The Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority (Authority) is pleased to announce that CONMED, located in Utica has received the Authority's RecycleOne Business Certification

About the Authority's RecycleOne Business Certification

The RecycleOne Business Certification requires an on-site review from Authority staff to verify that specific solid waste management, recycling and energy reduction criteria have been achieved. If the criteria have been achieved, the Authority will issue the facility or business an official RecycleOne Business Certification.

This certification is free and available to all businesses located in Oneida and Herkimer counties. Certified businesses will receive a framed certificate to display, will be featured on the Authority's website and will be eligible to win the Authority's annual Recycling Champion Award.

CONMED's Waste Reduction Efforts

Education – CONMED celebrates diversity and encourages all employees to participate in sustainability initiatives. Since CONMED employees speak a variety of languages, the Authority worked with CONMED's EHS Committee Waste Subcommittee to create multilingual posters and digital slideshows that were placed above waste and recycling bins, showing what items should go in each bin. The EHS Committee is using these educational materials to create a "culture of recycling" in the workplace that employees would be able to replicate in their daily lives.

Waste Committee Waste Audit – This waste audit conducted by the Waste Subcommittee included taking inventory and mapping locations of waste bins. A common misconception is that with more waste bins, more people will recycle and properly dispose of waste, however, this can overcomplicate things and lead to confusion or lack of proper waste disposal. Through this waste audit, the subcommittee and custodians identified and removed 40 unnecessary waste bins.

Waste Tracking - All the waste that CONMED generates is recorded so data can be analyzed and used for determining opportunities for improvement. These waste reduction efforts align with the objectives set forth in their ISO14001 certified environmental management system. Wastes that are accounted for include: plastic, paper, scrap metal, chemicals, lightbulbs, batteries, and medical waste. Any abnormalities within these waste streams are noted, investigated, and corrected via their corrective and preventive actions procedure.

KMVB Waste Cleanup – This year, CONMED took part in the annual Keep Mohawk Valley Beautiful (KMVB) litter cleanup and beautification event. Thirty employees volunteered, and together they collected 20 bags of litter from the green spaces surrounding CONMED's property. The Waste Subcommittee plans to coordinate this effort every year.

"CONMED was a great company to work with through our RecycleOne Business Certification Program," said Authority Recycling Coordinator, Eileen Brinck. "They were looking for a way to set themselves apart from other companies in their industry, which they have gone

above and beyond with through achieving this certification. We are looking forward to working with them in the future" she continued.

Honor America on Patriot Day

Sept. 11, 2001, was a tragic day in American history. On that day, nearly 3,000 innocent lives were lost due to the terrorist attacks in New York City and Washington, D.C. as well as in rural Pennsylvania, where another plane en route for more destruction crash-landed.

The indelible images of the World Trade Center collapsing in flames with crowds running for safety, as well as the ensuing visions of heroes and citizens working together, have created a lasting impression.

While buildings have been repaired and new sites erected in the wake of the attacks, there are many ways to continue to honor the fallen. Patriot Day, which takes place each year on Sept. 11 to honor those who lost their lives in the 9-11 attacks, is one such example. The following are a handful of ways that people can honor 9-11 victims and their families.

- Celebrate local heroes by visiting or making donations of food or supplies to local firehouses and police stations.
- Commemorate the events of 9-11 by observing moments of silence at key times throughout the day: 8:46 a.m., 9:03 a.m., 9:37 a.m., 9:59 a.m., 10:03 a.m. and 10:28 a.m.
- Engage in service projects that can help your community, including its underserved individuals, like veterans. National Day of Service, which is the same day as Patriot Day, asks people to do at least one good deed in honor of those who died on 9-11.
 - Make a trip to New York City and visit the

National September 11 Memorial & Museum.

- If you display a flag at your home or business, be sure to place it at half-staff from sunrise to sunset to mourn the lives lost.
- Share stories of the heroism and bravery of first responders with young children who may not have been alive in 2001.
 - · Unite the country by promoting acceptance of and kindness to all people,

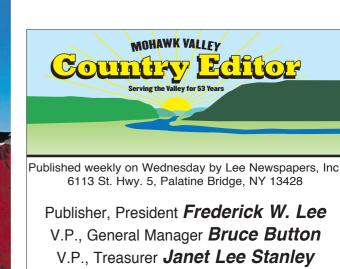

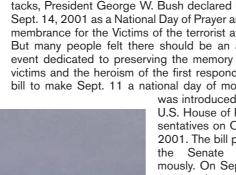

Did you know?

