#### Utica native to lead U.S. Navy Office of Community Outreach

Commander Anthony Falvo, a native of Utica, assumed duties as director and officer in charge of Navy Office of Community Outreach (NAVCO) during a change of office ceremony in Millington, TN, on Oct. 13.

"I'm excited to be here," said Falvo. "I sought this job out because I very much believe in the mission. I've got to be the luckiest guy in the Navy coming here. The group of professionals that we have here are some of the best that this community has to offer and I'm proud to be a member of this team."

Falvo joined the military 29 years ago and today serves as a U.S. Navy public affairs officer.

"I joined the Navy to continue a family legacy of service to the nation," he said. "My grandfathers and father all served, along with other relatives who recognized the meaning of service to the nation. Joining the Navy was a way for me to not only serve my nation, but it also afforded me many experiences that I otherwise never would have access to."

Falvo graduated from Utica Senior Academy in 1991. Today, he relies upon skills and values similar to those found in Utica to succeed in the military.

"Growing up in Utica taught me perseverance and strong family values," said Falvo. "It taught me that if I wanted to be successful in life, I had to go out to make it happen on my own. But it was my family that enabled me to do that. I was lucky enough to have strong family support at home cheering me on at every turn."

These lessons have helped Falvo while serving aboard in the Navy.

"The part I like most about my job is the people

that I get to work with on a daily basis," he said. "As a Navy Commander, and now as the Director of the Navy Office of Community Outreach, I am lucky to work with amazing men and women that represent the best of what our nation has to offer. I feel blessed to be able to work with talented professionals dedicated to the defense of our nation and preserving our freedoms."

NAVCO connects Americans with their Navy. With most of the Navy's personnel and equipment logically concentrated on America's coasts, NAVCO oversees a number of community outreach programs designed to bring America's Navy to cities throughout the country, many of which do not enjoy a significant Navy presence.

Serving in the Navy means Falvo is part of a world that is taking on new importance in America's focus on strengthening alliances, modernizing capabilities, increasing capacities and maintaining military readiness in support of the National Defense Strategy.

"As the premier seagoing force in the world, the United States Navy is crucial to our nation's prosperity and defense," said Falvo. "First founded as a force to protect American commerce on the world's oceans, today's Navy does that and more. Most importantly, we take the fight to the enemy. Our unique capabilities on the sea, under the sea and in the skies make us the service of choice for our nation's defense. It's no coincidence that the first question from our nation's leaders during a time of crisis is, 'Where's the nearest aircraft carrier?' Being the service of choice is something I am proud of, and proud to contribute to."

With more than 90% of all trade traveling by sea and 95% of the world's international phone and internet traffic carried through fiber optic cables lying on the ocean floor, Navy officials continue to emphasize that the prosperity and security of the U.S. is directly linked to ready sailors and a strong Navy.

"Maintaining the world's best Navy is an investment in the security and prosperity of the United States, as well as the stability of our world," said Adm. Mike Gilday, Chief of Naval Operations. "The U.S. Navy – forward deployed and integrated with all elements of national power – deters conflict, strengthens our alliances and partnerships and guarantees free and open access to the world's oceans. As the United States responds to the security environment through integrated deterrence, our Navy must continue to deploy forward and campaign with a ready, capable, combat-credible fleet."

Falvo has many opportunities to achieve accomplishments during military service.

"My proudest accomplishment in the Navy was the first moment I raised my right hand and swore an oath to the nation," said Falvo. "Taking that first step so many years ago was the hardest part. I am proud that I had the courage to say 'yes' to something that seemed like a crazy idea nearly three decades ago."

As Falvo and other sailors continue to perform missions around the world, they can take pride in serving their country in the U.S. Navy.

"Serving in the Navy gave me the foundation to be who I am today – a better son, husband, father and grandfather," added Falvo. "It not only taught me the professional skills that I have today, it's given me many opportunities I never would have been afforded otherwise. I would encourage any young American to consider the Navy, not only as a means to gain valuable skills and insight, but also as a means to better themselves and their families."

