VP-TECH students develop soft skills during Engineering Wars

The challenge for students at the recent Engineering Wars in Rome was to build mechanisms to launch metal spheres as far as possible, but it was the skills students practiced during the process that were the real goal.

Two team of Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Valley Pathways in Technology Early College High School students competed in the Engineering Wars.

"The students had to work together as a team to problem solve, with communication being the highest priority," Herkimer BOCES VP-TECH Coordinator Rebecca Roberts said. "In addition to solving the task at hand, they had to show creativity and be able to present on their Rube Goldberg machines. They were not only able to show off their technical skills, but their soft skills were also on full display."

Students from 10 schools from across the

state participated in the second annual Engineering Wars on Oct. 14 at Innovare Advancement Center in Rome. Trenton Technology Inc. designed the challenge for the competition and provided a panel of judges.

Herkimer BOCES VP-TECH sent both a seniors team and a freshmen team. Students competed in teams of four.

The VP-TECH seniors were Central Valley Central School District students Mark Hanshaw and Cole Dowling, Herkimer Central School District student Dominick Hutchins and West Canada Valley Central School District student Lucas Wesseldine.

The VP-TECH freshmen were Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District student Theresa Delong, Dolgeville Central School District students Kaden Kleist and Cayleigh Youker and Herkimer Central School District student Cooper Jordan.

VP-TECH focuses on technology, project-based learning and real-world work situations. Students can spend four to six years in the program to earn a Regents diploma, a certification in advanced manufacturing, connections with local businesses and a no-cost associate degree from Herkimer College in quality assurance, networking, business or electrical engineering technology.

Powers to share 'Stories of Little Falls' and 'Scriptwriting for Cinematography'

The Creative Outpost Inc. has the next of its combined workshop/community presentations planned for Rock City Centre. Matt Powers will be the presenter for both events and will have a "Stories of Little Falls" focus, with "Scriptwriting for Cinematography."

Powers is a resident of Little Falls and a professor at Herkimer College, where he teaches writing, acting, film, literature and sometimes poetry.

His love for all these things started back when he was in second grade. "I went to Herkimer Elementary School and they put on a really simple play. There was this messenger position, and I auditioned and didn't get the part. The day before the play, the person who got the part got sick, and they said 'Matt, can you do it' – and I said, 'Heck yeah, I can do it!'"

He said his line and had a great time, and it inspired him. "From that point forward, I realized the power of theater, the power of storytelling and different mediums."

Powers doesn't want the workshop to be too restrictive for the attendees, but he wants them to set whatever story they want to tell briefly in Little Falls.

"Every scene has to be in Little Falls in some capacity. They can choose a genre or a veneer over it, as 'A Quiet Place' did. I love that shot going up Main Street. We see it's Main Street, but it's post-apocalypse. That is awesome."

He wants to get the attendees to visualize different situations in different ways. "If Little Falls was part of a fantasy setting, what would that look like? If it were part

of a science fiction movie, what would it look like? I'm going to require that they all do that."

For the Community Presentation, Powers wants to summarize what the workshop was in miniature. "I want to talk about storytelling and how characters drive story and what defines a character and how that character defines different elements."

Powers said he runs around Little Falls (literally) and has built a photo presentation of locations that he thinks are interesting for scenes.

"I'll go through my slides and say I find these locations dynamic for these reasons – not only because each location is interesting for photographic or cinematic reasons, but the nature of the location helps give it more depth to that moment you're experiencing."

Space is limited to 50 people for the community presentation and 15 in the workshop. Both are free and take place at Rock City Centre, 690 E. Main St., Little Falls. To register, visit creativeoutpost. org/course-list.



New York Folklore exhibit announced

New York Folklore announces their Fall 2022/Winter 2023 exhibit: S. Beth Taylor, Fabric Artist and Quilter, Schenectady County - "Quilted Thread: Colorful Cards and Quilts"

"Quilted Thread: Colorful Cards and Quilts" opens Nov. 10 and continues through March 2023 at New York Folklore's gallery located at 129 Jay St., Schenectady.

Born into an artistic and tinkering family with roots in the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina, Taylor has been around creative endeavors of music, sewing, painting and metal work since childhood. After a lifetime of singing and a 30-year career in higher education and human services, she fell in love with combining words and fabric with free-form quilting. Taylor creates fiber art, wall hangings, religious paraments and greeting cards using new and recycled materials.


