Grandview Baptist Church installs new pastor

Grandview Baptist Church of Fort Plain recently officially recognized God's call to Sean Morin to be their pastor. Morin, originally from Amsterdam, answered God's call, along with his wife Amy and their son Jeremiah, in April 2022 and has quickly been assimilated into the church and community.

The service began with an opening prayer by Pastor Mark Kelley of Faith Bible Church in Carlisle, scripture reading by Deacon Dennis White and a hymn led by David Clinansmith, both of Grandview Baptist Church.

The first speaker was Pastor Sean's mentor, Pastor Chris

Gardner from Metropolitan Baptist Church in Brooklyn. He gave a challenge to Morin from Romans 1:8-15 highlighting the pastor's duty to serve through Jesus Christ with passion, prayer, partners, proclamation and preaching.

Next was Morin's former pastor, Bill Pitcher of First Baptist Church in Amsterdam. Pitcher challenged the congregation from I Timothy 5:17-21, pointing out that individuals of the congregation are to respect the pastor's preferences, his time, family and privacy. They are to claim him as their own pastor and never compare him negatively to any other pastor. The church is to give him "double honor" and not gossip about him or his family realizing that he has to answer directly to God. He is the man God put here and the man we need here

In accepting that charge, Morin spoke of his thankfulness for God's call and for the people at Grandview Baptist Church, recognizing that God is the potter and His people are the clay (Isaiah 64:8). He cleans us and shapes us for His use when and where He wants us. We have been saved from God's wrath by God's grace through the faith He gave us, to do His work according to His will. Everything we do is to glorify God, and that is what Morin intends to do in Fort Plain.

Lastly, Deacon Derick Waters of Grandview Baptist Church represented the congregation in accepting the challenge given to the congregation. He spoke of the congregation's responsibility to meet the needs of the new pastor, whether material needs, emotional needs or in any other way they can. It is their responsibility to protect him from being overworked and to encourage him often. They are not to criticize him, recognizing that God placed him in Fort Plain for their benefit.

In conclusion, Pastor Kelly led in a prayer of dedication with all the pastors present laying their hands on Pastor Morin in agreement and blessing. Following the service, everyone enjoyed a time of fellowship and a wonderful meal.

Creative resiliency in the Mohawk Valley

The Mohawk Valley Econom-Development District Inc. (MVEDD) has been awarded a grant in the amount of \$173,033 from the USDA through the Rural Placemaking Innovation Challenge (RPIC) for the project titled "Creative Resiliency in the Mohawk Valley." MVEDD serves the Mohawk Valley region and will be working directly with four target communities on this initiative: the Town of Minden, the Village of Fort Plain, the Village of Palatine Bridge and the Village of Nelliston

USDA Rural Development Under Secretary Xochitl Torres Small announced that USDA is awarding \$4 million in cooperative agreements to 17 organizations under the RPIC. The assistance will help the organizations support people who have been unserved or underserved and live in socially vulnerable communities, Tribal communities and rural areas.

Placemaking is a collaborative planning and technical assistance process that helps leaders from rural communities create quality places where people will want to live, work, visit and learn.

Creating effective and attractive community spaces truly takes a village. Eddie Watt, Village of Nelliston clerk-treasurer, who was instrumental in gaining local support for the project, stated, "I'm excited and grateful for this opportunity from the USDA to bring our community together. It's worth noting that this wouldn't have been possible without all of our partners from business and government to education and cultural organizations. Nothing happens in a vacuum and I believe RPIC will give us the chance to plan for community growth that benefits everyone. I look forward to showing the community what we can accomplish together."

Through MVEDD's community engagement, strong partnerships and implementation assistance, we will collaborate with these towns and villages to help solve problems, create effective new projects and strategic plans and build more creative and equitable places to live, work and play. MVEDD's innovative and adaptive approaches to economic and community development will allow us to provide, alongside USDA Rural Development, technical assistance unprecedented in the rural communities we serve.