#### Around the Kitchen Table – Enjoying your harvest

Larder is not a word you hear much anymore. Originally, it referred to "a storehouse for bacon" but over time, larder became interchangeable with pantry, storeroom or cupboard. Today, most people call their food storage area a pantry.

However, my grandmother always referred to her neatly arranged shelves of home-canned harvest as a "full larder." She kept the bounty of her garden, foraged berries and fruits in quart jars in a small shelf-lined room off her kitchen. It had a sloped ceiling even lower than the adjacent kitchen and you had to duck to take the three steps down into Ma's larder. It had a single bare bulb with a long white string attached for pulling the light off and on. As a kid, it was a big deal to retrieve a colorful jar off the packed shelves for Ma's next pie or homemade stew.

My own mother has a similar space for her jams, jellies, pickles and relishes. It is a simple hall closet just off the kitchen with knotty pine shelving. Like Ma's, it had a long white pull string for the bare bulb light, but after years of unsuccessful arm-waving and grasping in the dark space for that elusive string, my Dad finally installed an outer switch, much to our delight.

Today, we not only use that same hall closet to store our canned goods, but we also have the convenience of a large freezer to hold our harvest. It is a good feeling to be able to reach into these storage areas and pull out the beginnings of a pie or a side dish for a meal. I am reminded of the blessings we enjoy of growing and harvesting our own food and being able to share the bounty we have with others.

To quote my grandmother, "The comfort of a full larder is knowing you always have something to fix for company and the satisfaction that your family won't go hungry.'

Even though I have a full freezer and a few filled shelves of my own, nothing will ever be as beautiful as those towering shelves of multi-colored glass jars filled by my grandmother's

This autumn, celebrate your harvest by baking something to share and by passing along your own full larder memories.

Ma's Sweet Muffins

1 1/2 cups sifted flour

½ cup sugar

2 teaspoons baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

1/4 cup shortening

1 large egg

1/2 cup milk (can substitute maple syrup for half of the milk) Topping:

2 tablespoons of melted butter

1 cup white sugar or maple sugar

½ teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 cup flour

Mix together and spoon on top of each muffin before baking. Preheat oven to 400°. Mix dry ingredients, then use fork to blend in shortening. Add egg and milk and mix until well-blended, but don't overmix. Batter may still be slightly lumpy.



# Town of Webb to host county health office hours beginning in November

The Town of Webb will host Herkimer County Public Health (HCPH) office hours, starting Nov. 10, monthly at the town's office building. HCPH office hours will be in the board room at 3140 State Route 28, Old Forge, on the second Thursday of each month from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Upcoming HCPH office hours are planned for the following dates: Nov. 10 and Dec. 8 in 2022 and Jan. 12, Feb. 9, March 9 and April 13 in 2023.

Come learn more about the programs Herkimer County has to offer. Informational material and educational material will be on hand to facilitate connecting your community to needed services and assistance. HCPH programs and services can be further explored during in depth conversations with our department's onsite program experts. Information for sister agencies will also be available.

HCPH programs include adult and child immunizations, rabies prevention, lead poisoning and prevention, early childhood intervention, communicable disease and maternal child health.

#### Rabies clinic set for Nov. 12

A rabies clinic will take place Nov. 12 from 10 a.m. - noon at the East Herkimer Fire Department, 193 Main Rd., East Herkimer.

All cats, dogs and ferrets three months or older must be vaccinated even if they stay indoors. Every dog and cat need two rabies vaccinations one year apart, then one every three years. Ferrets must be vaccinated every year. Bring the pet's rabies vaccination history to receive a three-year certificate. Dogs should be on a leash. Cats and ferrets should be in a carrier or pillowcase. No vet exams will be given.

A \$5 donation per pet is suggested to defray costs.

#### Family history increases risk for breast cancer

Millions of people across the globe will be diagnosed with breast cancer this year. In fact, only certain skin cancers affect more women than breast cancer within the U.S. and Canada.