Each piece begins with a collection of cotton and silk fabric and a notion of size, with colors and patterns that will create the foundation and mood of a piece. Responding to the combination of color and pattern, Taylor's pieces are freeform and a piece often goes in a new direction. Incorporating meaningful items and symbols adds another dimension to these works.

Taylor loves lyrics, poems and prayers from many traditions and enjoys adding them to wall hangings. The quilt's colors and design support and lift up words that encourage, comfort and teach. Words catch the viewer's attention and slow us all down as we read. Taylor hopes that her work reminds us of our connections to each other and to all that is good in our complicated world.

By using written lyrics and scripture as part of her quilts, Taylor places music, visual art and quilting into conversation. Making free-form quilts and making music have much in common in that both require working within inherent limits. The notes on a page of music, the sounds of the instruments, the qualities of the fabric and the thread are realities that one works within to make a work of art the best quality artistic expression it can be.

New York Folklore's Gallery of New York Artists is located at 129 Jay St. on the pedestrian walkway. Gallery hours are Tuesday - Saturday, 10 a.m. - 3:30 p.m., and Sundays 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. Call for mid-winter Gallery hours. How to change Medicare plans – and why you might want to


Medicare open enrollment starts soon, but seven in 10 Medicare beneficiaries say they don't compare Medicare plans during this period, according to a 2021 analysis by KFF, a health policy nonprofit.

That's not great, since Medicare Advantage plans – which operate much like the private in-

surance you may have had through an employer – change from year to year. One of your doctors may have fallen out of network or your prescription drug prices may have gone up. And people with Original Medicare should compare their Part D prescription drug coverage.

Here's how to approach switching Medicare plans.

Take Advantage of Enrollment Periods

If you have a Medicare plan, Medicare open enrollment from Oct. 15 - Dec. 7 is your opportunity to change coverage. You can switch from Original Medicare to Medicare Advantage, or vice versa, or enroll in or change Medicare Part D prescription drug plans.

If you have Medicare Advantage, you can also use Medicare Advantage open enrollment from Jan. 1 - March 31 each year to switch plans or go back to Original Medicare and sign up for a Medicare Part D drug plan.

Consider Prescription Drugs

If you're on any prescription medications, understand how your current plan will cover them in 2023 and whether another plan might be more affordable.

"It can be as simple as putting your drugs into Medicare.gov," said Scott Maibor, a Medicare advisor based in Boston. "You should at least verify that 'This is the plan I'm on, this is the plan that's recommended – what are the savings?""

That's because Part D prescription drug plans, whether you're with Original Medicare or getting coverage through a Medicare Advantage plan, can change each year. You may find that one of your prescriptions will cost more in 2023, or that your plan will stop covering it. Or you may have started a new medication and you can find a plan that charges you less for it.

Don't forget to browse your drug plan's preferred pharmacies. "It's not even just a matter of cost sometimes, it's a matter of location," said Karen Schechter, director and assistant professor of the healthcare management and health administration programs at Maryville University. "If I'm a person who needs to refill a prescription once a month, I may not want to go to a place that's far away."

Think Hard Before Giving Up Your Medigap Plan

You're first eligible for a Medicare Supplement Insurance, or Medigap, plan once you're

65 or older and you have Medicare Part B. This six-month Medigap open enrollment period happens only once, and you can buy any policy you want, regardless of your health. After that, you may not be able to get a Medigap plan – or it might cost more.

Medigap pays many of the out-of-pocket costs of Original Medicare. If you have a serious or chronic health condition, that can lead to significant cost savings. Some people switch to Medicare Advantage plans during open enrollment, not realizing they might not be able to switch back to a Medigap plan later.

"Our clients are sitting at home, they're seeing these commercials on television talking about the free gym membership, zero premiums and they go ahead and make changes on their own," said Emily Gang, owner of the Medicare Coach. "They realize early in the year that they made a mistake and we can't go back."

Complete the Process


To sign up for a new plan, you'll need your Medicare number and the date your Part A and/or Part B coverage started. (All of this information is on your Medicare card.)