Dr. Mari Kate Mycek, the project director for the program, remarked, "I am grateful for all the dedicated partners who have supported this project. I grew up in Montgomery County and know firsthand what a beautiful place it is to live, and how much potential there is. We have an incredible team of people invested in helping these communities shine, and it's a joy to see so many creative approaches and ideas."

MVEDD, alongside its partners, will work with community leaders to create placemaking plans, host community workshops, identify implementation projects and submit applications for grant funding. There is no universal formula to create a sense of place and opportunity in a community. Each location this taskforce works with will be unique. However, all projects will require our partners to create both a connection to that space, in a collaborative way.

Celebrating and honoring this region's history will be central to the placemaking plans. Highlight-ing a region's history can help foster a sense of pride and connection to our communities - and history is something the Mohawk Valley is rich in. Village of Palatine Bridge Mayor James Post stated, "The Village of Palatine Bridge has a variety of places located on the historic registry and is located along the Mohawk River which provides a serene and beautiful landscape for our residents. We look forward to engaging with MVEDD and USDA-RD to better understand ways in which we can further enhance our community."

These projects are meant to increase the draw to this entire region, and it will take a spirit of cooperation in which everyone has a voice. Cheryl Reese, Town of Minden's mayor, commented, "We believe through our efforts

to collaborate with MVEDD and the many committed partners supporting this project, we can help continue to be an agent for positive change in our region."

Placemaking can also be a springboard toward the future. Village of Fort Plain Mayor Patrick Hanifin said, "We have a vibrant community with passionate residents and an up-andcoming downtown area that is ripe with possibility. We are excited and eager to help identify community assets and projects that will help our community become a better place to live, work and play for all."

To create lasting change, this project will need Mohawk Valley youth to get involved and put down their roots. Dr. Nick Fitzgerald, superintendent of Canajoharie Central Schools, said, "MVEDD's approach to placemaking activities will make our communities stronger, which benefits the many students and staff who live and work in these communities. In order to help keep the next generation in our communities, we need to have youth actively involved in decisions regarding placemaking programs and future projects. This is an excellent opportunity for students to learn about community engagement, public policy and network."

Mohawk Valley Today's goal is to highlight all the wonderful things about the Mohawk Valley to the public, both for residents and those who might want to call the Mohawk Valley home.



It's the holiday season: Tree cutting tradition promotes NYS Christmas tree farms and kicks off the festive season

New York State Agriculture Commissioner Richard A. Ball led the department's annual tree-cutting tradition on Nov. 22 at New York State Grown & Certified Stokoe Farms in Scottsville, cutting down a ninefoot-tall Fraser fir that will be proudly displayed at the Finger Lakes Welcome Center. The annual event highlights New York's Christmas tree industry and encourages New Yorkers to shop local at farms as they pick out trees this season and at local agricultural businesses as they check items off of gift lists for loved ones and set their tables for the holidays.

Ball said, "New York's agricultural industry plays such an important role in holiday traditions in ways that many New Yorkers may be surprised to discover. From the trees we gather around and wreaths we decorate with, to the food we eat and specialty items we purchase as thoughtful gifts, our local farms and agricultural businesses contribute to this festive season in incredible ways. We hope New Yorkers remember local farmers and businesses during this season of giving, and all year long."

Gene Knudsen, president of the Christmas Tree Farmers Association of New York, said, "Thank you to Commissioner Richard Ball for continuing this tradition. We look forward to it every year, as it unofficially kicks off the busiest and most magical time of year for Christmas tree farmers. We hope those who celebrate Christmas will bring their families to a local farm, enjoy an outdoor outing and pick a fresh

centerpiece for their traditions."

According to the Christmas Tree Farmers Association of New York, New York State is home to 875 tree farms. With tree farms sprawling across almost 19,000 acres, the state ranks fourth in the country in acres dedicated to growing Christmas trees. By selecting a tree from any one of these local farms, New Yorkers and their families can support this important agricultural sector, which has an \$13.8 million economic impact. Dozens of Christmas tree farms are also members of the NYS Grown & Certified Program, which means they adhere to environmental sustainability standards in growing their trees.

