
Herkimer College appoints new staff




In memoriam: Berneal A. Sweet

The link between diet and breast cancer

Cancer is an insidious disease that affects just about every part of the body, including the breasts. The World Cancer Research Fund International indicates there were more than 2.26 million new cases of breast cancer in women in 2020.

Women understandably want to learn what they can do to reduce their risk of developing breast cancer. One of the first considerations may be analyzing diet and determining if it is affecting breast cancer risk.

A variety of factors affect a woman's risk for developing breast cancer, and certain lifestyle choices, including diet, can play a role. However, according to Healthline, the risk factors with the biggest impact include sex, age and genetics. Lifestyle can influence breast cancer risk but not at the same levels as genetic markers, family history, gender, or age. However, women interested in doing all they can to stay healthy may want to take a closer look at the foods and beverages that can adversely affect breast cancer risk.

Healthy diet

Healthy food choices are linked to lower incidences of cancer and other conditions. Susan G. Komen states that eating plenty of fruits and vegetables may be linked to a lower risk of developing breast cancer. A pooled analysis of data from 20 studies found women who ate the most vegetables had a lower risk of estrogen receptor-negative breast cancer (but not estrogen receptor-positive breast cancer) compared to women who ate the least vegetables, according to a 2013

report published in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute. And it doesn't really matter if produce is organic or not. According to the American Cancer Society, the benefits of eating fresh fruits and vegetables outweigh any health risks linked to pesticide residue.

The complex relationship between fat, sugar and cancer

Though a single food will not lead to higher breast cancer risk, overeating and putting on excess weight can increase risk. That is why it is essential to get plenty of exercise each week and monitor calorie consumption. While women who are in their reproductive years may not see as much breast cancer risk from being overweight or obese, after menopause,

that risk increases, says Susan G. Komen. The risk is not directly related to fatty foods, however. The American Cancer Society says an examination of the amount of fat eaten by women in the United States found no link between fat and breast cancer risk.

In addition, while consuming too much sugar may not be healthy in the long run, it's a myth that "sugar feeds cancer." Eating sugar may lead to weight gain, which may increase the risk of breast cancer, says the ACS.

Alcohol consumption

One component of diet that has been studied extensively is the effects of alcoholic beverages on breast cancer risk. Susan G. Komen reports that a pooled analysis of data from 53 studies found women who had two to three alcoholic drinks per day had a 20 percent higher risk of breast cancer compared to those who didn't drink alcohol. Alcohol should be limited to one drink per day for the average woman, or none at all, if possible.

Diet is only one factor in the risk for developing breast cancer. While important, there are other components that increase risk by a more significant margin.

Five ways to protect hearing every day

The saying "you don't know what you've got 'til it's gone" is never more true than in regard to hearing. It's easy to take hearing for granted, but even momentary hearing loss can highlight how vital it is to protect hearing.

People rely on headphones or ear buds to listen to music, stream movies or participate in work-related meetings more than ever before. Having the volume too loud can contribute to hearing loss over time.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says five in 10 young people listen to their music or other audio too loudly. Overall, 48 million people in the United States have trouble hearing in one or both of their ears. Johns Hopkins Medical Center reports approximately 15 percent of adults 18 years of age or older report some trouble hearing, and the risk of hearing problems increases with age.

Once it's gone, hearing cannot be restored in many cases.

To protect hearing and guard against future hearing loss, consider these recommendations.

