spend a lot of time working outdoors, look forward to camping trips.

One of the best things about camping is, of course, a campfire. There's nothing like foraging for your own sticks and building a cozy fire just as evening falls across the forest or wherever you are camping. It can also be one of the most frustrating things about spending time in the outdoors.

Even Boy Scouts can have trouble with this one. I remember taking my Venturing crew camping and not far from us was a rather large noisy Boy Scout troop. All afternoon, it had been sprinkling rain off and on and now, as night fell, it threatened to storm. I put my daughter, then 13, in charge of building our campfire. She and the other girls scattered like squirrels to gather some kindling and

firewood. In a little while, they came struggling back under their loads, pockets bulging with tinder and kindling material. I enjoyed watching as they worked around the metal fire ring and after a couple of tries, soon had a nice little fire going, just in time to chase away the shadows that were starting to creep across the camp. Listening to the Scouts' laughter and conversation just over the hill, I concluded they had gotten their fire going too. I was wrong.

In a few minutes, the laughter turned into barks and I heard the Scoutmaster whistle. Wondering what was going on, curiosity got the better of me and I went to take a look. Peeking through the pine trees, I saw the problem. There, surrounded by a dozen or so Scouts and leaders, was the saddest little pile of sticks and wet needles I ever saw. The Scoutmaster was shaking his head, obviously not impressed

with the boys' attempts at fire building 101. I thought about sending my crew over to help them out but thought better of it. I just eased my way back to our warm, glowing fire and enjoyed the marshmallows and hot dogs we had brought for dinner.

I'm sure they got their fire going, but it is a little tricky to start one in the rain or on damp ground or in the snow. The main thing to remember about camping, fire building and cooking outdoors is safety. Teaching the kids and grandkids about nature and taking care of the land is one of the joys of life. Even kids who grow up in the country can learn plenty and continue to develop a keen appreciation for everything outdoors. The main things are keep it fun for everyone; leave the place as you found it or better; take everything with you that you brought; leave only your footprints; and most importantly, treasure the memories.

#### **Rex's Campfire Baked Beans**

Nothing tastes quite as good as food cooked over an open fire in the great outdoors. This is a family favorite.

- 3 28 oz. cans Bush's Baked Beans
- 1 bell pepper, chopped (any color)
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 2 cups cubed hickory smoked bacon
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1 cup BBQ sauce of choice

Brown bacon in cast iron Dutch oven on medium fire (can cook over coals or an outdoor grill). Remove when crispy and set aside. Sauté onion and bell pepper in bacon grease until translucent. Add garlic and cook

two minutes. Add bacon back to Dutch oven and simmer two minutes. Add beans, brown sugar, honey and BBQ sauce. Cook until bubbly, stirring occasionally. Remove from fire and ring the dinner bell!

# TTER TO THE EDITOR

As the sizable crowd gathered August 9th upstairs in the firehouse, they were met with the severed head of the Dummy Light splayed as a tribute trophy in front of the Canajoharie Village Board. How shocked everyone was to find the first item on the agenda was "Resolution: Village Traffic Light Committee...goal to determine Dummy Light Memorial resting place per village board approval at (future) October board meeting..." A committee is to be formed to determine a location. Sounds like a funeral for the Dummy Light with only the cemetery to be determined. When was this resolution proposed? Certainly not at the June meeting. There was no July meeting at all. So, according to this resolution the decision has already been made to remove the Dummy Light from Wagner Square.

The mayor spent nearly an hour droning on from a two-page list of items which included such pressing issues as the amount of chorine used by WWTP and a salary adjustment for the interim Deputy Clerk. Occasionally board members read from prepared scripts. They acted as bored as those in attendance.

When it was finally time for public comment, several people spoke succinctly and eloquently about why the Dummy Light should be returned to Wagner Square. Each speaker received a round of applause. The mayor shuffled papers and walked around during some of the public comment. At no time did any members of the public behave in a rude or discourteous fashion. The Board did not respond to any of the public comments.