Each Sept. 11, communities across the United States commemorate the lives lost during the 2001 terrorist attacks that took place on American soil. On Sept. 11, 2001, four commercial airplanes were hijacked and sent to various targets in the United States. Two planes crashed into the towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, one plane crashed into the U.S. Pentagon Building near Washington, D.C., and a fourth plane was intercepted from the hijackers and crash-landed in rural Pennsylvania. In the immediate aftermath of the attacks, President George W. Bush declared Friday, Sept. 14, 2001 as a National Day of Prayer and Remembrance for the Victims of the terrorist attacks. But many people felt there should be an annual event dedicated to preserving the memory of the victims and the heroism of the first responders. A bill to make Sept. 11 a national day of mourning

was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives on Oct.25, 2001. The bill passed unanimously. On Sept. 11, 2002, the country recognized the first Patriot Day. On this day, the U.S. flag is flown at half-mast. In addition, a moment of silence beginning at 8:46 a.m. is observed to correspond with the attacks. A \$5 donation per pet is suggested to defray costs.

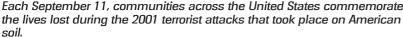

A 2020 study by researchers at the London School of Economics and Political Science found that 89% of interactions with phones were unprompted. That suggests people are simply picking up their phones even when notifications or incoming calls aren't making them do so. Keeping a phone in another room when dining, reading a book, engaging with family members or participating in other activities can help people avoid that familiar urge to pick up their phone.

• Utilize apps to curtail your usage. Various apps allow users to block their own access to other apps and websites. These apps, which include Flipd and Freedom, are designed to help smartphone users regain productivity they might have lost due to their smartphone usage. The apps can be utilized in various ways, and one such way is to restrict access to games

and websites during the workday. They also can be used to restrict access during family time or other hours of the day when people don't want to be distracted by the internet.

• Set up auto reply. Many professionals set up out-of-of-fice messages to notify colleagues and clients when they're on vacation or engaging in projects that will prevent them from answering emails. The same principle can be applied to text messages. According to a 2019 survey from CTIA, which has tracked the evolution of the U.S. wireless industry since 1985, two trillion text messages were exchanged in 2019. That's a lot of messages, and texting is a significant reason why so many people have problems putting down their phones. An automatic response informing friends, family and colleagues that you're away from your phone can be a great way to spend less time texting.

Smartphone usage is on the rise, even among people who want to put their phones down more often. Such users can try various approaches to spend less time on their phones.

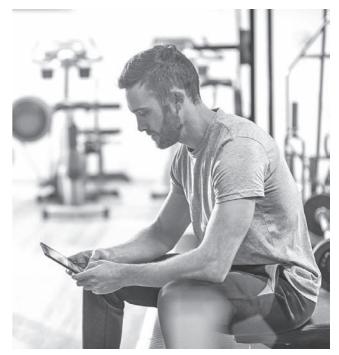

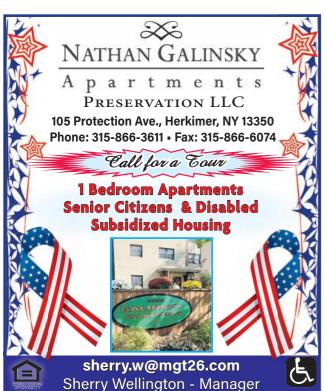

How to navigate the confusion around stretching

Fitness and healthcare professionals generally agree that stretching is an important component of an effective workout regimen. However, there remains some confusion as to when to stretch and which stretches athletes should perform to maintain optimal health and flexibility. For example, Harvard Medical School notes that stretching was once believed necessary to warm up muscles and prepare them for activity. However, the Mayo Clinic now notes that stretching should not be considered a warmup activity. Rather, the general consensus among healthcare professionals is that individuals should first warm up their bodies for five to 10 minutes with some light exercise, such as low-intensity walking or jogging. In addition, the Mayo Clinic notes that some research has suggested that preevent stretching adversely affects athletes' performance. That may be a concern for competitive athletes and can add to the confusion non-competitive fitness enthusiasts have about the importance of stretching.