Travelers are also encouraged to look for NYS Grown & Certified trees on display at each of the state's regional Welcome Centers and Taste NY stores. The Welcome Centers and Taste NY stores also features a variety of gift items and gift sets, stocked with local products made and produced by New York farms and food and beverage producers unique to the region the Welcome Center is located in. From local, gourmet food items and locally produced craft beverages to novelty items and even bath and beauty products, gifts range in size and price and can be customized. Customers may reach out to their closest local Taste NY location for specific offerings and details.

Many Taste NY markets and stores sell grocery items including charcuterie meats and cheeses, as well as wine and cider, serving as a convenient place to find food and beverages that can contribute to fresh, delicious holiday meals or serve as last-minute hostess gifts. In

Tips to avoid charity impersonation scams

The New York State Department of State's Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) aims to raise awareness about charity scams. Donations of any kind can make a real impact on a good cause, which is why charity scams are especially cruel. Unfortunately, scammers never miss an opportunity to defraud people, so it's important to remember that not all donation requests are legitimate. The Division has created this quick guide to help donors do their own due diligence on the charities seeking their support.

"After a major event such as a natural disaster, tragedy or as the season of giving unfolds, scammers prey on the good intentions of people and take money that could otherwise help individuals and programs in need," said Secretary of State Robert Rodriguez. "In order to ensure that donations go to the right place, we encourage New Yorkers to research and confirm charity claims before making a donation."

Charity scams can happen at any time, but they are more prevalent after a natural disaster or emergencies collecting millions of dollars from unsuspecting donors. On many occasions, these fraudsters pretend to be affiliated with wellknown organizations or even the government to scam people out of their hard-earned money. According to the Federal Trade Commission, about 2.8 million people nation-wide reported being victims of someone pretending to be a trusted charity source in 2021 causing loses of about \$2.3 billion.

To prevent your donation money from falling into the wrong hands, DCP recommends taking the following precautions:

• Check the legitimacy of the charitable organization. Research the charity by searching the New York State Attorney General's online database of registered charities at charitiesnys.com, and by visiting websites such as bbb.org, give. org and guidestar.org in addition to visiting the charity's website. If donating toward relief efforts after a natural disaster, check a site like disasterphilanthropy.org to be sure your money is going to truly help those in need.

• Learn how to detect a phony charity. Some scammers will create fake "charities" and try to trick you with similar names of well-known charities. Pay attention to the charity's name, web address, logos, etc. Scammers often mimic the names of familiar, trusted organizations to fool donors.

• Designate your donation. Find out what percentage of your donation will go directly toward the cause as opposed to administrative costs. Ask the charity whether you can designate your donation to a specific effort rather than a general contribution fund. If the solicitation comes from a professional for-profit fundraising company, be aware that the charitable organization will receive only a percentage of your donation. If you want to ensure the charity receives the whole amount, donate directly instead.

• Pay attention to vague claims. Pay attention to language such as "all proceeds go to charity" or "your purchase will benefit a charity." A disclosure should be provided that includes the actual or estimated purchase price amount the charity will receive directly.

• Resist high-pressure tactics. Charity fraud scams can come in many forms, whether by email, social media, crowdfunding platforms, cold calls, etc. Watch out for direct emails from "victims" and solicitors who employ heart-wrenching stories, insisting that you donate immediately. It is strongly advised not to give money over the phone to unsolicited telemarketers, and instead ask the caller to send written materials about the charity.

· Find out who's behind the crowdfunding request. Online





platforms like GoFundMe make it easy for people to create crowdfunding campaigns. To protect yourself, remember to give to people you know directly. It's also important to understand the crowdfunding site's rules, policies and vetting procedures. It can be helpful to know these ahead of time to determine how they are protecting consumers from potential fraud.