This meeting was a disgraceful display of rudeness, arrogance and indifference to the public. In addition to the Dummy Light issue, no clear path was stated for removal of the fire destroyed properties on Otsego St. (15 months and counting) or Wheeler St. (4 months and counting).

It is apparent that most of the current board is tired, out of original thought and unable or unwilling to serve the residents of the Village of Canajoharie. We deserve better from our public servants.

#### Dear Editor,

I am writing this letter to express my ongoing concern about the unwillingness of the Village Board of Canajoharie to restore the iconic Dummy Light to our historic Wagner Square. This light has stood in Wagner Square since 1926 in one form or another. It is part of Canajoharie's identity. It makes us unique. It is a piece of our history. The citizens and visitors of Canajoharie have clearly spoken, and the vast majority wants it put back to the spot it was in, as a working traffic light, not memorialized in a park somewhere. The board, who had a resolution ready, allowed us the time to speak during the public comments section of the August board meeting, however Mayor Baker asked for the motion to accept the resolution, got the motion, the second and the vote before he even had made his 20-foot walk from the area of the room he was standing in after the last person had spoken. There was no intention of even pretending they were going to listen to the desires of the community. They had made their minds up, and that was that. The resolution says, "Traffic Light Committee, Approval Board Sept. board Meeting. Goal to determine Dummy Light Memorial resting place per Village Board Approval on October Board meeting. Committee member. 5-village residence, 1 out town residence, 1 Trustee as Chairman. If you desired to be placed on committee mail, request to Clerk prior to August 31, 2022. Name, place of residence, who you represent phone number, email" The bad grammar and punctuation appears here the exact way it was printed on the agenda we all were given.

The points that they stand on, illegal traffic device, uninsurable and personal liability have yet to be proven out. If they truly had a letter from the DOT (Department of Transportation) stating that it would be illegal for them to re-install the light and a letter from the Insurance underwriters that said they would not insure the light leaving the board liable in any potential law suits they would have copied them, and passed them out to everyone to see. I am a reasonable person, but I am not a sheep. I am not going to believe any of those points they have dug their heels in about.

Why don't I believe these points? Because, in my opinion, they don't exist. I do believe there IS a LETTER from Albany DOT and likewise, one from Utica DOT stating that although it is not an approved traffic calming device, (because they are not going to be liable to fix it when it malfunctions or gets hit. It is unique, not standard equipment, and they don't have the parts to fix it), it NOWHERE WILL SAY that it is ILLEGAL to re-install it. I believe it will say, you own it, you take care of it. I also believe that if there is an actual letter from an underwriter it will say, IF it IS ILLEGAL, then we probably would suggest you don't put it back because then you might not have a leg to stand on in the event of a lawsuit. I believe they would point out that their opinion would be contingent on PROOF that it is ILLEGAL. This light has been a part of the village insurance policy for 96 years, I cannot, and will not accept that it is no longer insurable.

My suggestion now to the Mayor and his board is to just not do anything. No committee, no memorializing. Just keep the parts safe and locked up and do NOTHING. Mayor Baker has publicly announced he is not running for re-election. I believe 2 of the 4 trustees' terms are up this year. Let the new mayor tackle this problem. We will cling to the hope the next Mayor will feel the community pride and share our conviction. Leave the stop signs that replaced the light where they are and get on with life. Do nothing. Wash your hands of it and let the next Mayor and new trustees deal with all of us Dummy Light loving community members. Leave our Dummy Light ALONE.



The series is comprised of the video time of worship, a blog and three Bible studies that can be used as a spiritual wellness program for those in their third chapter of


life, wherever they live.





# HOME IMPROVEMENT

#### Three factors to consider before converting an attic

At the onset of the pandemic, many homeowners suddenly found themselves in need of more usable square footage in their homes. Required to work from home due to social distancing recommendations, millions of working professionals suddenly found themselves setting up shop at kitchen tables or islands, in alcoves, garages or even walk-in closets. Those makeshift offices were never supposed to be permanent, but as companies loosen workplace policies and embrace full remote or hybrid working arrangements, profession-

als are seeking more permanent home office solutions.