You may be able to enroll online, but you might also have to make a call or two:

- If you're moving from one Medicare Advantage plan to another, you'll be disenrolled from your previous plan automatically once your new coverage kicks in.
- If you're switching from Medicare Advantage to Original Medicare, call 800.MEDICARE to make the change or call your plan provider to disenroll. Don't forget to sign up for prescription drug coverage (Part D) to avoid paying a penalty.
- If you're switching from Original Medicare to Medicare Advantage, your new plan will transfer your benefits from Medicare.
- If you're switching Part D drug plans, your old coverage will end when your new coverage starts.
- If you're staying with your current plan, do nothing. Your coverage will renew automatically.

Growing great garlic

Garlic is an unusual crop. It's vegetatively propagated, planted in autumn and especially flavorful. It probably originated in central Asia, and then was brought to Europe, and by the early 1700s, to America.

There are two types of garlic. Hardneck garlic forms a false flower stalk in spring called a scape. Its bulbs usually have five to seven large cloves.

Softneck garlic doesn't produce a scape. Its bulbs contain a dozen or so smaller cloves. Elephant garlic is not a garlic at all, but in the leek family. It produces large bulbs with three or four cloves.

Garlic grows well in many different soils and climates, but only varieties that are hardy and adapted to the Northeast will perform well here. These are best obtained from commercial garlic growers in your area or from seed companies that specialize in serving the Northeast. Once you find a variety that does well in your garden, you can save the largest and healthiest bulbs for replanting to build your own seed stock.

Individual garlic cloves should be planted in late October, about a month before the ground freezes. This timing allows roots to establish, but shoots won't get up above ground level. Set cloves about four inches deep, eight inches apart.

Next spring, each clove will form a bulb with the same genetic makeup as the original clove. Garlic requires a cold treatment to induce bulbing, so garlic planted in spring will only produce a small single bulb without cloves.

Garlic grows best in a soil pH of 6.2 to 7.0. Add lime, phosphorus

and potassium as needed, based on soil test recommendations, and incorporate those thoroughly prior to planting.

A light addition of mature compost can benefit garden soil that's low in organic matter. In spring, apply about three pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet on top of the garlic planting when the shoots are about six inches high. That's equivalent to about 20 pounds of Chilean nitrate, 25 pounds of dried blood or 50 pounds of soybean meal. Scratch in lightly if possible.

Mulching garlic with a thick layer of clean straw after planting helps control weeds and retain soil moisture. In a wet spring, mulch can keep the soil from drying out and lead to soil-borne diseases, so pull it away from the garlic if the soil remains saturated due to frequent rain. Plastic mulch, with holes for each clove, is another option for weed control.

Good weed control is critical. If no mulch is used, shallow cultivation will be needed. A narrow collinear hoe works well in tightly spaced crops like garlic. Apply irrigation frequently during dry periods to ensure good growth.

Harvest garlic once the lower third of leaves begin yellowing, usually in late July. The ideal time is when bulbs attain maximum size but cloves have not started to separate inside the bulb. Dig up a few bulbs and cut them in half, perpendicular to the cloves, to see if they're ready.

After pulling the bulbs, gently wash them or rub off the soil later once the bulbs are dry. For good storage, thoroughly dry bulbs for several weeks. Hang them in bundles or spread out on a piece of wire fence in a well-ventilated shed or other structure protected from the elements.

Garlic should keep for several months in paper or plastic mesh bags in a cool, relatively dry, dark and well-ventilated area, such as some basements. Temperatures in the fifties and about 50% relative humidity are ideal.

What's behind noises your car might be making

Few things can be as unsettling when behind the wheel as a sudden noise. Noises coming from a car can indicate a host of issues, and that's one reason why such sounds tend to be so different. Quickly identifying what's behind car noises can make for safer driving and potentially save drivers substantial amounts of money.

Noise: Rattling coins

Problem: Loose lug nut in a hub cap

This noise can be loud and unsettling, but the good news is that it's often a simple fix if addressed immediately. The automotive insurance experts at Geico note that a noise that sounds like coins rattling around in a dryer is likely a loose lug nut in a hubcap. The lug nut might have become loose if a wheel was not tightened sufficiently after a recent maintenance appointment or even if drivers changed a tire on their own. The longer drivers wait to address this, the more dangerous

and costly it could become, as it could have an effect on the wheel bearings. If addressed promptly, the damage is likely minimal.