Individuals who exercise to improve their overall health can stretch after their five- to 10-minute warmup and then again after completing their cardio and strength training. Competitive athletes can consult their coaches and trainers about when to stretch and which stretches to perform. When stretching, all people, including competitive athletes and individuals who exercise as part of their healthcare routines, should focus on proper form. Numerous online tutorials indicate how to stretch the various muscle groups in a way that improves flexibility and decreases injury risk.

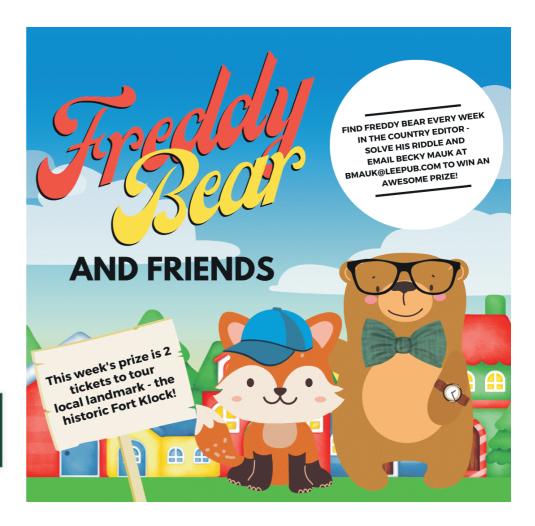

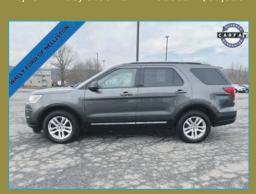

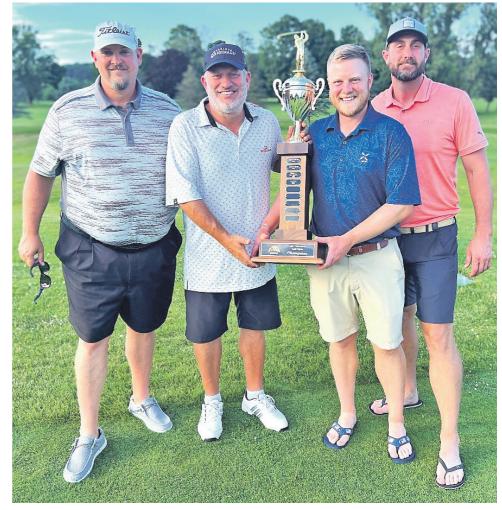
Arc Herkimer Golf Open held at MV Golf & Event Center