Home additions are a possibility for homeowners who need more usable square footage, but add-ons may not be the right option for everyone. If adding on won't work, homeowners may want to look up ... at their attics.

Attics with ample space can make for ideal home offices, as they're away from the hustle and bustle of a home's main floor. That can make it easier to concentrate when everyone is in the house and reduce the likelihood that

video calls with colleagues and clients will be interrupted by kids and pets.


Attic conversions are not always possible, and the following are three important factors homeowners may need to consider before they can go forward with such projects.

- 1. **Dimensions:** Both the renovation experts at This Old House and the real estate experts at UpNest indicate that at least half of a finished attic must be a minimum of seven feet high and seven feet wide and 70 square feet. Requirements may differ depending on where homeowners live, but that 7-7-70 guideline is generally the minimum requirement. An attic that fails to meet such requirements won't necessarily be a lost cause, but it might be costly to make adjustments that ultimately align with local codes.
- 2. Access: Access is another aspect that must adhere to local safety guidelines. Many attics are accessible only through pulldown ladders, but that will have to change if homeowners repurpose their attic spaces. A staircase that complies with local laws will need to be installed, and contractors can work with homeowners to build that and estimate the cost. Homeowners who simply want to put desks in their attics without going with full-

fledged conversions are urged to adhere to local access requirements anyway, as they're intended to ensure residents can safely escape attics in the case of a fire or another emergency.

3. Climate control: Attics are converted to provide residents with more livable space. Converted space is only livable if the climate within the attic can be controlled so it's cool in the summer and warm in the winter. An existing HVAC unit needs to efficiently heat and cool an extra room. If it can't, bills might spike because the rest of the home likely won't be as comfortable, forcing homeowners to adjust thermostats to offset that discomfort. That also could affect the unit's life expectancy. Before going forward with an attic renovation, homeowners should contact HVAC professionals to determine if attic spaces can be serviced with the existing units and ductwork, or if an alternative arrangement must be worked out to make the spaces livable.

### **Common garden invasives:** What you can do

While summer provides a bounty of fruits, veggies and flowers, it also brings invasive

that you might find in your garden or landscape often started out as decorative landscape plants. Plants like knotweed, goutweed, burning bush and Japanese barberry were once imported for their attractive and vigorous garden characteristics.

Bishop's weed or goutweed is a garden menace that is easily spread by pieces of rhizomes.

For example, knotweed (Fallopia japonica) has a lot of characteristics that likely made it attractive to plant in the past. It has showy flowers and seedheads, yellow-orange fall color and red showy stems. It easily forms hedges and grows in almost any condition. Ironically, this growth habit is exactly what makes knotweed

invasive today.

Knotweed is an expert at spreading. Just a little piece of a root or stem can sprout into a new plant. Its opportunistic spirit makes it very good at establishing in eroded areas, such as river banks. It looks very obvious along river banks, forming dense hedges and stifling diverse native plant arowth.

If you have knotweed in your home garden, there are a number of ways to manage it. The first is mechanical, or cutting back the plants by hand. This should begin in the spring and continue through the growing season. After multiple years, the constant cutting should weaken the plants.

If cutting knotweed, the fresh stalks and roots should be thoroughly dried and browned in the sun before composting. Lay the cuttings on a tarp or plastic and ensure that the cuttings do not touch the edges, as it can spread

Cuttings can alternatively be sealed in thick, black plastic bags and left in the sun to solarize, but this requires hot.

sunny weather to be effective.

Other options for management in the home garden include smothering the plants with layers of heavy black plastic and wood chips.

Bishop's weed or gout-(Aegopodium poweed dagraria) is another garden menace that spreads easily by pieces of rhizomes. It grows low (1-3 feet tall), in large, uniform swaths. Each leaf is made up of nine leaflets and can be a solid or variegated

Management for bishop's weed is very similar to knotweed, including consistent hand pulling and smothering. Proper disposal is also essential, so make sure every piece gets into a trash bag or onto a tarp to dry and solarize.