- 1. **Ask for a baseline hearing test.** It's easier to measure hearing loss if there is a baseline by which it can be measured. During your annual physical, ask for a hearing test or a referral to an audiologist. This can set the course for monitoring progression of any future hearing loss.
- 2. **Wear hearing protection.** There are various types of hearing protection that can filter out certain levels of sound. Many earplugs, like the ones musicians wear or those worn when attending rock concerts, can reduce the sound by approximately 25 dB. Custom fit ear plugs provide more noise reduction, in upwards of 35 to 40 dB. They are optimal for highnoise environments, such as when mowing lawns or operating machinery, according to the hearing loss resource Hearts for Hearing.
- 3. **Turn down the volume.** Experts recommend adhering to the 60/60 rule when enjoying audio through headphones. This suggestion is to listen with the headphones at no more than 60 percent volume for no more than 60 minutes a day. Earbuds fit directly next to the eardrum and can be harmful to your hearing. If possible, choose over-the-ear headphones instead.
- 4. **Have custom molds made.** Rather than turning up the volume, people can have custom ear molds made for use with earphones, suggests Johns Hopkins. The custom ear molds will block outside noise, allowing for higher quality listening.
- 5. **Keep your ears dry.** Moisture in the ear can cause bacteria to grow and potentially lead to infections. Towel-dry ears gently after showering or swimming. Avoid the temptation to use cotton swabs to dry the ears. For the most part, ears are self-cleaning, and using a cotton swab can push wax and cause it to become compacted in the ear canal.

In addition to these tips, discussing hearing health with a doctor is a wise idea.

Paidraig Cundun, the Mohawk Valley's 19th century Irish bard

Paidraig Cundun, the Mohawk Valley's 19th century Irish bard, will perform Nov. 10 at 4 p.m. at the Irish Cultural Center of the Mohawk Valley and online via Zoom. Join them as scholar Tony O'Floinn from Limerick, Ireland, presents his research findings on Mohawk Valley's 19th century bard Padraig Cundun.

Pádraig Phiarais Cúndún, born 1777, was an Irish language poet who emigrated to the U.S. from Ballymacoda, Co. Cork, Ireland, in 1825. Having relatives already settled in Deerfield, NY, he settled there along with his wife Margaret, son Pierce and daughters Eileen, Kathleen and Margaret.

Padraig never learned the English language but would write letters, in Irish, some in poetic form, back to his friends in Ireland. These letters were often an expression of his longing for Ireland as well as expressing his fondness for his new-found home. Many of the letters describe what it may have been like for the Irish immigrant during the mid-19th century in our area.

Presenter Tony O'Floinn is a lecturer at Mary Immaculate College, Thurles campus. He has done extensive research on Cundun and will discuss Cundun's life in both Ireland and Utica, Cundun's view on his life in the U.S. and the significance of his writings.

If possible, program organizers and O'Floinn would like to connect with any of Cundun's descendants.



The value of mulched leaves

Homeowners who don't look forward to dusting off their rakes each fall might be happy to learn that mulching fallen leaves with a mower may be a healthier and less labor intensive way to confront a yard covered in leaves. For 20 years, turfgrass specialists at Michigan State University studied how lawns reacted to having ground up leaves left on the lawn and the results were overwhelmingly positive. Researchers found that tiny pieces of mulched leaves eventually sifted down through the turf and provided the lawn with essential nutrients. Mulched leaves also served to control future weed growth by covering up bare spots between turf plants. Such spots typically provided openings for weed seeds to germinate and ultimately infect lawns. In fact, researchers found that mulching leaves for just three years could produce a nearly 100 percent decrease in dandelion and crabgrass growth. Homeowners with mulching mowers that also have bags can even help their gardens by alternating using the mower with and without the bag on once leaves begin to fall. When mowing with the bag on, mulched leaves can then be used as mulch in landscape beds and vegetable gardens.

Vaccination clinic for monkeypox and COVID-19

Herkimer County Public Health will host a vaccination clinic for monkeypox and COVID-19 on Oct. 26 by appointment only. The clinic will take place at Herkimer County Public Health's main office on the third floor of 301 N. Washington St. in Herkimer from 9 a.m. - noon (additional time slots may be available).

The COVID-19 initial vaccination series will be available to all people age six months and older. The COVID-19 bivalent booster will be available for ages 12 and over (Pfizer) and 18 and older (Moderna). Contact the Herkimer County Public Health office at time of scheduling to determine manufacturer availability.