The World Cancer Research Fund International says breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in women across the globe. Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg had the highest number of breast cancer cases in 2020, while Barbados and Fiji had the greatest number of deaths attributed to the disease. Some of these high case numbers may be attributed to women with family histories of breast cancer-something that increases risk significantly.

BreastCancer.org indicates that women with close relatives who have had breast cancer, such as sisters, mothers or grandmothers, are at considerably higher risk of developing breast cancer themselves. Also, breast cancer may occur at a younger age in women with family histories of the disease.

Understanding breast cancer risk is vital for women's health. The following breakdown, courtesy of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, can help women from all backgrounds understand their risk for breast cancer.

- · Average risk: No first or second-degree relatives with breast or ovarian cancer, or one second-degree female relative with breast cancer (in one breast only) diagnosed after age 50.
- Moderate risk: This is a somewhat higher risk that may not turn into breast cancer. It occurs when there is one or two first-degree or two second-degree female relatives with breast cancer (in one breast only), with both relatives diagnosed after age 50; otherwise, one or two first- or second-degree relatives with high grade prostate cancer.
- Strong: Women with strong risks have much higher chances of developing breast cancer than the general population. Conditions like having one or more first- or second-degree

relatives with breast cancer diagnosed at age 45 or younger, triple negative breast cancer, primary cancer of both breasts and both breast and ovarian cancer in the same relative are warning signs of increased risk.

It's important for women with increased risk for breast cancer due to family history to discuss options with their doctors. More frequent mammograms and other screening tests may be recommended, and screening at younger ages than the standard age also may be considered. Women who are at high risk may be urged to undergo genetic counseling and testing for hereditary breast and ovarian cancer markers.

Breast cancer can be an especially scary prospect for women with family histories of the disease. By familiarizing themselves with their risks for breast cancer, women can take the necessary steps to protect their long-term health.

Plain Food's mission is providing wholesome and novelty products at reasonable prices while fostering a spirit of community, goodwill and a genuine concern for the health of the mind, body and spirit.

# HOME IMPROVEMENT

#### Safety upgrades for seniors' homes

Many seniors want to spend as long as possible residing in the comforts of their own homes. According to AARP's 2021 "Home and Community Preferences Survey," more than three-quarters of U.S. adults age 50 and older prefer living at home. But getting older often comes with certain deficits that may not make current living situations the safest for seniors.

Retirement Living reports that an older person is treated in an emergency room for a fall-related injury nearly once every 10 seconds. Falls cause millions of injuries and 32,000 deaths a year, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Seniors may be affected by low vision, mobility limitations, cognitive decline, balance issues, and loss of muscle strength. Certain adaptations may be necessary if seniors want to stay in their homes, particularly in older homes that have not recently been renovated.

#### Change knobs to levers

This is an easy modification. Levers are much easier for individuals with arthritis or persons who lack dexterity in their hands. Everything from doorknobs to faucet knobs can be replaced with levers.

#### Create zero-threshold entryways

Zero-threshold entryways, also known as flush entries, do not require crossing a lip or any raised barrier. They can appear on doorways and showers and make it easy for people who have mobility issues, as well as those using scooters, walkers and wheelchairs, to move about unencumbered.

#### Clear clutter/move obstructions

One inexpensive modification is to remove extraneous furniture and accessories. Such a change widens walking spaces in a room and accommodates walkers and wheelchairs. In addition, furniture can be pushed to the room's perimeter to make moving around easier. It's also important to remove area rugs, as they're often tripping hazards.

#### Install grab rails and supports

Minimizing falls could come down to providing support in key rooms of a home. Adding grab rails in the bathroom near the toilet and in the shower can help a person use those facilities without assistance. Install a grab rail close to seating in the kitchen to add support.

#### **Consider smart lighting**

Motion-activated or darkness-activated lighting switches and fixtures can automatically turn on lights, thereby improving visibility. Also, rocker light switches are easier to maneuver than standard toggles.

