Reenactment canceled

At their regular meeting held Sept. 14, members of Fort Klock Historic Restoration voted to cancel their Oct. 1-2 reenactment, Interrupted Harvest, due to the new gun law that went into effect Sept. 1, 2022. The reenactment, which portrays a raid in the Mohawk Valley during the Revolutionary War, is held biannually.

Because of the law, reenactors are not

allowed to carry firearms be it muskets, flintlocks or longrifles. While a spokesperson for Governor Hochul's office recently stated historical reenactments can proceed, to date there has been no amendment to the law, and there is no waiver in place to let events such as this happen.

Robert Metzger, chairman of the board of trustees, said some re-enactors, who come

from across the state and Canada, have expressed concern and others have stated they will not attend due to the new law. "It makes it impossible to plan an event and we don't want to endanger our invited guests or the organization. While the Governor's spokesperson says it's okay, the bottom line is that the law is still in effect. Until changes are made to law itself, we cannot resume our reenact-

ments. It is very disappointing that we had to cancel in 2020 due to COVID and now we have to cancel this year because of the new law," said Metzger.

Metzger and other members of Fort Klock are hopeful that an amendment will occur quickly so their 2023 opening day scheduled for May 20 will be able to proceed as planned.

Mohawk Valley Center for the Arts celebrates volunteers



Little Falls Cheese Festival adds 'Les Moutons' to the herd


The Little Falls Cheese Festival committee has announced the addition of "Les Moutons" to the seventh annual Cheese Festival, which take place Oct. 1.





Pathways Academy orientation takes students on scavenger hunt

The Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Pathways Academy started off the first day of school for students with a team-based scavenger hunt around the building to help students get comfortable in their environment.

It didn't hurt that when students completed the scavenger hunt, they were able to use the clues to open a lockbox containing a special treat.

"This is hopefully an engaging way to get the kids to move around the building a little bit and get to know important personnel and locations," Pathways Academy Principal Patrick Corrigan said.

The first day of school at the Herkimer BOCES Pathways Academy was Sept. 6. Pathways Academy focuses on students who have had a difficult time in a traditional school structure or have to catch up on credits but have the ability to get a high school diploma. Pathways Academy classes are project-driven and infuse career and technical education.

The scavenger hunt tied into the Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program at Pathways. The PBIS program includes various aspects including students earning BOCES Bucks for positive behavior that they can use on reward days to purchase experiences or items from the PBIS Store at Pathways.

During the scavenger hunt, students followed clues around the Remington Education Complex in Ilion to locations such as the principal's office, nurse's office, the Learning Center, the gymnasium and the PBIS Store. They met with administrators, teachers, the school nurse and other staff at each location and received information and updates about how the school operates.

As new seventh graders visited Corrigan during the scavenger hunt, he spoke to them about the school year ahead.

"You're going to get all the support you need," Corrigan

said. "You've just got to listen to the people around you." The scavenger hunt is the start of a return to having more PBIS-related activities and events, after such events were limited the past couple of school years due to COVID-19, Corrigan said.

"There were fewer chances for celebrations in recent years, and we're trying to be conscientious about that and bring back those experiences for students," Corrigan said.



September event celebrates work of the Family Counseling Center

The Family Counseling Center of Fulton County in Gloversville is happy to announce their Fall Gala will take place Sept. 29 from 5:30 - 8:30 p.m. The event will honor the long history of the organization, celebrate the work of two distinguished individuals and highlight the talented and dedicated team working at the agency.

Founded in 1976 by a board of concerned community members and originally staffed by a cohort of volunteer counselors, the organization has grown and matured into a fundamental cornerstone of mental and behavioral health in the Mohawk Valley. Today, the Family Counseling Center works with over 4,500 clients across six counties. Services include school-based counselors located in four school districts, a Mobile Crisis Unit, a satellite office in Fort Plain, a Behavioral Health Clinic, Children and Family Services, the Domestic Violence Program of Fulton County and more. The organization's growth culminated in the renovation and expansion of the Broadway Street headquarters. Begun in March 2020 just days after the COVID lockdown was announced, the state-of-the art facility was completed in November 2021. The space, which is designed to bring light and nature into every office and breaks down treatment silos, offers a collaborative model of care for clients. Team members have over 11,000 client contacts per month, meaning that individual clients are treated across programs, removing barriers to care and empowering those undergoing treatment to self-advocate for positive change in their lives.