• Do not disclose personal or financial information to unsolicited requests. Never give your Social Security number, credit card or debit card number or other personal identifying information in response to an unsolicited charitable request.

• Avoid giving cash. Give your contribution by check or credit card to ensure that you have a record of the donation. Make checks out to the charity, not to an individual. If you choose to make a donation via a charity's website, check that the website is secure and that your computer is equipped with the latest anti-virus protection. Do not send contributions with a "runner," by wire or overnight parcel pick-up.

• Don't assume. Check out an organization's tax status at irs.gov/app/eos to find out if the donation is tax deductible. Ask for a receipt and trace the status of your donation.



Ready outdoor power equipment for winter storage

After your lawn gets its last seasonal cut, it's time to put away spring and summer outdoor power equipment, like lawn mowers, leaf blowers and trimmers. What's next? Snow throwers, generators and other small engine equipment need to be readied for winter. How and when you prepare your equipment for seasonal changes can save you time and money later, said the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI).

"Over the last few years, we've learned our outdoor spaces are more important than ever so making sure you've got the means to care for your yard is critical," said Kris Kiser, president and CEO of the OPEI and Equip. "Preparation is everything – understanding how to store equipment and get it serviced, how to operate it safely and how to ready your space to use that equipment."

OPEI encourages everyone to follow their manufacturer's guidelines and to keep kids and pets away from operating equipment at all times. Here are a few tips to ensure proper equipment storage, maintenance and safe handling:

1. Review owner's manuals. Know how to handle equipment safely including how to turn off equipment quickly

and safely. Lost manuals can be found online. Save a copy on your computer, so it can be consulted when needed.

2. Service all equipment. Before storing spring and summer equipment, clean and service it or take it to a small engine repair shop. Drain and change engine oil and safely dispose of old oil. Service the air filter and do other maintenance as directed by the owner's manual. Check winter equipment and see if any maintenance and repairs are required. **3. Handle fuel properly.** Unused fuel left in gas tanks

over the winter can go stale and even damage equipment. Before storing equipment, add fuel stabilizer to the gas tank, then run the equipment to distribute it. Turn the engine off, allow the machine to cool, then restart and run until the gas tank is empty. For winter equipment, buy the recommended type of fuel no more than 30 days before use. Use fuel with no more than 10% ethanol in outdoor power equipment. Use a fuel stabilizer if recommended by the manufacturer. Get more information at LookBeforeYouPump.com. **4. Charge batteries.**

Remove and fully charge batteries before storing. Don't store batteries on metal shelves or allow them to touch metal objects. Store them on a plastic or wood shelf in a climate-controlled structure.

5. Shelter equipment from winter weather. Store spring and summer equipment in a clean and dry place such as a garage, barn or shed. Winter equipment should be kept away from the elements but be easily available for use.

6. Prepare, prepare, prepare. Make space in the garage or basement before the weather changes, so there is room to store larger yard items. Clean up your yard. Remove sticks, debris, dog and kids' toys and other items that can damage or destroy equipment. Clear the paths used regularly in your yard.

7. Use generators with care. Keep heavy duty weatherproof extension cords on hand. Ensure the length of the cord will connect to the generator when it is a safe distance from the house or building. Never operate a generator indoors, in a garage, breezeway or under an open window. Install a carbon monoxide detector in your home.

Ten tips for safer winter generator usage

If your electricity goes out due to snow and ice, a generator can keep power flowing to your home or business. The Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), an international trade association representing manufacturers and suppliers of outdoor power equipment, small engines, battery power systems, portable generators, utility and personal transport vehicles and golf cars, reminds home and business owners to keep safety in mind when using generators this winter.

"Not having power when you need it is frustrating, so a generator can provide emergency backup power at a reasonable cost," said Kris Kiser, president and CEO of OPEI. "It's important to follow all manufacturer's instructions, and never place a generator in your garage or inside your home or building. It should be a safe distance from the structure and not near an air intake."