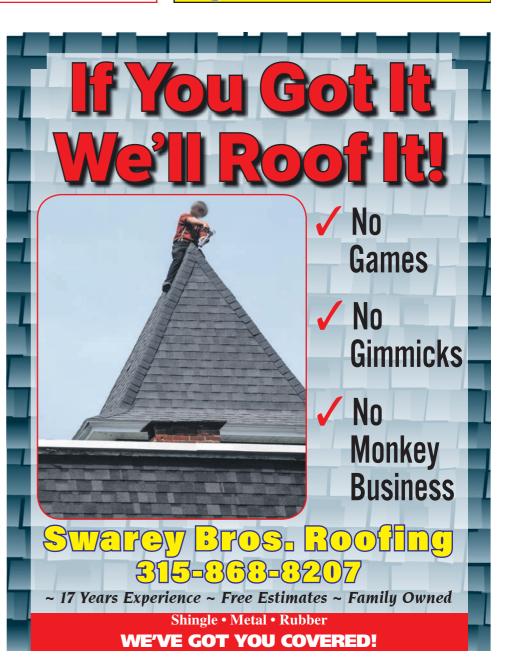




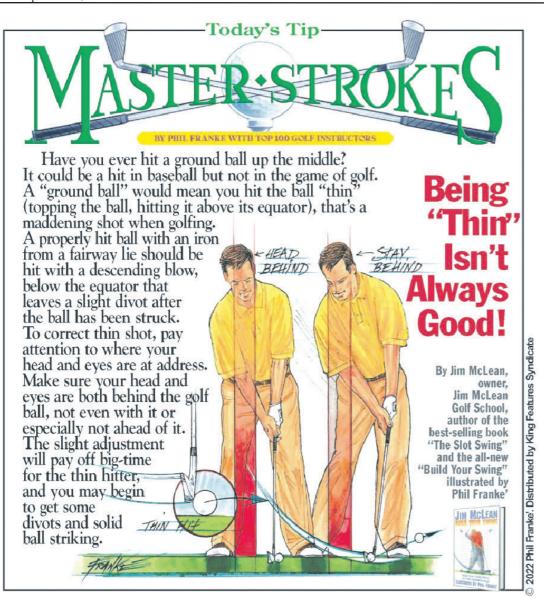

Increased surrenders, hoarding situation put pressure on SQSPCA



For the first time ever, the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in Cooperstown has lengthy waiting lists for both cats and dogs. Shelter staff have seen a 29 percent increase in stray animals and pets surrendered by owners since June 1 of this year, in keeping with an emerging alarming nationwide trend. And with this influx of homeless animals has come something the SQSPCA rarely sees a lot of-puppies!

"We are in the process of taking in more than a dozen Australian cattle dog mixes, most of which are from 2-5 months old," said SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes. "These puppies are part of a hoarding case. All of them have arrived literally crawling with fleas. They are severely under socialized and have never seen the inside of a house."

While puppies are highly sought after by adopters and generally find new homes very quickly, the timing could not be worse.

"Like most shelters

throughout the region, the state and even across the country, the SQSPCA is full of adoptable cats and dogs," Haynes explained. "At the same time, adoptions have slowed down considerably. We are overwhelmed, and there are still more puppies and adult dogs from this group to be admitted to the shelter."

Since Aug. 24, the SQSP-CA has received nine of the puppies. The shelter's staff and veterinarians are working tirelessly to keep up as animals come in.

"People visit our facility and see animals waiting to be adopted and eager to find their forever homes. What they don't see is how much work goes on behind the scenes before these animals can be made available to the

public," said Haynes.

"Dogs and cats arriving at the shelter go through a detailed intake process. All animals are dewormed, treated for external parasites, and vaccinated upon entry. They also receive thorough exams from our medical care team to determine if their condition warrants additional treatments and/or procedures. If animals come to us unaltered, they are spayed or neutered as soon as we can get them on the schedule," Haynes added.

Unfortunately, hoarding cases like this one are not unusual. This year alone the SQSPCA has taken in and/or helped more than 100 animals from similar situations, putting a strain on resources ranging from food and shelter supplies to medical and

animal care personnel.

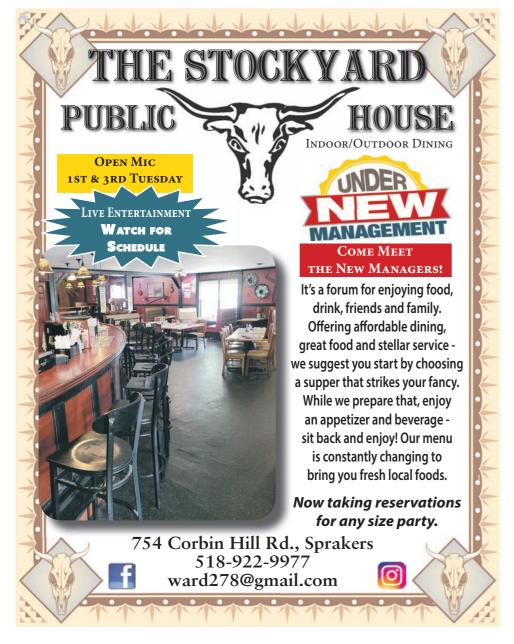
"In 2021, we cared for just under 1,200 animals," explained Haynes. "This year we have already cared for 958 animals, and we have four more months to go. Our new facility and staff are really being put to the test and the budget is being stretched pretty thin."