In 2022, the Center partnered with Genoa Healthcare, a leading healthcare pharmacy that works with community-based providers, health plans and others as part of a coordinated care team, ensuing that people with complex health conditions have a full team on their side dedicated to serving



their individual needs. The partnership has been able to increase the fulfillment of prescription medications and provide superior care for clients of the Family Counseling Center.

On Sept. 29, the Family Counseling Center will host their first-ever fundraising gala. The goal: to raise \$50,000 for the agency at a time when demand for mental health services has increased 400% nationally while grant and program funding has decreased.

"We've been very lucky over the course of the last two years," said Michael L. Countryman, the organization's executive director. "We quickly and nimbly transitioned to telehealth in March 2020 and were able to serve 100% of our clients within one week of the shutdown. Since May 2021, we have been able to see clients in-person at our facility. While many clinics across the country have been forced to reduce programming and services, we have maintained and expanded programming to try and meet the needs of our clients and our community. With that said, agencies like ours are facing a crisis of care. The pandemic has brought the importance of mental health and the connection between mental health and overall health to the foreground. We are seeing an increased number of individuals in crisis and the demand means we need to expand services and our ability to serve our community even more."

In addition to a dinner and silent auction, the fundraising gala will include the recognition of two individuals who have dedicated themselves to the communities in which the Family Counseling Center serves.

The Dr. David and Ann Lee Clough Award recognizes an individual or group for exceptional contributions to the field of behavioral health and is given to an outstanding individual or group who has demonstrated continued excellence in direct or indirect services to behavioral health. The 2022 honoree is Janine Dykeman, executive director of the Mental Health Association of Fulton and Montgomery Counties.

The Mary Ann Harzinski Outstanding Community Service Award honors the legacy of Mary Ann Harzinski, a dedicated teacher and long-time member of the Family Counseling Center Board of Directors. The award is given to an individual or organization who has a recognized record of volunteerism across organizations or has worked in close partnership with organizations. The 2022 honoree is Denise Walsh, the current secretary of the organization's Board of Directors, close friend of Mary Ann Harzinski and volunteer of the Family Counseling Center for over 22 years.

"We are so thankful for the support of our community and the dedicated individuals who have helped build the Family Counseling Center," said Countryman. "Janine and Denise have devoted themselves to the communities in which they live. Their receipt of the Dr. David and Ann Lee Clough Award and the Mary Ann Harzinski Outstanding Service Award not only honor their legacy but the legacy of the individuals for whom the awards are named after."




A beginner's guide to fall planting and maintenance

Spring and summer are perhaps the busiest times of year for gardeners. However, fall also is a prime time to tend to gardens.

The tree and bare root retailer Bower & Branch ad-

gardeners to move plants into spots that will get ample sunlight.

• Fill in landscaping gaps. Some fall plants can add color around the landscape and brighten up homes to add curb appeal. In addition to pansies and violas, asters, kale and chrysanthemums are fall blooms. Keep in mind that mums can come back year after year. So take them out of those flower pots and get

vises that soil temperatures in many regions of the country may still be warm enough to encourage root growth well into the start of winter. Furthermore, fall is often the ideal time to plant, fertilize and keep a garden going or to get a head start on next year's bounty.

Here are some tips to make the most of the fall gardening season.

• Think about fall annuals and bulb planting. Near the end of September, start planting cool-weather-loving pansies and violas for pops of color as summer flowers fade. Also, it's a good idea to stock up on bulbs that will bloom in the months to come before they sell out in stores. Wait until the temperatures really cool down before planting them in desired spots for spring sprouts.

• Take inventory of the sun. Positioning a garden carefully means maximizing hours of sunlight, which begin to dwindle in the fall. Experts say gardens grow best in sunny locations that receive six hours of direct sunlight each day. This is where container gardens can be helpful, as they allow



them into the ground. They can be enjoyed next year as well, sprouting in early spring and developing leaves and buds through late summer.

• Clean up unwanted growth. Fall is an ideal time to cut back spent vegetable plants and get rid of errant weeds. Rather than bagging leaves, mow them with a grass catcher and then add the mix to a vegetable garden as an excellent soil insulator. The nitrogen and carbon will fertilize the soil, enhancing growing possibilities and limiting weed growth.