Another common garden invasive is burning bush (Euonymus alatus). It has fantastic fall color, with leaves turning a vibrant red, and tiny, bright red berry-like pods that grow on the underside of the stem. The stems have ridges and make almost a square shape, which makes the bush easily identifiable by touch.

Japanese barberry (Berberis thunbergii) is an aggressive shrub with clusters of one-inch leaves that are often located on the upper side of the stem, thorns and tiny red berries that droop on the underside of the stem. The plant comes in many cultivars with foliage that can be yellow to green to red and purple. Japanese barberry spreads by roots and seeds, quickly tak-

Burning bush and barberry should be cut back before fruiting to help prevent spreading the seed. The plant and roots should be carefully dried on plastic or tarps before composting or tossing in the brush pile.

As you can tell, some of the common invasive garden plants have attractive qualities, but their aggressiveness has enabled them to spread into the wild, stifling native plant communities and habitats. You should also keep an eye out for plants in your own garden that technically may not be invasive, but may act aggressively.

Interested in what more you can do? Try to grow more native plants in your garden. Doing this will help build habitat for native insects and pollinators, and help prevent future decorative plants from spread-

Vision is the most important human sense involved in learning and many learning problems are associated with vision problems.

In fact, one of the most common questions I get asked is "When is a good time to get my child's eyes examined?" The quick answer to this is there is never a wrong time, but for those of you seeking a more specific answer my recommendation is unless you notice something abnormal (cross-eyedness, your child holding or getting really close to things or a possible infection such as pink eye), then every child should have an examination before the start of kindergarten. This way if a problem is found we can address it early on before it has the chance to

impact their learning.



#### Cash-out vs. change term mortgage refinancing

Mortgage refinancing has long been a valuable option for homeowners looking to save money. Refinancing has become an especially enticing option since the onset of the pandemic, as mortgage interest ranks have sunk to historic lows. Despite that, a recent survey from Bankrate found that 74% of homeowners who have had the same mortgage since before the pandemic have not refinanced. Homeowners who haven't yet refinanced but are considering doing so can consider two types of mortgage refinancing options.

• Cash-out: According to the mortgage experts at Mortgage Calculator.org, a cash-out mortgage extracts equity from a home. Homeowners in the U.S. have more than \$6 trillion in untapped home equity, and that can be used to pay for various expenses, including home improvements, tuition and medical costs. The financial experts at Nerd Wallet note that a cash-out refinance works by replacing an existing mortgage with a new home loan for more money than homeowners owe on their homes. The difference is then given to the homeowners in cash, which they can use for the aforementioned expenses or other costs, including paying down high-interest debts. Lower interest rates typically entice homeowners to refinance, but if homeowners are solely looking for lower rates, then a cash-out refinance is probably not the best option.

• **Change term:** Also known as a rate-and-term refinance, a change term is a refinance characterized by shifting to a lower interest rate. Homeowners also may refinance utilizing

a change term to shift from an adjustable rate mortgage to a fixed-rate loan. Change term refinancing also is popular for homeowners who want to switch from the standard 30-year fixed rate to a 15-year fixed rate. This can shorten the term of the loan, saving homeowners a lot of money in interest over the 15-year period. However, homeowners should note that switching from a 30-year to a 15-year loan will lead to higher monthly payments. This switch might be most suitable to individuals earning significantly higher salaries than they were at the start of their initial mortgages and/or homeowners whose cost of living has recently decreased due to certain changes, such as children graduating from college. Homeowners also may consider change term mortgages to lower their monthly payments. In such instances, they simply swap out an existing 30-year mortgage for a new 30-year mortgage with a lower interest rate. That can save money up front, but homeowners should calculate the long-term interest costs of switching to

a new 30-year mortgage. The lower monthly payments might be tempting, but homeowners may ultimately pay more in interest over the life of both loans by switching to a new 30-year mortgage.