More tips include:

#1. Take stock of your generator. Make sure equipment is in good working order before starting and using it. Do this before a storm hits.

#2. Review the directions. Follow all manufacturer's instructions. Review the owner's manuals (look manuals up online if you cannot find them) so equipment is operated safely.

#3. Install a battery-operated carbon monoxide detector in your home. This alarm will sound if dangerous levels of carbon monoxide enter the building.

#4. Have the right fuel on hand. Use the type of fuel recommended by the generator manufacturer to protect this important investment. It is illegal to use any fuel with more than 10% ethanol in outdoor power equipment. (For more information on proper fueling for outdoor power equipment visit LookBeforeYou-Pump.com). It's best to use fresh fuel, but if you are using fuel that has been sitting in a gas can for more than 30 days, add fuel stabilizer to it. Store gas only in an approved container and away from heat sources.

#5. Ensure portable generators have plenty of ventilation. Generators should never be used in an enclosed area or placed inside a home, a building or a garage, even if the windows or doors are open. Place the generator outside and away from windows, doors and vents that could allow carbon monoxide to drift indoors.

#6. Keep the generator dry. Do not use a generator in wet conditions. Cover and vent a generator. Model-specific tents or generator covers can be found online for purchase and at home centers and hardware stores.

#7. Only add fuel to a cool generator. Before refueling, turn the generator off and let it cool down.

#8. Plug in safely. If you don't yet have a transfer switch, you can use the outlets on the generator. It's best to plug in appliances directly to the generator. If you must use an extension cord, it should be heavy-duty and designed for outdoor use. It should be rated (in watts or amps) at least equal to the sum of the connected appliance loads. Make sure the cord is free of cuts and the plug has all three prongs.


#9. Install a transfer switch. A

transfer switch connects the generator to the circuit panel and lets you power hardwired appliances. Most transfer switches also help avoid overload by displaying wattage usage levels.

#10. Do not use the generator to "backfeed" power into your home electrical system. Trying to power your home's electrical wiring by "backfeeding" – where you plug the generator into a wall outlet – is dangerous. You could hurt utility workers and neighbors served by the same transformer. Backfeeding bypasses built-in circuit protection devices, so you could damage your electronics or start an electrical fire.

Students at 2022 Herkimer Co. Youth Summit focus on 'building a better tomorrow'

Herkimer County students chose a theme of "building a better tomorrow" for the 2022 Herkimer Co. Youth Summit, with a focus on mental health and improving behavior in school.

Catholic Charities of Herkimer Co. Youth Summit organizers and student organizers from local schools said they identified that many students have struggled since COVID-19 with how to act now that they're in school in person again.

Herkimer Central School District senior Lilliana Langdon, one of the student organizers for the Youth Summit, said students wanted to use to Youth Summit to combat the attitude and mental health concerns.

"With this, we really want to flip that around," Langdon said. "Mental health affects everyone, whether they want to talk about it or not. It's such an important thing for everyone."

About 100 students from 12 school districts and programs – as well as members of a new Herkimer County Youth Advisory Council – attended the 2022 Herkimer Co. Youth Summit on Oct. 26 at Herkimer College. Catholic Charities of Herkimer Co. organized the Youth Summit.

The school districts that had students at the Youth Summit were Central Valley, Dolgeville, Frankfort-Schuyler, Herkimer, Little Falls, Mount Markham, Owen D. Young, Poland, Town of Webb and West Canada Valley. Students also attended from the Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Valley Pathways in Technology Early College High School (VP-TECH) and the Herkimer BOCES Pathways Academy at Remington.