• Propagate plants in the fall. As temperatures gradually begin to cool, start taking cuttings from perennials, gathering seed pods from azaleas and rhododendrons and dividing hardwood cuttings, says the resource Gardening Know How. Consult with a garden center or horticulturist on the proper ways to propagate stems using rooting hormone and other techniques. • Continue to water plants. Water is essential in the fall and winter as roots can still be growing. Gradually reduce watering duration as plants go dormant.

Fall planting and maintenance can extend gardening season and improve the chances of growing a healthy spring garden.

Pre-winter perennial pruning pointers

Foliage and football might be two things people instantly associate with fall, but there's more to this beloved season than brightly colored leaves and action on the gridiron.

Gardeners know that spring is an ideal time to plan and plant their favorite flowers and most flavorful fruits and vegetables. However, seasoned gardeners know that gardening is a year-round commitment. Pruning is one of the keys to keeping perennials coming back for years to come, and fall is an ideal time to take on this important task.

Pruning perennials in the fall is not a onesize-fits-all endeavor. According to the Old Farmer's Almanac, some perennials can be cut down after the first killing frost, while others can be left to benefit wildlife, including birds and insects. Understanding pruning and when to do it this fall can help gardeners lay a strong foundation for their gardens that will benefit them next spring.

Why should some perennials be pruned?

The College of Agricultural Sciences at Pennsylvania State University notes that perennials that have become diseased or infested with insects are pruned to prevent those problems from resurfacing in the spring. In addition, according to the Old Farmer's Almanac, many herbaceous perennials have old foliage and dying stems after several hard frosts. If dead foliage or dying stems aren't pruned, disease, slugs and other pests can overwinter in the plants. Cutting these plants down to the ground after several hard frosts

allows the base of the plant to remain dormant over the winter but makes the plant less hospitable to disease and insects.

Which perennials should I prune?

The first step to pruning perennials is to recognize which need to be pruned and which can be left intact for the winter. The Old Farmer's Almanac notes that bee balm and phlox are prone to powdery mildew and should be cut back once they're gone. Hostas harbor slug eggs, so they, too, should be pruned after a hard frost. Hosta leaves that have fallen on the ground should be removed as well. There's no need to cut back certain perennials if they're healthy. For example, hardy geraniums do not require pruning in the fall, and Penn State Extension notes that hardy perennials like garden mums are more likely to survive a cold winter if they're left intact. That's because the tops of such plants will collect leaves and snow for insulation and moisture over the course of winter. Gardeners who are unsure about fall pruning can speak with their local gardening center for additional advice regarding which plants to cut back before winter.

When to prune perennials

Gardeners need not rush to prune perennials in the fall. Diseased or infested plants can be pruned at the first sight of disease or infestation, but gardeners can wait until several hard frosts have occurred before they prune healthy perennials. In gardening parlance, a hard frost refers to when tempera-



tures drop below 28° F. Several hard frosts kill the uppermost growth of most perennials, making this an ideal time to prune them.

Pruning perennials in fall can be the first step toward creating an awe-inspiring spring garden.



Fresh veggies are not exclusive to spring and summer

Spring and summer may be the seasons most often associated with gardening. But people who love to grow their own vegetables can do so even when the weather outside is frightful.

Various vegetables thrive in cool temperatures. The home and garden experts at HGTV note that some winter vegetables are hardy. That means they can handle frosts in temperatures as low as 25° F without being damaged. Others are even sturdier in the face of all that winter can throw at them, capable of tolerating temperatures that dip into the high teens.

Growing vegetables in winter requires a different approach than growing in spring and summer, as gardeners must be ready to prevent damage from frost if temperatures get especially chilly. For example, the

experts at Michigan State University Extension note that gardeners may need to utilize floating row covers to protect sensitive crops from frost. Gardeners interested in planting winter vegetables can speak with a local garden center professional about which crops to plant and what to do if temperatures push winter vegetable gardens to the brink.

Though it's up to gardeners what they want to plant, the following are some popular winter vegetables that can make for wonderful, fresh additions to any dinner table even after the traditional gardening season has come and gone.