Meanwhile the puppies, oblivious to these concerns, are already beginning to find new homes. Sheldon, Leonard, Howard and Mikey have been adopted or are with fosters. Bernadette and other littermates are awaiting surgery.

"As I mentioned, these pups have not been around people much, so we may have to start up our 'Fearful to Fearless' dog socialization program again if they are not adopted soon," Haynes added. "The program depends on assistance from the community to help turn extremely shy dogs into confident, loving pets through positive association and experiences.

"Volunteers are another valuable resource feeling the effects of high surrender rates and low adoption numbers," Haynes said.

The SQSPCA, located at 5082-5088 State Highway 28, Cooperstown, is open Tuesday through Saturday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. with new evening hours on Thursdays from 5-7 p.m. Appointments to meet animals are advised to avoid wait times by calling 607.547.8111, but walk-ins are also welcome. Sportsmanship principles all young athletes should know

Competitive sports have a lot to offer young people. In addition to exposing children to the thrill of competition, competitive sports can set a foundation for a lifetime of healthy living. One study published in the American Journal of Preventive Medicine in 2014 found that afterschool physical activity programs were the most effective strategy to reduce childhood obesity among children ages 6 - 12.

Competitive sports also teach valuable lessons about humility and respect. Sportsmanship is a vital and valuable component of competitive sports, and that's a lesson no athlete is too young to learn. Coaches and parents can work together to emphasize these principles of sportsmanship to young athletes.

• Always respect officials. In the era of instant replay in professional sports, criticism of officials has become more common. Such criticism can easily move from the professional to the amateur arena if players are not taught to always respect the officials. Unfortunately, many amateur sports officials continue to be

the victims of overaggressive behavior on the parts of coaches, parents and athletes, and many have simply chosen to walk away rather than subject themselves to abuse. Estimates from the National Association of Sports Officials indicates that the group's membership has dropped by more than 20% since March 2020. Coaches and parents can practice what they preach when teaching young athletes to respect officials at all times, regardless of how games unfold on the playing field.

- Respect the rules. Respect for officials should coexist with respect for the game itself. Every game has rules, and knowing and adhering to those rules is a vital component of good sportsmanship. Coaches and parents can set the tone for this by encouraging kids to play by the rules during the games, but also by adhering to rules governing practice times and offseason workouts when no one is watching too closely.
- Respect opponents. Showing respect for opponents is another principle of good sports-

manship. Social media provides a readily available platform for athletes to disparage their opponents before and after games. Such platforms have even proven too tempting to resist for some professional athletes. But showing respect for opponents, even in defeat, illustrates to parents and coaches that young athletes are mature and cognizant of the fact that participation in sports requires good sportsmanship.

 Respect coaches. Good sportsmanship also involves respecting coaches, even when they make decisions players and their parents do not necessarily agree with. That respect has been dwindling in recent years, and it's contributing to a coaching shortage in youth sports. One survey of more than 200 coaches in the Syracuse area found that nearly 60% of coaches had considered quitting over conflicts with parents. Many coaches volunteer their time to teach young people the game, and players should be taught to respect coaches at all times. That includes those times when players feel like they aren't getting enough playing time or when they disagree with coaches' in-game decisions.

Sportsmanship is a vital component of sports participation. Teaching young athletes the principles of sportsmanship adds one more unique benefit to sports participation.

How to help student-athletes navigate social media

Scholastic sports participation benefits student-athletes in myriad ways. Competitive sports teach students how to cope with the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat, while providing firsthand experience that emphasizes the value of working with others in pursuit of a common goal. Student-athletes often apply these lessons long after their playing days have ended, benefitting from their experiences in competitive sports throughout their lives.

Athletes of all ages can relate to some of the common experiences of competitive sports. At one point or another, all competitive athletes must learn to handle losing. But modern student-athletes have a relatively recent phenomenon to contend with that was not around when their parents played sports: social media. Social media can connect people in ways that were previously unimaginable. but it also poses unique challenges to modern student-athletes. Parents and coaches can help student-athletes navigate social media so it does not adversely affect their scholastic sports experiences.