#### Invest in a stairlift

Single-story homes are preferable for growing older gracefully, but many seniors live in multi-story homes. A stairlift makes a multi-floor home more accessible, according to Elder, an eldercare service provider. Stairlifts make it easier to traverse staircases and reduce the risk






#### Wood floor installation dos and don'ts

Jaw-dropping features can sell a home in a heartbeat. A penthouse apartment with floor-to-ceiling windows and a panoramic view of a city skyline likely won't prove a hard sell, nor will a home with an infinity pool overlooking a landscape of rolling hills. As awe-inspiring as such features can be, some more subtle components, such as authentic hardwood floors, also can do much to make a home more appealing to prospective buyers.

Hardwood flooring is a sought-after commodity. Data from the National Association of Realtors indicates that 54

percent of home buyers are willing to pay more for hardwood floors. In fact, NAR figures indicate that 28 percent of buyers between the ages of 35 and 54 consider hardwood floors "very important" when looking for a home. Homeowners who are considering selling their homes, or those who simply want to upgrade their existing flooring, may want to consider installing hardwood flooring. Though it's a project best left to professionals, hardwood flooring can be installed by skilled DIYers. In such instances, homeowners may

want to keep these dos and don'ts in mind.

DO hire a professional if you have limited or no DIY flooring experience. Hardwood flooring installation is not generally a project for novice DIYers. Hardwood flooring projects may present some common challenges, but no two homes are the same. So unless they have prior experience installing floors in multiple rooms or homes, homeowners may save themselves time, trouble and a significant amount of money hiring a professional to do the job.

DON'T ignore the subfloor. New hardwoods won't erase the problem of subfloors in poor condition. According to the home renovation experts at BobVila.com, squeaky floors could be an indication that the subfloor has begun to warp or twist. Sinking floors are another indicator of deteriorating subfloors. Subfloors should be somewhat level before new hardwoods are installed, so DIYers should inspect and address subfloor



issues before installing new flooring.

DO expose wood flooring to the elements in your home prior to installation. The home improvement resource BuildDirect recommends acclimating hardwoods to the space where they will be installed. Skipping this important step could result in gaps during the winter and cupping over the summer. To acclimate hardwoods, open the boxes and spread them out for about a week while running the air conditioner or heater at normal levels.

When storing hardwoods prior to installation, avoid keeping them in potentially moist areas like a basement.

DON'T skimp on tools. A DIY hardwood flooring installation might be less expensive than hiring a professional, but homeowners should resist any temptation to increase those savings further by purchasing less costly tools or fewer tools than is necessary to complete the job. BuildDirect notes that DIYers will need at least a miter saw, table saw, cleat-nailer or stapler, finish nailer, compressor, jamb saw, chalk line, nail set, and tape measurer when installing hardwood floors. Purchase all necessary tools and read product reviews to ensure each tool is up to the task.

Wood floors can be awe-inspiring. Some homeowners can install such flooring on their own, and the project can be much easier if they learn as much about installation as possible prior to beginning the project

#### How to keep car interiors clean

Oil changes, tire rotations and even car washes may garner the bulk of drivers' attention in regard to vehicle maintenance. But various smaller undertakings, including keeping vehicle interiors clean, are worthy of drivers' attention as well.

Dust and dirt can accumulate in a vehicle over time, making for a less comfortable ride. Keeping vehicle interiors clean can make car and truck cabins more welcoming for drivers and their passengers, and such maintenance is simple and inexpensive.

• Focus on the floors. The floors in a car face all that weather has to offer. In winter, boots may track snow and deicing solutions like salt into a vehicle's cabin. In summer, sand from the beach or dirt from hiking trails may find its way in. Some drivers use the same floor mats year-round, but there's an advantage to switching based on the seasons. According to the automotive experts at Napa, fabric floor mats in summer will hold on to dirt and keep it from spreading. Beachgoers will appreciate that after tracking sand into their cars. In the winter, swap fabric floor mats with rubber or plastic alternatives, as these mats will hold melting snow, rain or salt, preventing them from staining the floors.

• Be mindful of seating materials. When cleaning seats, drivers should be mindful of the materials those seats are made of.