Trisha Alford, youth engagement specialist for Catholic Charities of Herkimer Co. and Herkimer Co. System of Care, served as the Youth Summit coordinator. The student facilitators were Central Valley students Lauren Joy and Madison Sawyer, Dolgeville students Lexus Lyon and Jasmine Barnes, Herkimer students Lilliana Langdon and Madison Gargas, Little Falls students Makena Tooley and Avery McLaughlin, Owen D. Young student Isabella Valenta, Poland students Madeline Swanson and Karyn Castelano, VP-TECH students Zachary Cool and Landon Davidson and Town of Webb students Cameron Guirdy and Ellie Bartlett.

The "building a better tomorrow" theme, which Gargas came up with, tied into what students were concerned about since the start of the organization meetings, organizers said.

"During the first meeting, they talked about just being back together after COVID, people not being kind to each other and not knowing how to behave," Alford said. "They kind of lost all of that."

Near the beginning of the Youth Summit, Alford outlined the agenda for the day and said the guest speaker and other presenters are aware of the issues students chose for the event. "I hope they focus on all these things and you learn a lot today," she said.

2022 Youth Summit

Students started the day with refreshments and a yoga session. Guest speaker Jessie Funk, a singer and motivational speaker, then gave a presentation. Next, students participated in three breakout sessions. One session was a mindfulness activity involving adding positive affirmations to tote bags. Another session was mental wellbeing and cyber safety activity featuring a mental health game based on "Jeopardy!" The other session was a social development activity on healthy relationships and drug education with a trivia game that involved passing around a giant beach ball.

After lunch, students met in groups of their own schools and programs to develop action plans to put in place at their schools. Students wrote their ideas on posters and then presented them on stage at Herkimer College in front of the other schools.

Alford told students the actions plans

Simple safety protocols that can protect hunters

Hunting is big business in North America. In 2017, more than 15 million people hunted in the U.S. The National Shooting Sports Foundation reports that sportsmen and women contribute nearly \$9.4 million to the economy every day.

Millions of hunters take to forests and fields every year. Seasoned hunters and novices alike can benefit from revisiting some safety procedures before their first outing this season. Weather

Weather should be a consideration whenever people spend a significant amount of time outdoors. Hunters typically leave before dawn and arrive home after dusk. Hypothermia is a very real risk for hunters who may be out in snow or wet conditions. It's possible to get hypothermia by overdressing as well. Sweating and then being exposed to dropping temperatures puts people at risk for hypothermia. Hunters should dress in layers with moisture-wicking materials and a water-repellant outer layer. In addition, check the weather forecast before heading out as a last second precautionary measure.

Firearm safety

Firearm safety is a critical component of safe hunting. Hunters use rifles, shotguns and other firearms. Each gun is different, so hunters need to familiarize themselves with new firearms before using them. The following are some additional firearm safety tips, courtesy of State Farm Insurance and

- Always treat a firearm as if it is loaded.
- Keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.
- Only point at what you plan to shoot.
- · Clearly identify your target and what is beyond it.

• Fire within the zone-of-fire, which is the 45-degree area directly in front of each hunter.

• Firearm chambers should be emptied when guns are not in use.

- Use appropriate ammunition.
- Never modify or alter the gun.

• Never cross a fence, jump a ditch or climb a tree with a loaded gun

• Never rely on a gun's safety.

Additional safety tips

Hunters should always let others know where they will be when leaving in the morning. If something should happen, people back home can alert authorities if something goes awry. Always check equipment and maintain it properly. Equipment should include gear colored in hunter's orange. That extends to dogs if they are accompanying hunters on a trip. This makes hunters more visible to other hunters. Also, carry a first aid kit, a charged mobile phone or a satellite phone to maintain contact with others in case of emergencies.

These are just some of the safety protocols that should be followed when hunting. Non-hunters should exercise caution during hunting seasons, particularly when entering forests and areas that hunters frequent.

ideas to life, Alford said. Near the end of the school year, the student facilitators will meet again to talk about what the schools did to put their action plans into place, Alford said. **Guest Speaker**

Langdon and Gargas introduced Jessie Funk as the guest speaker.

Funk put on a presentation that was both upbeat and emotional - from singing songs and making students laugh to telling students personal stories of challenging and inspiring times of her life.