· Consider shuttering accounts during the season. In recent years, numerous professional athletes have bravely acknowledged their mental health struggles. For example, NBA All-Star Kevin Love has shared tales of his struggles with anxiety and depression. These issues confound many athletes and can be exacerbated by negative comments on social media, particularly after a loss. Student-athletes can avoid the negative aspects of social media by

avoiding it during the season.

- · Emphasize the potential effects of athletes' own comments on social media. It's not just negative thoughts from disgruntled spectators that can make social media a minefield for young athletes. Student-athletes' own negative comments can have some lasting and unfortunate effects as well. A 2017 survey from the American Association of Collegiate Registrars found that 11% of respondents indicated they had denied admissions to an applicant based on social media content. Furthermore. an additional 7% acknowledged rescinding offers due to social media content. Fair or unfair, these decisions highlight the very real effects that comments made on social media can have on young people's futures. Sports often generates highly emotional responses, and parents and coaches can urge student-athletes to avoid voicing negative or knee-jerk reactions about opponents, officials or even games they're not involved in via social media. Such commentary could have unforeseen consequences that adversely affect student-athletes for years to come.
- · Highlight how student-athletes can use social media to their benefit. Social media can be a minefield, but it also presents opportunities for student-athletes to showcase themselves in a positive light. Parents and coaches can emphasize how student-athletes can use social media to show good sportsmanship. Win or lose, urge athletes to praise their teammates and opponents after a big game. Posi-

tive commentary on social media can be just as beneficial to student-athletes as negative commentary can be harmful. Student-athletes who showcase their maturity and sportsmanship on social media can improve their standing among college coaches and admissions officers.

Student-athletes who learn to successfully navigate social media can reap the rewards of those efforts for years to come.

image makes a person feels comfortable in their body, while a negative body image can put a person at higher risk of depression and eating disorders. Mental health experts say that a person's thoughts about their appearance can affect how that person feels about themselves, which can affect self-esteem. A positive body image can result in high levels of self-esteem, fostering confidence and inspiring an individual to prioritize selfcare. Conversely, a negative body image can result in lower

self-esteem. Harsh criticism of oneself may lead to antisocial

Six reasons for a check engine light

Modern vehicles utilize various technologies to ensure drivers remain as safe as possible behind the wheel. Technology also can alert drivers when their cars are in need of examination, and such is the case when the often dreaded "check engine" light comes on.

While a check engine indicator is seldom good news, it may not mean that expensive repairs are right around the corner. The following are six reasons why check engine lights come on and how to remedy these situations.

- 1. **Faulty/loose gas cap:** A faulty gas cap is one of the reasons a check engine light might turn on. A cap that is not tightly closed or one that is poorly sealed enables vapors to escape, which can trigger the light. Opening the gas cap and then resealing it tightly may help; otherwise, a replacement cap may be necessary.
- 2. **Faulty sensor:** Sometimes there is nothing wrong with the engine or other components, but the light sensor itself. The check engine light might come on because its sensor is corroded or not working properly.
- 3. Oxygen sensor failure: The oxygen sensor sends data to the vehicle's computer, which it uses to create the right mix of air and fuel to enter the engine's cylinders. The check engine light may come on when the sensor fails or registers a problem with the fuel/air mix.
- 4. **Ignition coils/spark plugs:** A check engine light may come on to warn drivers it is time to replace spark plugs and/or ignition coils. According to DigitalTrends, ignition coils generate the electricity needed for spark plugs to ignite the fuel and air mix in the cylinders. Worn coils or fouled plugs can cause any number of issues, including engine misfire.
 - 5. Catalytic converter issues: The catalytic convertor







heats up hydrocarbons and other emissions so that they turn into carbon dioxide and water vapor to help protect the environment, offers AutoZone. The converter usually does not fail on its own, but a mechanic can help diagnose what might cause the failure.

6. **Electronic powertrain controls:** Vehicles are large computerized devices with an array of sensors and modules that run powertrains. Any issues with these sensors, networks or modules can trigger the check engine light.

Depending on the make and model of a vehicle, a check engine light may require less urgency than a flashing light. It always helps to consult with the owner's manual to help determine issues. Automotive retail stores and mechanics can connect the car's computer to diagnostic equipment that will issue a diagnostic trouble code (DTC) that can serve as a starting point to address check engine light issues.