Cloth seats should be cleaned differently than leather and vinyl, and all seats should be vacuumed prior to cleaning. Consumer Reports notes that leather and vinyl seats are treated with a protective coating that requires gentle cleaning. Begin with a small cloth with a dab of dish or saddle soap, and then apply a leather conditioner to prevent the leather from drying out. When cleaning cloth seats, an upholstery cleaner can be applied to stains, just be sure to follow instructions carefully. Cleaning products are not all the same, and application techniques may vary. A scrub brush can be used to work cleaning solutions into the seats and any lingering moisture can then be wiped away with a microfiber cloth.

• Clean the inside of your car windshield. Use an interior glass cleaner to clean the interior windshields and windows. These surfaces can accumulate a significant amount of dirt due to interior vapors and air pollution. Consumer Reports recommends using a glass cleaner that contains alcohol. Interior glass cleaners are designed to prevent streaking and film buildup, which can compromise drivers' vision.

• Take on touchscreens. Modern vehicles have touchscreens that can quickly accumulate dust and fingerprints. Toyota recommends soaking a clean cloth in lukewarm water and lightly wiping the surface of touch screens.



Keeping vehicle interiors clean can make car and truck cabins more welcoming for drivers and their passengers, and such maintenance is simple and inexpensive.

Avoid substances like solvents, alkaline or acidic solutions, which can contribute to staining or discoloration on the screen.

Clean car interiors can make driving that much more enjoyable and even more healthy.

#### Hygienic alternatives to apple bobbing

People who were born in the early 1980s and earlier likely spent some time bobbing for apples each fall. Bobbing for apples long has been a classic autumn activity. Yet today's children may not know what it entails.

Bobbing for apples is a tradition that began in Europe hundreds of years ago as a courting ritual or a way to see who would get married next. When Europeans settled in the U.S. and Canada, they brought their apple bobbing traditions with them. However, over the years, bobbing evolved from an activity geared around romance to one focused on fun for children.

Apple bobbing has largely fallen out of favor as more parents zeroed in on the potential yuck factor of having several mouths and noses dunked into the same bucket of water trying to grab a Red Delicious or Granny Smith. The pandemic also undoubtedly made some people skeptical about the safety of apple bobbing. Thankfully, there are alternatives for those who want to enjoy the spirit of apple bobbing without spreading germs.

#### Hanging apples

Tie strings to the stems of apples and hang each individual apple to a clothesline. Without using their hands, participants must consume the majority of the apple of their choosing. Whoever finishes first wins a prize.

#### Bobbing individually

One workaround to create more hygienic fun is to give party participants their own separate bowls or buckets for bobbing. Plastic beverage tubs at dollar stores are inexpensive and readily available. Fill them up with water and float two or three apples in each. Then the race is on for each participant to snag some apples.

#### Grabbing for apples

Kids need not use their jaws to grab apples. Kids can use small spoons, chopsticks, a spatula – anything you can think of – to make it challenging to grab a floating apple.

#### Symbolic 'apple' toss

Fill up red balloons with water and set up a traditional water balloon toss.

Participants pair up and toss the "apples" to one another, moving further and further away with each round. The last pair to have an intact "apple" wins.

Bobbing for apples has fallen out of favor as concerns about hygiene have risen. However, there are ways to incorporate the fun parts of bobbing for apples without compromising kids' overall health.

#### Avoid these common Halloween costume dangers

Children and adults may spend weeks planning their Halloween costumes. Movie or television characters, political figures, horror icons, or everyday heroes are among the most popular costumes each year.

Much thought goes into Halloween costumes, and equal consideration should be given to ensuring the costume is as safe as it is fun. The following are some common costume hazards and how to avoid them.