She used a demonstration with milk representing ourselves, chocolate syrup added to the milk representing positive people in our lives and Windex put into the milk representing toxic people in our lives. She said she loves history and has read biographies and researched more than 500 leaders, and she found a common thread that they didn't let toxic people hold them back.

Funk said any Youth Summit attendees going through challenges should know they have the support of their schools and the Youth Summit organizers.

Funk also talked about the importance of setting boundaries with toxic people. She said even though it can feel cheesy and awkward to say, you have to embrace it and say things such as: "I don't like it. I don't deserve it. I want it to stop."



only point the firearm when you plan to shoot, making sure to keep your finger off the trigger until you're ready to shoot. Only shoot when a target is clearly identifiable and you're certain about what is beyond the target.

Weather and gear

The right attire can protect hunters from Mother Nature and their fellow sportsmen. Weather can be unpredictable during hunting season. Hunters should always check the forecast before leaving home, making sure to dress for the weather. Even if the forecast calls for agreeable weather, hunters could be at the mercy of Mother Nature should the weather unexpectedly change. As a result, it behooves hunters to prepare for cold, wet weather, which could put them at risk of hypothermia if they are not dressed properly. A water-repelling outer layer can protect hunters in wet conditions, and it's also ideal to dress in layers.

To lower your risk of injuries suffered at the hands of other hunters, avoid colors and patterns that blend into natural surroundings. Such colors can include earth tones, blacks and browns. Animal patterns may confuse fellow hunters into thinking you're an animal, so avoid these as well.

Staying in touch

Hunters, especially those who plan to go it alone, should always let others know of their plans before going on a hunting excursion. Sharing plans can help rescue teams find you should you suffer an injury on your trip and prove incapable of returning to your campsite or vehicle without assistance. Let others know when you plan to return and indicate your plans to call or text them when you arrive back at your vehicle. This way they can promptly alert the appropriate authorities should you not contact them on time.

Millions of people across the globe enjoy the sport of hunting. Hunting trips are even more enjoyable when hunters prioritize safety.

Helping get a head start on the holidays at L.J. Hand





A favorite holiday treat by Ava Hughes, Susquehanna Co. Dairy Ambassador

A s a Dairy Ambassador I often look for tasty foods to eat with lots of dairy products in them. One of my favorites to make and share at family gatherings is chicken wing dip. The recipe contains cream cheese, sour cream and cheddar cheese. Before I share the recipe, I'm going to share a fact about each of these dairy products.

• Cream cheese is made when lactic acid is added to pasteurized milk and cream, which lowers the mixture's pH causing it to form curds. When the curds are heated and stabilizers added it becomes cream cheese.

• Sour cream is a thick and creamy dairy product derived from the cream of cow's milk. Sour cream is often used as a topping for baked potatoes, Mexican dishes, salad dressings and in dessert recipes.

• Nearly four billion pounds of cheddar cheese has been produced in the U.S. annually in recent years.

Here's the recipe my grandma and I use for "Crock Pot Chicken Wing Dip."

2 8-oz. packages of cream cheese, softened

2 16-oz. containers of sour cream

1 lb. shredded cheddar cheese

1 bottle of ranch dressing

2 to 3 lbs. of cooked shredded

chicken breast

1/2 to 3/4 cup hot sauce (adjust to your own preference)


Mix the softened cream cheese, sour cream, shredded cheddar cheese and ranch dressing in a crock pot. Heat until the cheeses are melted and then add the shredded chicken breast and hot sauce. Keep warm in the crock pot until you're ready to serve with your favorite chips.

I've discovered guacamole chips pair well with the Chicken Wing Dip. This recipe makes a rather large batch of Chicken Wing Dip but if you have extra it freezes well.

I hope you take a few minutes and make this recipe to share with your family and friends during the holiday season. I'm sure you will enjoy this treat that is full of delicious dairy products.