FARM, HOME & GARDEN

Protect landscapes from wildlife and more over the winter

Landscapes are vulnerable to the elements during the cold weather months. Everything from de-icing products to hungry animals to the weight of snow can affect trees, shrubs and other plants.

Just because certain greenery will go dormant during the winter doesn't mean landscape maintenance ends when the mercury dips. Homeowners can take certain actions to winterproof their properties and safeguard landscapes, so they recover more readily when spring arrives.

• Utilize barriers & deterrents - When resources are scarce, animals will be on the hunt for anything that's edible and that includes whatever greenery is growing on a landscape. Physical barriers in garden beds and around trees can help prevent damage caused by moles, voles and deer. Line the bottom and sides of garden beds with garden cloth to prevent ground-burrowing animals from getting in from beneath, suggests the gardening resource I Must Garden.

Wrapping shrubs in burlap or covering them in temporary netting can deter deer that will seek accessible food sources over the winter. Erect fencing around new trees to keep deer away from the bark and lower branches.

Make the yard less attractive to deer and burrowers by opting for fat-based suet cakes to feed birds rather than loose seeds and berries in feeders, which herbivores will enjoy. Also, don't overwater or mulch landscapes too early. The loose soil and warmth of the mulch may entice moles and voles and other rodents to stick around in those areas and feed on plants.

• Use a safer melting product - Investigate options in snowmelt products, as traditional rock salt can injure buds and branches and kill lawns. In addition, avoid piling salted snow in one area of the landscape, as it will concentrate the salt in that spot. Spread out snow piles to help minimize the damage to delicate plants.

• Secure saplings & juvenile plants - Harsh winds and battering snow can damage young plants. Use stakes and lattices to secure them so they'll be better able to withstand

the weather, suggests Total Landscape Management, a commercial and residential landscaping company.

Promptly remove snow from branches to help trees and shrubs; otherwise, the weight of ice and snow can break off branches and cause irreparable damage.

• Erect a snow barrier - Prior observation tends to educate homeowners about which areas of the landscape are most vulnerable to snow drifts and blustery winds. During winter, winds often blow in from a northeasterly direction, but each homeowner can make their own assessment. Put up a tarp between two stakes to serve as a "snow fence" that protects vulnerable areas of the landscape from blowing snow.

• Keep plants cozy - Wrap plants in burlap, garden blankets and plant domes to insulate them from cold weather and some animals. Move container plants into a garage or shielded area for winter.

Winter can place landscapes in peril. A few strategies can provide protection.

Strategies that can improve reading comprehension

Strong reading comprehension skills are one of the foundations of a successful academic career. According to the Institute of Reading Development, students with strong reading comprehension skills get a big boost in all subjects, including math and science.

Though the benefits of reading comprehension are well document-ed, many students are struggling in this area of their academics. Officials with the National Center for Education Statistics note that, over the last decade, students have made no progress in reading performance. That likely comes as no surprise to seasoned educators, as data indicate students are reading less outside of school than they have in years past. Data from the National Assessment of Educational Progress indicates the percentage of public school students who said they read 30 minutes or more a day declined by 4% between 2017 and 2019, dipping below 50% overall in the latter year.

There's likely a multitude of reasons why students now read less than they used to. Parents concerned about their children's reading comprehension can try these strategies to bolster this highly valuable skill.

• Let kids read what they like. The tutoring professionals at Oxford Learning® report that 73% of students indicate they would read more if they found books they liked. Parents can address this issue by taking children to their local libraries and letting them choose which books to check out. The more practice kids get with reading, the more their comprehension skills develop.

• Read aloud to children. Various studies have found that reading aloud to children significantly benefits literacy development. One study from the National Association for the Education of Young Children found that listening to others read helps children develop key understanding and skills, including how stories are written. In addition, the Reading Rockets project, which aspires to bring reading research to life in the hopes of helping young children develop into strong, confident readers, notes that children can listen on a higher language level than they can read. That makes complex ideas more accessible.