Noise: Squealing on start-up

Problem: Issue with the serpentine belt A squealing noise at start-up is among the more annoying noises a driver can hear. This sound is often indicative of a worn or damaged serpentine belt, which connects the crankshaft to the alternator, power steering and additional components. Thankfully, a worn down serpentine belt is a relatively inexpensive repair, though it's important that it be addressed promptly. Squealing at start-up also could indicate a loose tensioner, which is designed to keep the serpentine belt at a certain tightness and tension, or wear and tear to the belt due to parking outside. These issues can be addressed by readjusting or replacing the tensioner or replacing the serpentine belt, particularly if the part is old.

Noise: Engine knocking

Problem: Various issues

A knocking noise from the engine typically sounds like repeated tapping. The noise will often become louder as the vehicle accelerates. Various issues can be behind the knocking sound, and drivers should avoid self-diagnosing the problem, even if they've

experienced it in the past with the same or a different vehicle. Some drivers hear knocking because they're using 87 octane fuel instead the of the high-performance and more expensive fuel the owner's manual recommends (this could be a common problem in recent months given the meteoric rise in fuel prices). Another potential cause of engine knock could be problems with the pistons or crankshaft. Regardless of what's causing

engine knocking, drivers are urged to take their vehicle to a mechanic promptly, as the cost of repairs is likely to rise the longer knocking goes untreated.

No one wants to hear noises coming from their vehicles. However, such noises should be addressed promptly, as the quickness of drivers' responses could make the difference between a simple, less costly fix and a more time-consuming, expensive repair.



Tips for waterproofing a basement or crawl space

Remedying water issues in a home generally breaks down into two methodologies: exterior waterproofing and interior waterproofing. Depending on the cause and severity of the water issue, one or the other, or even both, may be recommended.

Exterior waterproofing

Exterior waterproofing aims to keep water away from and out of the home. The home improvement information resource DoltYourself.com says that exterior waterproofing generally includes the application of a waterproofing agent to the concrete foundation. In addition, exterior waterproofing also could include excavation so a drainage system can be installed around the entire footing of the home. Re-grading a property and properly relocating gutters and downspouts can help with many water issues.


Interior waterproofing

When water in a basement or crawl space needs to be remediated indoors, a system to collect, drain and remove water may be necessary. This can include sump pumps, drains, gravity discharge systems, and more. Moisture barriers, which can include special paints or products applied to the foundation walls and floor, also can help keep water from entering the space.

Moisture solutions

Keeping water out is only one part of the equation. Homeowners also need to manage moisture, like excessive humidity. A marriage of HVAC and waterproofing techniques may be necessary to improve air flow and remove humidity in the air.

While many homeowners have attempted to address water issues on their own, many times it is a job best left to the professionals. Because water penetration can have multifaceted causes, a professional can best assess the situation and create solutions that fit with homeowners' budgets and needs. The re-

• Heated flooring: You need not worry about stepping out of a warm shower onto a cold floor when heated flooring is part of the equation. This option is available in various flooring materials as well.







The many benefits of houseplants

The lines between the outdoors and indoors are being blurred. Homeowners build extensive outdoor living spaces so they can relax on weather-resistant furniture and even cook in lavish kitchens in their backyards. Higher absolute humidity can decrease the chances of survival and transmission of the flu virus.

Filter the Air

Researchers who presented their work at the 252nd National Meeting & Exposition of the American Chemical Society found certain houseplants can combat the potentially harmful effects of volatile organic compounds. Plants may help filter out VOCs like benzene, acetone and formaldehyde, which can enter indoor air via cleaning supplies, dry-cleaned clothes, furniture, printers, and paints.

Improve Interior Atmosphere

Prevention magazine says plants can be used to screen unattractive areas, moderate room temperature by shading spots from the sun and even reduce noise. Plants also can improve ambiance and create a pleasing atmo-



Can Improve Mood

Growing and caring for plants can alleviate everyday stress. A nationwide study from UK Magazine Gardeners World found 80 percent of gardeners declared themselves satisfied with life compared to 67 percent among non-gardeners. Gardeners were more positive mentally. Greenery can help people feel more at home and improve mental health. A rehab center in Norway found patients reported a greater increase in well-being four weeks after having greenery added to their surroundings.







Caramel/salted caramel:


Great in coffee. Drizzle over warm