Wood floor installation dos and don'ts

Jaw-dropping features can sell a home in a heartbeat. A penthouse apartment with floorto-ceiling windows and a panoramic view of a city skyline likely won't prove a hard sell, nor will a home with an infinity pool overlooking a landscape of rolling hills. As awe-inspiring as such features can be, some more subtle components, such as authentic hardwood floors, also can do much to make a home more appealing to prospective buyers.

Hardwood flooring is a sought-after commodity. Data from the National Association of Realtors indicates that 54 percent of home buyers are willing to pay more for hardwood floors. In fact, NAR figures indicate that 28 percent of buyers between the ages of 35 and 54 consider hardwood floors "very important" when looking for a home. Homeowners who are considering selling their homes, or those who simply want to upgrade their existing flooring, may want to consider installing hardwood flooring. Though it's a project best left to professionals, hardwood flooring can be installed by skilled DIYers. In such instances, homeowners may want to keep these dos and don'ts in mind.

DO hire a professional if you have limited or no DIY flooring experience. Hardwood flooring installation is not generally a project for novice DIYers. Hardwood flooring projects may present some common challenges, but no two homes are the same. So unless they have prior experience installing floors in multiple rooms or homes, homeowners may save themselves time, trouble and a significant amount of money hiring a professional to do the job.

DON'T ignore the subfloor. New hardwoods won't erase the problem of subfloors in poor condition. According to the home renovation experts at BobVila.com, squeaky floors could be an indication that the subfloor has begun to warp or twist. Sinking floors are another indicator of deteriorating subfloors. Subfloors should be somewhat level before new hardwoods are installed, so DIYers should inspect and address subfloor issues before installing new flooring.

DO expose wood flooring to the elements in your home prior to installation. The home improvement resource BuildDirect recommends acclimating hardwoods to the space where they will be installed. Skipping this important step could result in gaps during the winter and cupping over the summer. To acclimate hardwoods, open the boxes and spread them out for about a week while running the air conditioner or heater at normal levels. When storing hardwoods prior to installation, avoid keeping them in potentially moist areas like a basement.

DON'T skimp on tools. A DIY hardwood flooring installation might be less expensive than hiring a professional, but homeowners should resist any temptation to increase those savings further by purchasing less costly tools or fewer tools than is necessary to complete the job. BuildDirect notes that DIYers will need at least a miter saw, table saw, cleat-nailer or stapler, finish nailer, compressor, jamb saw, chalk line, nail set, and tape measurer when installing hardwood floors. Purchase all necessary tools and read product reviews to ensure each tool is up to the task. Wood floors can be awe-inspiring. Some homeowners can install such flooring on their own, and the project can be much easier if they learn as much about installation as possible prior to beginning the project.

Prepare your garden for winter's onslaught

Individuals who don't live near the equator or in another warm climate know that winter will rear its chilly head this year. Cold temperatures and snowy conditions may be excellent for skiing and sledding, but gardeners recognize these conditions are not ideal for their plants.

The inevitable slowing of activity in the garden during fall marks a time to shift attention from constant plant care to preparing the landscape for next season. It may be tempting to simply let Mother Nature take over, but a little pre-winter TLC can ensure gardens make it

through winter unscathed.

Remove spent plants

Decomposing organic material is the basis for compost and other fertilizers. However, vegetable plants that are left to sit can lead to decay in the garden. Decaying plants can serve as hosts for pest populations and diseases. Rotting vegetables also can drop unwanted seeds into the soil, which eventually can strip nutrients that normally would go to next year's crops.

Ornamental plants and perennials can be cut back in fall. Cut down stalks and remove leaves.

Plant a cover crop

The gardening resource This Is My Garden recommends planting a cover crop to set the stage for a successful spring. A cover crop protects the soil and can return nutrients to it. When the soil is bare during winter, weed

seeds can easily blow in and lie in wait, ultimately becoming a problem during the ensuing year. Cover crops can include clover or field peas, which will increase the levels of available nitrogen.

Amend the soil

Fall is a perfect time to add soil amendments, such as manure and compost. These fertilizers will add nutrients and break down gradually, enriching the soil over the winter. **Replenish mulch**

Gardeners may have added mulch around shrubs and other areas of the landscape early in the season because it is attractive. But mulch also does much to reduce water loss and protect the soil from erosion. It may inhibit weed growth as well. Replacing mulch when the mercury drops can insulate





the soil, which helps to regulate soil temperature. A thick layer of mulch around root vegetables left in the garden can offer protection against hard frosts.