Those seeking the JYNNEOS vaccination for monkeypox must meet New York State eligibility criteria as an individual at risk of becoming infected with monkeypox or have had exposure to someone who has suspected or confirmed monkeypox.

See criteria below for specific JYNNEOS vaccination requirements:

- Individuals with recent exposure to a suspected or confirmed monkeypox case within the past 14 days.
- · Those at high risk of a recent exposure to monkeypox, including gay men and members of the bisexual, transgender and gender non-conforming community, and other communities of men who have sex with men and who have engaged in intimate or skin-to-skin contact

with others in the past 14 days in locations where monkeypox is spreading.

- Individuals who have had skin-to-skin contact with someone in a social network experiencing monkeypox activity, including men who have sex with men who meet partners through an online website, digital app or social event, such as a bar or party.
- · Any individual that may be at risk of future exposure to infection with monkeypox, even though they are not at high risk of a recent exposure to monkeypox.





Planting spring-blooming miniatures

There's an old saying: "Good things come in small packages." That's certainly true of the tiny flowers that bloom in the spring. And autumn is the perfect time to plant these bulbs.

We're all familiar with the drifts of daffodils and tulips that brighten the view at winter's end, but have you considered the supporting players in that panorama? Crocus probably comes to mind, but there are many other options for spring flowers that grow a mere three to six inches tall.

Among the first to bloom in the spring, snowdrops live up to their name. These tiny white flowers with their drooping heads push through frozen ground as ice and snow begin their retreat. Snowdrops make a lovely show, particularly if planted in drifts.

Glory-of-the-snow can often be seen as a flash of blue among the dull post-winter landscape, but they also are available in white and pink. They may be small, but mass planting makes quite an impact.

If you're partial to blue, Iris reticulata, a dwarf iris, sports pe-

tite blue flowers with white and yellow markings. Grape hyacinth offers clusters of cobalt blue flowers atop its stem. Either will create a vibrant contrast when planted among bright yellow daffodils or a peaceful mood when combined with white tulips.

Another interesting spring bloomer is winter aconite. This relative of the common buttercup is low growing with bright yellow flowers and forms mounded clumps.

And, of course, there are crocuses. These ever-popular spring-blooming bulbs can be found not only at garden centers but in grocery stores and other local retailers throughout autumn. They come in a variety of colors, including white, yellow

The method you choose for planting will depend on the result you're looking for. For individual placement, dig a hole three to four inches deep (see package directions for the specific bulb), place the bulb pointed end up and cover with soil. If you plan to line a path or walkway, you may find it simpler to dig a shallow trench that deep, scatter the bulbs in the trench, cover with soil and water the area.

If you're planning to plant a larger area or a combination of bulbs such as daffodils and glory-of-the-snow, dig out the area you intend to plant to the depth needed for the largest bulb. Place those bulbs either individually where you'd like them to grow or, easier still, scatter the bulbs for a more natural look. Next, cover the larger bulbs with soil to the depth of the next smaller bulb.

For example, if you planted your larger bulbs (such as tulips) at six inches deep, you would cover them with soil until the planting area is at the depth for planting the smaller bulbs (such as crocus), approximately three inches deep. Again, place the

Signs of overloaded circuits in your home

The National Fire Protection Association says that home fires caused by electrical failures or malfunction result in more than 400 deaths per year and cause \$1.4 billion in property damage annually. Electrical fires can often be prevented, especially if homeowners learn to identify the signs of overloaded circuits. The Electrical Safety Foundation International notes that the following are some common signs of overloaded circuits.