· Flammable materials: According to the ASTM D1230-17 - Standard Test Method for Flammability of Apparel Textiles, some combustible fabrics used in the design of clothing "are potentially dangerous to the wearer because of such factors as ease of ignition, flame spread time, amount of heat released, and design of the garment." Quite often Halloween costumes fall under these dangerous classifications because they are not considered everyday apparel. Materials may not be sturdy and federal requirements for clothing to be flame-resistant may be skirted. Some costumes can ignite in seconds. Others also may cause "flaming drip," which describes the melting of plastic material that leads to it separating from the rest of the costume. Flaming drip can cause secondary fires or burns to the skin. Look for costumes that list flame-resistance, even if they may be more expensive.

- · Invisible suits: Invisible suits are stretchy bodysuits that cover the entire frame and head. Newer incarnations that are all black without eyeholes can be dangerous to wear because they limit
- wearers' ability to see clearly and be seen by others. • Dangerous makeup: Halloween makeup

may not be created in adherence to the same standards as regular cosmetics. Check ingredients for hazards and warnings about where the makeup can be applied, as some products are not recommended for use around the mouth or eyes. Apply a small amount first to see if an allergic reaction occurs.

- · Capes and flowing components: Costumes that have long, flowing parts, such as a costume for Ringwraith, a character from the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy, or even caped crusaders can be fire hazards. Parts of such costumes also can get caught underfoot in doors (such as rotating entrances to stores) and even the gears on bicycles. Strangulation or falls can occur in these instances
- · Faulty footwear: Costumes that require the use of high heels, platform shoes or any other design that may impede the ability to walk safely should be discouraged. Not only can they cause foot discomfort that reduces time spent on the trick-or-treating circuit, but these costumes also increase the risk of slips and falls and twisted or broken ankles.
- · Contact lenses: Colored or patterned contact lenses are popular components of some costumes. However, decorative contact lenses should not be used without a proper fitting by an eye care professional who sells reputable decorative contact brands. Also, never share contact lenses and always wash hands before putting in contacts or removing them from the eyes.

Halloween is a festive holiday, and even more so when costumes don't compromise celebrants'







#### Seven uses for fallen leaves

By the time autumn hits full swing, many trees will have shed their leaves for the season, and the last vestiges of red, yellow and orange magic will have faded to brown. Raking, blowing and collecting leaves becomes the primary

of gathered leaves to tend to.
It is impossible to count just how many leaves fall to the ground each year, or just how many pounds of leaves get collected curbside, but

the numbers are substantial. Cleaning up leaves is considerable work, but not all of those leaves need to be carted away. In fact, there are several different uses of leaves that can be beneficial.

1. Spread leaves as a protective mulch to cover

tender perennials or root crops/bulbs in the ground. The leaves will form a natural insulating cover that keeps

a bit warmer over winter.

2. Create a pile of leaves that will break down and form a crumbly, com-

the soil and the plants within

post-like material called leaf mold. Even though leaf mold may sound like a blight, it's actually a good amendment to garden soil, improving its structure and ability to hold water. Leaf mold also attracts beneficial organisms that are vital in healthy soil.

3. Brown leaves can be added to green materials in compost piles to improve the health of the compost being formed. According to the healthy living resource Care2, the ideal ratio is 75 percent brown to 25 percent green materials in compost. Turn compost piles regularly to aerate them.

4. Store dried, mulched leaves in a dry spot so they can be used in the spring as a weed barrier for spring plantings. They will keep weeds at bay and help retain soil moisture to ensure small sprouts have the resources to grow.

5. Use shredded leaves as a lawn supplement. Pass a lawn mower over leaves left on the lawn to break them down into pieces too small to rake. This will help keep the lawn healthy throughout the winter without blocking out needed sunlight.

6. Bag dried leaves and pack them tightly together in cold areas of the home, such as basements or garages. They can act as added insulation. Bags of leaves also can be placed around planting containers to protect them from frost.

7. Gather a few of the best-looking leaves and preserve them. Use an iron on a low setting and press leaves between two pieces of waxed paper until the waxed paper seals together. Or use clear contact paper to achieve the same effect.

#### Pondering the pumpkin

The pumpkin is an odd vegetable. The more popular pumpkins get, the less people eat them.