Divide bulbs Divide plant bulbs and plant them where you want flowers

like daffodils and tulips to grow in the spring. **Prune dormant plants** Wait until plants are dormant to prune them and adjust their shape. Most shrubs and trees should be pruned in late

winter, right before new growth.

Move potted plants

Bring delicate plants into a sheltered area, such as a greenhouse or indoor garage, so they can continue to thrive during the winter.

Fall and winter still provide opportunities to spend time in the garden. At this point in the year, gardeners can prepare landscapes for the next season.





It's customary to tip wedding vendors who provide great service. The wedding experts at The Knot note that the following guidelines can help couples determine how much to tip the unsung heroes who make their weddings so memorable.

• Photographer/videographer: Photographers and videographers are unique among wedding vendors because their work will be looked at for decades to come. The Knot notes that it's not necessary to tip wedding photographers and videographers who own their own studios. Their fees are all the compensation they need. However, many photographers and videographers do not own their own studios, and the efforts of such professionals are worthy of a little something extra at the end of the night. The Knot notes that a tip between \$50 and \$200 is standard for these professionals, and that tip can be given at the end of the reception.

Wedding day tipping guidelines

• Reception staff: The reception staff works as hard as anyone during the wedding, and those efforts merit a good tip. Many reception venues include gratuities in their food and drink fees, and couples can check to see if they have already tipped staff and if they think the mandatory gratuity is sufficient. A tip between 15% and 20% of the food and drink fee is standard. Maître d' fees also may be built into the wedding contract. If not, a tip between \$200 and \$300 is standard and can be delivered at the end of the night.

• Band/DJ: Music features prominently at many wedding receptions. Bands and/or DJs can set the tone for a fun night couples and their guests will remember for years to come. Tipping musicians is optional, but it's the norm to do so when they provide exceptional service. Couples who have a band playing can tip between \$25 and \$35 per musician, while DJs generally receive a tip between \$50 and \$150.

• Drivers: Many transportation firms also include gratuities in their contracts, so couples should check to see if they've already

tipped limo or bus drivers before paying them a little extra. If the tip is not included and the drivers arrive on time and get guests to the wedding on time, then a tip that's between 15% and 20% of the total bill is standard.

• Delivery personnel: Individuals who deliver items like cakes and flowers are typically given a gratuity upon delivery. A tip between \$5 and \$10 per person is standard, though individuals who deliver items like tables, chairs and portable restroom facilities and then set those items up may be deserving of a little extra.

• Officiants: Officiants who are affiliated with a church or synagogue where the ceremony will take place are not typically given a gratuity. However, The Knot notes that a donation to the place of worship between \$100 and \$500 is standard. Couples who still want to give the officiant a little extra can tip between \$50 and \$100. Independent officiants who receive fees directly from the couple need not be tipped.


These figures can serve as guidelines, but couples also can give a little extra if they feel their vendors have gone above and beyond.

Household Hazardous Waste facility closing for the season

The last day for the 2022 season of household hazardous waste collection at the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's EcoDrop Utica will be Sept. 30. Household hazardous waste collection will reopen on April 1, 2023.

Since the inception of the household hazardous waste program in 1992, the Authority has safely disposed of over one million gallons of hazardous waste, with 61,163 gallons being safely disposed of in 2021.

The Authority's EcoDrop Utica, located at the end of Leland Avenue Extension, will accept household hazardous waste from residents of Oneida and Herkimer counties Monday - Friday from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. and on Saturday from 7 a.m. - 2 p.m. through the month of September.

The household hazardous waste program was designed to accept waste products from homes that can cause problems for humans and our environment when discarded improperly. Examples of wastes accepted include oil-based and latex paints, pesticides, oven cleaners and photographic chemicals. Once received, items are sorted by hazard class and properly disposed or recycled.

Households are allowed to drop off 14 wet gallons and/or 20 dry pounds of waste per trip. Liquid paint may be brought to EcoDrop Utica; however, empty paint cans or cans with hardened paint should be placed in the garbage. You must remove all covers before placing them in the garbage. Electronics/TVs/computer equipment, propane cylinders (under 100 pounds), fluorescent light bulbs and many other common household items are accepted year-round at the Utica and Rome EcoDrop at no charge. Many paint products can be disposed of