#### What to know about EV batteries

Electric cars remain a novelty for millions of people who haven't yet imagined the day when they'll cut ties with combustion engines. That day might be coming sooner rather than later, and if it does it will mark the culmination of a history that's longer than even some ardent auto enthusiasts may realize.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, innovators in Hungary, the Netherlands and the U.S. considered battery-powered vehicles as far back as the early 1800s. Electric vehicles (EVs) have gone through some considerable ups and downs since those early days, but reached a significant turning point in 2000, when the Japanese automaker Toyota released the Prius worldwide. The Prius was the first mass-produced hybrid electric vehicle and it paved the way for many of the modern EVs on the road today.

Despite the release of the Prius more than two decades ago, motorists may still have many questions about EVs. Perhaps the most common question about EVs concerns their batteries.

# How long do EV batteries last?

Individuals may be hesitant to purchase their own EV out of a fear that the battery will not last as long as the standard combustion engine in more traditional, gas-powered vehicles. But the automotive experts at CarFax note that all EV batteries sold in the U.S. come with warranties that last for no less than eight years or up to 100.000 miles.

# What do the warranties cover?

The automotive resource Car and Driver urges drivers considering EVs to read

Drivers should still read these manufacturers' warranties carefully to confirm just what is and isn't covered regarding their EV batteries.

# How long do EV batteries typically last?

The online EV resource EVBox notes that charging a battery will affect its lifespan. That might scare some prospective EV buyers off, as various sources indicate the average cost of a new EV battery is around \$5,500, though some can cost as much as \$15,000. But the loss of charging capacity is perhaps not as big a concern as drivers might think. Plug In Amer-

ica, a nonprofit educational organization that advocates the use of plug-in vehicles, reports that a Tesla Model S loses only around 5% of its original capacity over the first 50,000 miles, and the depletion rate slows down after that. Since many individuals prefer to replace their vehicles long before they reach the 100,000-mile marker, it's reasonable to expect EV buyers will never have to replace the batteries on their plug-in cars or trucks.

There's still much for drivers to learn about EVs. Understanding how EV batteries work and how long they should continue to do so may calm some of the more common concerns consumers have about plug-in vehicles.

Vehicle owners need to keep maintenance on the mind to ensure their cars and trucks are operating at peak capacity. Various components should be checked and serviced at key intervals. Oil changes and fluid top-offs are part of routine maintenance, but it can be easy to forget about other important parts of the vehicle, including tires.

Rotating tires is vital to their upkeep. Bridgestone Tires advises that tire rotation involves

routinely repositioning a vehicle's tires in specific patterns from front to back and side to side. According to Big O Tires, the front tires tend to wear on the outside edges because the tire leans over when a driver turns a corner. The rear tires just follow the front ones, so they usually wear more evenly. By leaving tires in place, the outside edges on the front tires will wear down much faster than the rest and those tires will need to be re-

placed sooner. Rotation may be required by tire warranties. Rotation also keeps the tires working properly.

Experts generally advise tire rotation every 6,000 to 8,000 miles, even if they do not show any signs of wear. It is challenging to determine if weather treads are uneven or how much wear has been sustained just by looking at them. Rotating tires can prolong the life of tires and decrease how frequently they need to be replaced.

Rotating tires keeps the tread depth uniform and helps maintain traction and consistent handling across all four tires. Bridgestone says the tire rotation pattern that is best for a particular vehicle depends on the type of tire being used. Patterns are recommended by the standardizing body of the tire industry, called the Tire and Rim Association Inc. Individuals can consult with professional mechanics about the proper way to rotate tires. Many tire manufacturers or automotive stores that have sold customers tires also will do tire rotations, some free of charge.

In addition to proper traction, minimizing uneven tire treads causes the vehicle to be more balanced, advises Wrench, a mobile auto repair and maintenance company. This enables the driver to have more control even when roads are slippery. Many auto service centers will then align and balance tires after they have been rotated. At this time the mechanic will likely check brakes as well, since it is easy to see and reach them when the tires are off.

Tire rotation is an important component of vehicle maintenance. Check with a qualified automotive professional to see if it's time to have your vehicle's tires rotated.