• Ask questions when reading to children. When reading to children, parents can compound the benefits of this activity by asking youngsters questions about the book. Asking what, when, where, why and how can encourage children to look for answers to these questions while they're being read to. As students advance and then read more on their own, parents can encourage them to ask these questions of themselves (if they're not already doing so on their own). Asking and answering these questions is a great way to strengthen reading comprehension skills.

Strong reading comprehension skills can help students reach their academic potential. Parents can employ various strategies to help children bolster those skills.

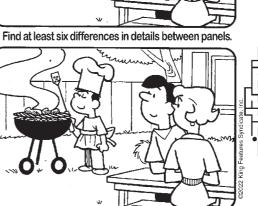

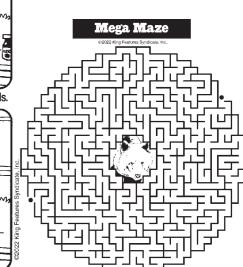

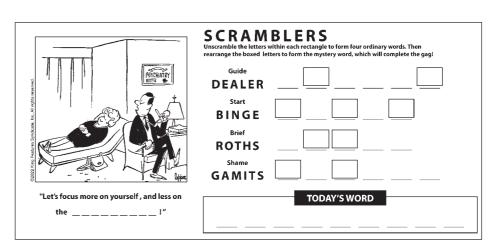

ilkweed is a critically important plant for the monarch butterfly, which is threatened with extinction. The monarch caterpillar uses milkweed as its primary food source, and its powerful flowers provide nectar for countless butterflies, bees and insects.

If you stop and observe a milkweed plant in flower for even a short time, you will likely see a frenzy of insect activity, which instantly illustrates how important these plants are to nature.

Interested in providing a home for the monarch butterfly and beneficial insects in your garden? Milkweed is the answer!

One way is to preserve existing patches anv of milkweed where you live. Instead of mowing the patch down, leave it

up as a wildflower patch throughout the summer and autumn.

Milkweed can be cut back after it has gone to seed and the fluffy white seeds have dispersed, usually around mid-October. If the seed pods haven't released their seeds by this time, you can open the pods and help disperse them yourself.

Don't pull milkweed from your garden. Embrace its informal growing habit, and allow it to grow freely among your flowers. It will fit right

Planting native milkweed by seed or transplants is another great way to support the monarch and other beneficial insects. If sowing seeds, the ideal time to plant is autumn as the seeds require cold stratification. In other words, the seeds

For transplants, wait until early spring after the danger of frost has passed to plant. Autumn planting may not give them adequate time to get established before winter.

You can sow seeds in spring, but they will need to be cold-treated for a high germination rate. To do this, place the seeds in moist paper towels in a plastic bag or container in a refrigerator with the temperature at 40° F for a minimum of three weeks to three months.

It is important to purchase locally sourced seeds plants. or Place-specific genetic variations can develop by region, so sourcing your plants near where you live will have the most beneficial result.

When you think of

milkweed, common milkweed is the plant that most likely comes to mind. This species grows two to three feet tall with showy and fragrant dusty pink to mauve flowers. It grows well in full sun with dry to medium dry soil moisture.

With striking orange flowers, butterfly milkweed is a showstopper in the garden. While slow to grow, the vibrant flowers on this perennial make it worth the wait. Growing one to 2.5 feet tall, it also prefers full sun and dry to medium dry conditions.

place-based geverv netics, so it is especially important to source this species locally. It has dusty pink flowers and grows taller than the previous species at three to four feet tall. As indicated by the name, this milkweed prefers soils that are medium to wet in moisture and full sun.

Another native, whorled milkweed has delicate white flowers and can reach heights of one to 2.5 feet. You can plant this in full sun or part shade. It grows best in dry to medium dry soil conditions.

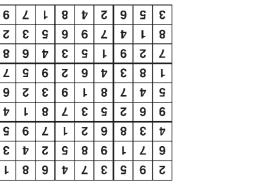

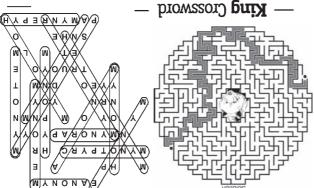