- · Flickering, blinking or dimming lights
- Warm or discolored wall plates

- Burning odor coming from receptacles or wall switches Frequently tripped circuit
- breakers or blown fuses
- · Cracking, sizzling or buzzing from receptacles
- Mild shock or tingle from appliances, receptacles or switches

The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that 50 percent of electrical fires can be prevented by arc fault circuit interrupters, or AFCIs. AFCIs are products that are designed to detect a wide range of arcing electrical faults in an attempt to reduce instances in which

electrical systems are ignition sources of fire. Arcing is very dangerous and occurs when an electric current flows through the air between two conductors. When these currents flow through unintended paths, the result is high intensity heat that can ignite surrounding material, such as wood framing or insulation. AFCIs monitor circuits for normal or dangerous arcing

conditions, serving as something of a safety net that can reduce the risk of home fires. Recognizing the signs of overloaded circuits and using AFCIs can help homeowners significantly reduce the risk of home fires in their homes. assistant men's basketball coach from 1996 - 2004 and associate head coach for men's basketball from 2004 to present. He helped aid the 2019 team to a national championship victory. Among his awards are the Region III Coach of the Year and Mountain Valley Conference Coach of the Year honors.

The 1992 Herkimer College men's lacrosse team was the first lacrosse team in school history to complete an undefeated season and win a national championship. Under the leadership of Coach Paul Wehrum, the 1992 team finished 18-0, averaging 19.8 goals per game while allowing just 5.8 per game. Fifteen players from the 1992 team received Division I scholarships as a result.

Herkimer College's athletic program is a Division III member of the National Junior College Athletic Association, offering 20 varsity teams and one junior varsity team. The program has amassed 65 national championships, 131 Region III titles, 176 Mountain Valley Collegiate Conference championships and 31 National Academic Team of the Year awards. Herkimer College won the National Alliance of Two-Year College Athletic Administrators (NATYCAA) Cup, now called the Daktronics Cup, in 2014, 2015, 2017 and 2020, ranking the Herkimer Generals athletic program first in the nation among non-scholarship twoyear athletic programs, based on national championship competition.

bulbs individually or scatter them across the area. Then cover the bulbs with soil to reach the level of the surrounding ground and water the area.

Choose an area that will provide adequate sun, such as under deciduous trees or bushes that may provide full sun before they have leafed out in spring. Soil should be moist and drain well. If too wet, the bulbs may rot.

When to plant? Now is the time. Even though most plants

in the garden are fading and the air is chilly, as long as you can dig in the soil, you can plant spring-blooming bulbs. Go for it!

Select your favorites and get them in the garden. When spring arrives, you'll be glad you did.




Snowdrops with their tiny white drooping heads are among the first flowers to bloom in the spring, often pushing up through ice and snow to emerge in the sunlight.

Cyber scams come in many different forms

In a relatively short period of time, the internet has changed the way people live. Things that might have been unimaginable as recently as a quarter century ago are now ingrained in daily life. For instance, few people in the late 1990s might have imagined a day when billions of people across the globe would be walking around with mini computers capable of taking hi-resolution photos in their pockets. But smartphones have long since become an accepted and vital part of life in the 21st century.

The internet has opened doors to new possibilities, but it's also left other doors open for cybercriminals. Any home with an internet connection is potentially vulnerable to internet scams. Recognition of that fact and awareness of the following scams can reduce the

likelihood of being victimized by opportunistic cybercriminals.


· Disaster relief scams: Human beings' innate sense of compassion is on full display in the aftermath of natural disasters, when people across the globe typically donate hundreds of millions of dollars in an effort to help people whose lives have been turned upside down by hurricanes, tsunamis and other devastating events. But skilled cybercriminals prey on that compassion by setting up bogus relief efforts. Such efforts may involve fake charities with names that are similar but slightly different than well-known, legitimate nonprofit organizations. Operations such as Charity Navigator make it easy to verify if a charitable organization is legitimate, and would-be donors should utilize such resources prior to making any donations.

• Phishing scams: Phishing scams are among the oldest cyber scams, but they still nab victims every day. The Federal Trade Commission warns that many phishing scams are conducted via email or text messages and inform potential victims that there is an issue with their finances. Some may say there are issues with a bank account, credit card or even a tax return. Skeptics may wonder how anyone could fall for a phishing scam in the age of two-factor authentication and other security measures. However, the Federal Bureau of Investigation reports that phishing scams cost victims nearly \$60 million in 2019, indicating they're still a lucrative source of income for cybercriminals.