Everyone wants to carve a jack-o'-lantern, but few people make pumpkin pie anymore. In other words, the pumpkin was once a popular food but now it's just another pretty face.

When Europeans arrived in the New World, pumpkins and other squashes were widely cultivated by Native Americans who boiled, baked and dried them for nourishment. Pumpkins are one of the oldest domesticated food plants. Seeds many thousands of years old have been found in the highlands of Mexico.

Pumpkins come in all sizes and shapes. They're in the cucurbit plant family that includes squashes and cucumbers, but there are different species of pumpkins. Cucurbita moschata includes pumpkins used for canning which tend to be oblong with tan skin. The jack-o'-lantern and miniature pumpkins are Cucurbita pepo. Cucurbita maxima are the beasts of the pumpkin patch, giant pumpkins.

Henry David Thoreau wrote about growing a pumpkin weighing 123 pounds in 1857. By 1893 the record was 365 pounds, at the Chicago World's Fair. The 1,000-pound mark was reached in 1996 by a New York grower. Last year, a pumpkin in Italy weighed

2,703 pounds (the current world record).

Pumpkins of any size start from a female flower. These open for a few hours in the morning, ready for insects to deliver pollen from a male flower. Managed honeybees and native, ground-based bumble bees and squash bees are common pumpkin pollinators.

Once pollinated, pumpkins grow rapidly. They're ready for harvest when the skin is tough to puncture with a fingernail and the seeds are ripe. Most pumpkins turn orange as they ripen, but there are varieties with blue, tan and white coloring.

The difference between pumpkins and other winter squashes is culinary rather than taxonomic.

Pumpkins are drier, coarser and strong-flavored compared to squash. They're used in pies rather than served as a baked vegetable. They typically have a harder, more jagged stem too.

The average pumpkin meets its demise in October or November for Halloween or Thanksgiving, as a jack-o'-lantern or for dessert. The tradition of carving vegetables for Halloween was brought to

America by Irish and Scottish immigrants, who previously used potatoes or turnips, but found pumpkins easier to carve. Halloween has its origins in an ancient Celtic event as well as All Saints Day, established by medieval popes.

The U.S. produces about 1.5 billion pounds of pump-kins annually. Much of that comes from Illinois for canning. In the Northeast, pump-kins are an important source

of autumn revenue for many diversified vegetable farms.

Pumpkins are fun, delicious and nutritious. Their orange color comes from beta-carotene, an antioxidant that converts to vitamin A in the body. One cup of pumpkin contains just 50 calories but has three grams of fiber and a lot of potassium. Pumpkin seeds are packed with protein, fiber, many minerals and healthy unsaturated fats.







### Helping wild bumblebee queens overwinter

rild bees are important pollinators for our crops, gardens and wild plants. In Vermont there are over 350 types of wild bees, including 17 different species of bumblebees.

Bumblebees are efficient pollinators that are especially important for spring crops, such as early bloom-

bumblebees can find shelter.

Queen bees will be one of the first visitors of spring crops, hungry after a long winter. To help them survive winter, here are some things gardeners and landowners can do:

• Leave blooms standing nectar. Leaving plants up as far into the fall as possible, source of both.

burrows are known nesting sites for bumblebees. Maybe all those voles tunneling

have a saving grace?

• Consider reduced mowing and avoid cutting back ornamental bunch grasses. Don't rake up fallen leaves and skip the winter brush pile burn party. All these provide great rodent burrow materials and locations where bumblebee queens can nest during winter months.

• Man-made structures can also become wild habitat. Whether it's your 1800s stone wall reminiscent of New England sheep farming, an old foundation or your new \$30,000 retaining wall, each provides protective cracks and crevices where bumblebees can find



historical structures on your land. Or cultivate new habitat by taking rocks picked from your property to make a rock pile where bumblebee queens can nest as they enter diapause, a state of dormancy, for the winter.

Offering pollen, nectar and water sources late into autumn and abundant and diverse undisturbed shelters for nests will help ensure each queen's survival and early season pollination services next spring.