• Formjacking: Formjacking is a retail-based scam in which online shoppers' personal and financial information is stolen. In such instances, a retail website could be hacked without

users' knowledge. When it comes time to purchase items they've placed in their carts, users are redirected to a fraudulent payment page, where they enter personal information, such as their credit card number, that cybercriminals then steal. When buying items online, shoppers should confirm that the URL on the payment page aligns with the retailer they're buying from. If the URL is missing even a single letter (think Amzon.com instead of Amazon. com), then chances are a formjacking scam is being operated.

Tech support scams, in which users are asked to download applications to fix an infected computer, and similar download-based fake antivirus software scams are some additional examples of cyber scams. Users are urged to be on the lookout for each of these types of scams and exercise caution whenever something doesn't seem right or authentic.



Did you know?

Leaves that fall from trees can be a marvel to behold. But leaves can stain exterior surfaces when they eventually settle on vehicles, concrete driveways, patios, and other surfaces, become wet and/ or are not cleaned away in a timely fashion. Leaf stains are caused by tannins in the leaves. The pigments can be absorbed by porous materials like concrete and leave stains behind. While these stains may wash away over time, homeowners may prefer a faster way to get rid of unsightly stains. To remove moderate leaf stains, mix oxygen bleach with hot water and apply to stains using a scrub brush. Dark stains may require a tougher cleanser, such as one that contains

trisodium phosphate. Some homeowners find success using a pressure washer to clean away leaf stains, while others rely on commercial leaf-stain removers.





Three fun activities to engage kids in conservation

Conservation is a collective responsibility shared by individuals across the globe. 2. Teach kids to compost.

Parents do not need to leave their homes to teach kids about conservation. According to the National Resources Defense Council, composting benefits the planet in numerous ways. In addition to reducing the waste stream, composting cuts methane emissions from landfills, which the NRDC reports are the largest source of human-generated methane emissions in the United States. Composting also helps to conserve water by adding organic matter to soil, which research has shown improves the soil's capacity to retain water. Families can build a compost bin together and parents can teach kids about which types of waste can be composted and how that compost is benefitting the plants and trees in their own yard as well as the planet as a whole.

3. Craft with recycled materials.

Crafting fosters the growth of a range of developmental skills in children. In addition to encouraging kids to explore their creative side, crafting also helps youngsters develop fine motor skills and provides a fun way for them to learn counting and pattern recognition, which the academics-based publisher Scholastic notes are the very skills kids will later use to learn algebra. Safety first when clearing land

New homeowners often see their homes as blank canvasses. Looking at a home as a blank canvas is typically associated with its interior, but it also can apply to land-scaping.

Homes are empty of furniture and decorative items like photos and art on the walls when new homeowners move in. That makes it easy to see the interior of a home as a blank canvas. But that's not always so easy in the garden or the yard, where brush, overgrown plants or trees and other eyesores might have been left behind by the previous owners. A landscape must be cleared out before it can be seen as a blank canvas. Though clearing land may seem like a straightforward process, no one knows what lies beneath overgrowth or neglected areas of a yard or garden. Do-it-yourselfers can typically clear land on their own, but some safety strategies should be kept in mind to ensure the process goes smoothly.

• Wear appropriate PPE. Personal protective equipment should be worn when clearing land. The appropriate PPE when clearing land includes attire and other gear that many homeowners likely already have on hand. A long-sleeve shirt, puncture proof pants and gloves and slip-resistant work boots should be worn when clearing land. Homeowners also may want to invest in a hard hat if they will be cutting branches off of trees or cutting trees down. A face shield also may be a good bet depending on the scale and potential dangers of the project.

• Contact your utility company. Overhead power and telephone lines are visible to the naked eye, and homeowners should be conscious of those lines as they cut any high branches. But underground lines are not visible, and that

can make clearing land dangerous. Homeowners are urged to contact their utility companies before they begin to clear any land so they can determine if any underground lines are beneath areas they intend to clear out.

· Get a lay of the land. Carefully inspect the area to be cleared prior to starting the project. Inspections can reveal the density of any vegetation that may need to be removed and reveal if there are any harmful plants like poison ivy growing. Many DIYers can remove small trees on their own, but a professional tree service may be necessary for large trees or those located close to the house. Homeowners won't want to cut down a tree, even a small one, if it can potentially fall onto the house. In addition, home-

owners who are unfamiliar with chippers or stump grinders may be better off hiring a tree service to clear trees.

• **Don't go it alone**. No one should clear land alone. Even small projects are best tackled by at least two people.



Safety should be the utmost priority as homeowners prepare to clear land on their properties.

Should someone get injured during the project, the presence of another person ensures someone can immediately call for help. In addition, clearing land can be more difficult than it appears, and having at least two people to pull old shrubs or carry tree branches reduces the risk of injury.







How to create a successful apple orchard

by Bob Osborne, author of "Hardy Apples: Growing Apples in Cold Climates"

There is a difference between planting an orchard that survives and one that thrives.

To create an orchard that grows well and produces quality apples, a number of considerations should be addressed before any trees are planted.

Choose the Right Site

The site chosen for an orchard can mean the difference between a crop and no crop.

The most important factor is the occurrence of frosts during flowering. In a low-lying site, cold air will pool during still nights and frosts are likely to occur. A site on a hill where the air is draining down toward a lower area, or a site near a large body of water that moderates the temperature, will be far less likely to experience frosts during this critical period. While most of us have little choice in placing an orchard, sitting in the most advantageous position will play an important role in its success.

Best Soil Types for Apple Orchards

Soil is the basis of all life, but soils differ tremendously in their ability to provide nutrients to an apple tree.

To provide for the needs of apple trees, the soil should contain the minerals it will need to create healthy foliage and fruit. Soils are usually a combination of three basic constituents: sand, clay and silt.

Soils that are sand-based may be lacking in some of these minerals, as sand is essentially silica, and will only break down over time periods that are beyond our reckoning. In such soils, the nutrients needed must be provided by organic matter. If the soil has little other than silica sand and stone, the task of providing enough organic matter may be difficult to near impossible.


Clay soils have advantages and disadvantages. Clays usually contain a host of minerals and are far more productive than sandy soils, but if the percentage of clay to sand and/or silt is too high there can be problems with drainage and the texture may not allow easy access by the roots.

Silt soils occur where either water or wind has deposited very fine particles over centuries. Silt soils are very productive, although it is essential that the underlying soils are well drained.

The ideal soil is a blend of sand, clay and silt. Such soils can provide a wealth of nutrients and, unless they are sitting on an impermeable layer, will have good drain-

The best orchard soils have a high organic matter content. Organic matter is vital to growth, as its gradual breakdown releases the nutrients held within the particles and its spongy texture helps hold both air and


Good drainage is also essential for a successful apple orchard. In poorly drained soils the roots may be subject to long periods when the soil around them is saturated. The lack of oxygen will kill the roots. It can also create a condition where the roots of the tree can only exist near the surface.

While less-than-ideal soils can be adjusted, such measures will add considerably to the cost of establishment.

Another soil-related issue is its acidity level. This level is measured using the pH scale. Apples grow best in soils with a pH of 6.5 - 7.0. For young trees to grow to their potential, an orchard should not be planted until the pH is at the proper level.

Apple Tree Spacing

For the homeowner, placing a few trees in a yard is not a big issue. However, if you are contemplating a larger orchard, the spacing of trees becomes very important.

Most commercial orchards are now planted in rows with trees placed around three to four feet apart. These trees are grafted on dwarfing roots and will require permanent posts and wires to support them over the life of the orchard.

If you choose a more traditionally spaced orchard, be sure to choose rootstocks that will provide good anchorage. Even if the trees will not be supported long term, be sure to stake the new trees for one year. This

will prevent rocking of the trees in wind, which slows establishment, and will keep them straighter in the row.
